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#### CRIME IN CALIFORNIA, 2004

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The role of the Criminal Justice Statistics Center is to:

- Collect, analyze, and report statistical data which provide valid measures of crime and the criminal justice process.
- Examine these data on an ongoing basis to better describe crime and the criminal justice system.
- Promote the responsible presentation and use of crime statistics.

### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S MESSAGE

In 2004, the violent crime rate in California continued to decline, reaching a level not seen since 1972. This rate dropped as a result of decreases in all four violent crime offenses. This is welcome news and shows that the law enforcement community is taking strong and effective steps to combat violent crime. Only one of the seven major crimes, motor vehicle theft, increased, causing the property crime rate to inch up slightly.

The violent crime rate decreased 5.2 percent from 2003 to 2004:

- Homicide (1.2 percent of violent crimes) decreased 3.0 percent.
- Forcible rape (4.9 percent of violent crimes) decreased 5.1 percent.
- Robbery (31.2 percent of violent crimes) decreased 4.9 percent.
- Aggravated assault (62.7 percent of violent crimes) decreased 5.5 percent.

The property crime rate increased 0.9 percent from 2003 to 2004:

- Burglary (34.4 percent of property crimes) decreased 0.1 percent.
- Motor vehicle theft (35.3 percent of property crimes) increased 2.7 percent.
- Larceny-theft over \$400 (30.3 percent of property crimes) remained the same.

I am pleased to see decreases in violent crimes, which can often affect an entire community. The tireless efforts of law enforcement officials and community leaders have contributed to the decline in this area. Nevertheless, I will continue to work with the criminal justice community to ensure that the safety of our citizens remains a priority.

It has been argued that crimes do not occur by chance and the same holds true for crime prevention. By using strategies that are currently in place and taking advantage of the latest crime-fighting technologies, we remain proactive in our quest to maintain the low levels of crime seen over the past few years. I am confident that all members of the criminal justice community, including police, sheriff, prosecution, probation and corrections, will do their part in ensuring these goals are met. With that in mind, I resolve to provide officials at all levels the tools needed to combat and prevent crime.

The people of our state have chosen to make California their home for many reasons, and quality of life stands tall among them. Feeling secure in their homes is just one of the ways this standard can be met. As Attorney General, it is my duty to ensure, at the very least, that Californians are safe, secure, and able to enjoy all that this golden state has to offer.

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### HIGHLIGHTS

### CRIMES (See pages 2-23.)

- The violent crime rate increased from 153.1 in 1952 to its peak of 1,103.9 in 1992. The rate has since dropped to 539.6 crimes reported per 100,000 population in 2004. (Source: Table 1.)
- In 2004, the violent crime rate declined 5.2 percent, reaching its lowest level since 1972. (Source: Tables 1 and 2.)
- The decline in the violent crime rate was driven by decreases in all four violent offense categories. (Source: Table 1.)
- In 2004, the property crime rate increased 0.9 percent due to a 2.7 percent increase in the motor vehicle theft rate. (Source: Table 2.)

### ARRESTS (See pages 26-63.)

- The 2004 total arrest rate of 5,286.4 per 100,000 population at risk is just slightly lower than the 2003 arrest rate of 5,288.7. (Source: Table 16.)
- Since 1999, the rate of juvenile felony arrests decreased 24.3 percent and the rate of juvenile misdemeanor arrests decreased 24.8 percent. The rate of status offense arrests (truancy, incorrigibility, running away, and curfew violations) decreased 37.7 percent since 1999. (Source: Table 17.)
- From 1999 to 2004, the forcible rape arrest rate decreased 29.5 percent. The rate of juvenile arrests for forcible rape offenses decreased 32.0 percent since 1999; however, the juvenile arrest rate increased 4.5 percent from 2003 to 2004.

- Since 1999, the narcotics, marijuana, and "other" drug arrest rates decreased 19.7, 16.2, and 57.6 percent, respectively, while the arrest rate for dangerous drugs increased 35.5 percent. (Source: Table 22.)

### DISPOSITIONS (See pages 66-75.)

- In 2004, 69.8 percent of adult felony arrests resulted in a conviction. (Source: Table 37.)
- Probation with jail continues to be the most frequent sentence given for adult felony arrests. (Source: Table 41.)
- Since 1999, the percentage of individuals convicted of drug offenses and sentenced to state institutions (prison, California Rehabilitation Center, and California Youth Authority) has declined from 27.7 to 18.7 percent. (Source: Table 41.)

#### WHAT IS A CRIME?

A crime is an act specifically prohibited by law, or failure to perform an act specifically required by law, for which punishment is prescribed (California Penal Code section 15).

#### **HOW ARE CRIMES COUNTED?**

The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program was inaugurated in 1930 and is administered on the national level by the FBI. It provides criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. In California, this program is administered by the Department of Justice (DOJ).

As part of the UCR Program, law enforcement agencies throughout the state report summary information to the DOJ on "selected" crimes. Reported crimes are classified by UCR definitions designed to eliminate differences among the various states' penal code definitions of crimes.

The crimes, selected because of seriousness, frequency of occurrence, and the likelihood of being reported to the police, are homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. These eight offenses are known as Part I crimes. Except for larceny-theft, UCR does not count misdemeanors and infractions.

The DOJ categorizes Part I crimes as either violent (homicide, forcible rape, aggravated assault, and robbery) or property (burglary, motor vehicle theft, and larceny-theft over \$400) crimes. In 2003, larceny-theft over \$400 was added to the property crime category to give a more representative depiction of crime in California and to correlate more closely to national data presentation. Note that since these data have only been available since 1983, property crime totals (number and rate per 100,000 population) from 1983 to 2004 have been adjusted accordingly. Therefore, property crime data presented in this report will differ from data published previously, and the reader is cautioned against making comparisons with previous publications.

The UCR Program accounts for Part I crimes only; however, some Part I crimes go undetected and therefore unreported. This, along with the hierarchy rule, accounts for a certain amount of underreporting in the system. Most crimes occur singly as opposed to more than one crime being committed within the same incident. The hierarchy rule assigns a value to each crime and requires that only the single most serious offense be reported. For example, if a person were to enter a bar, rob eight patrons, and kill the bartender, only the homicide would be reported. Arson is the exception. Since arson frequently occurs in conjunction with other crimes, it is felt that valuable information could be lost using the hierarchy rule. Therefore, arson is counted along with the other most serious offense.

#### WHAT IS A RATE?

A rate describes the number of events that occur within a given population. Crime rates and clearance rates are used in this section. Formulas for calculating both can be found in Appendix 2. Note that use of the California Crime Index has been suspended until a new national crime index is established by the FBI.


#### WHAT IS THE VALUE OF THE UCR PROGRAM?

Since its inception in 1930, UCR has become a nationwide program. All California law enforcement agencies participate. Quality-control surveys conducted by DOJ staff have shown a high level of compliance with UCR reporting standards. The number of participants and the amount and quality of data collected under the stringent rules of the system make UCR a valuable program. In California, because of the high quality of its law enforcement agencies and their close cooperation with the DOJ, UCR data are, and have been for many years, an extremely good indicator of the extent of, and fluctuation in, crimes reported to law enforcement.

### **CRIME TRENDS, 1983-2004**

Data depicting crime in California have been published continuously for 52 years. The first *Crime in California* publication was issued in 1953 and reported data for the 1952 calendar year.

#### Comparing 1983 to 2004:

- The violent crime rate decreased 30.4 percent (from 775.6 to 539.6).
- The property crime rate decreased 38.5 percent (from 3,166.1 to 1,946.4).

The violent crime rate was on a general increase from 1983 to 1992, when it peaked at 1,103.9. Since then, the rate has seen annual decreases, dropping a total of 51.1 percent, including a 5.2 percent decrease from 2003 to 2004. The 2004 rate of 539.6 is the lowest since the 1972 rate of 537.7.

Since 1983, the property crime rate has fluctuated, with a peak of 3,332.4 seen in 1989. The rate then declined each

year, with the exception of a slight increase in 1991, before reaching a low of 1,649.8 in 1999. The rate has seen annual increases since that time, including a 0.9 percent increase from 2003 to 2004. Note that larcenytheft over \$400 was added to the property crime category in 2003 to give a more representative depiction of crime in California and to correlate more closely to national data presentation. These data are only available since 1983, hence the figure shown above.

Since 1983, there have been many changes in laws and data collection procedures. For instance, in 1986 legislation was enacted that required reporting domestic violence as criminal conduct. As a result, the aggravated assault rate increased over 35 percent in one year. These types of changes should be considered when comparing data.

The California Crime Index has been temporarily suspended until a new national crime index is established by the FBI.



### **Violent and Property Crimes**

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- Violent crimes decreased 5.0 percent in number.
- Property crimes increased 26.8 percent in number.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


- Violent crimes decreased 3.5 percent in number.
- Property crimes increased 2.7 percent in number.

#### In 2004:

- There were 197,432 violent crimes reported.
- There were 712,193 property crimes reported.


The number of violent crimes has been on a general decline for the years shown, but property crimes have been increasing since 1999.

#### CRIME IN CALIFORNIA, 1999-2004 Violent and Property Crimes By Number





#### **Violent Crimes**

**Violent Crimes** - homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

■ The rate of reported violent crimes decreased 11.6 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

■ The violent crime rate decreased 5.2 percent.

In 2004, of 197,432 violent crimes reported:

- Homicide accounted for 1.2 percent (2,394).
- Forcible rape accounted for 4.9 percent (9,598).
- Robbery accounted for 31.2 percent (61,573).
- Aggravated assault accounted for 62.7 percent (123,867).

The violent crime rate declined for the 12th consecutive year, decreasing 5.2 percent from 2003 to 2004 (see Table 1).

#### Homicide

**Homicide** - The willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter comprise this category.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

The rate of reported homicides increased 10.2 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


■ The homicide rate decreased 3.0 percent.

**In 2004,** of 2,394 homicides reported, the type of weapon was known in 2,382 cases (99.5 percent). Of these:

- Firearms accounted for 72.6 percent (1,730).
- Knives or cutting instruments accounted for 11.8 percent (282).
- Blunt objects (clubs, etc.) accounted for 4.4 percent (104).
- Personal weapons (hands, feet, etc.) accounted for 6.2 percent (148).
- Other weapons accounted for 5.0 percent (118).


In 2004, the homicide rate declined for the 2nd consecutive year.

#### HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population





#### HOMICIDE CRIMES, 2004 By Type of Weapon Used





#### Forcible Rape

**Forcible Rape** - The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are included.

The UCR definition of forcible rape states that only females can be victims; therefore, a forcible rape crime rate based exclusively on the female population is included. The following discussion is based on the rate of occurrence for both female population and total population (see Tables 2 and 5).

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- The rate of reported forcible rapes (female population) decreased 5.2 percent.
- The rate of reported forcible rapes (total population) decreased 5.4 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- The forcible rape rate (female population) decreased 3.8 percent.
- The forcible rape rate (total population) decreased 5.1 percent.

In 2004, of 9,598 forcible rapes reported:

- Rape accounted for 86.3 percent (8,287).
- Attempted rape accounted for 13.7 percent (1,311).

The forcible rape rate for the female population declined for the 2nd consecutive year.

### Robbery

**Robbery** - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

■ The rate of reported robberies decreased 4.6 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


■ The robbery rate decreased 4.9 percent.

#### In 2004, of 61,573 robberies reported:

- Highway robbery (streets, parks, parking lots, etc.) accounted for 46.7 percent (28,738).
- Commercial robbery accounted for 23.7 percent (14,563).
- Residential robbery accounted for 8.2 percent (5,046).
- Bank robbery accounted for 2.1 percent (1,323).
- Robberies that occurred in other locations (churches, schools, trains, etc.) accounted for 19.3 percent (11,903).


Like homicide and forcible rape, the robbery rate also declined for the 2nd consecutive year.

#### ROBBERY CRIMES, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population





### Robbery (continued)

In 2004, of all robberies reported:

- Armed robbery accounted for 52.4 percent (32,249).
- Strong-arm robbery accounted for 47.6 percent (29,324).

Of the 32,249 armed robberies reported:

- Firearms were involved in 63.9 percent (20,609).
- Knives or cutting instruments were involved in 19.0 percent (6,119).
- Other dangerous weapons were involved in 17.1 percent (5,521).

In 2004, firearms were the weapon of choice in over 60 percent of armedrobberies.

# RIMID

### **Aggravated Assault**

Aggravated Assault - The unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

The rate of reported aggravated assaults decreased 15.5 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


The aggravated assault rate decreased 5.5 percent.

In 2004, of 123,867 aggravated assaults reported:

- Firearms were involved in 18.0 percent (22,237).
- Knives or cutting instruments were involved in 15.0 percent (18,608).
- Other dangerous weapons were involved in 33.7 percent (41,699).
- Personal weapons were involved in 33.4 percent (41,323).


With the exception of a slight increase in 2000, the aggravated assault rate has dropped each year since its peak in 1992 (see Table 1).


#### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT CRIMES, 2004 By Type of Weapon Used



### **Property Crimes**

**Property Crimes -** burglary, motor vehicle theft, and larceny-theft over \$400.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

■ The rate of reported property crimes increased 18.0 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

■ The property crime rate increased 0.9 percent.

In 2004, of 712,193 property crimes reported:

- Burglary accounted for 34.4 percent (244,914).
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 35.3 percent (251,747).
- Larceny-theft over \$400 accounted for 30.3 percent (215,532).

In 2003, larceny-theft over \$400 was added to the property crime category to give a more representative depiction of crime in California. See "Appendix 1, Data Characteristics and Known Limitations."

After decreasing for eight consecutive years, the property crime rate has seen five consecutive years of increases (see Table 1).

# OR KIND

### **Burglary**

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted burglary is included.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

The rate of reported burglaries increased 1.8 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

■ The burglary rate decreased 0.1 percent.

In 2004, of 244,914 burglaries and attempted burglaries reported:


- Burglary accounted for 94.2 percent (230,601).
- Attempted burglary accounted for 5.8 percent (14,313).

Of the 230,601 burglaries that occurred:

- Structures entered by force accounted for 61.0 percent (140,687).
- Structures entered without force accounted for 39.0 percent (89,914).


The burglary rate has remained relatively stable throughout the period shown.

#### BURGLARY CRIMES, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population





#### **BURGLARY CRIMES, 2004** By Type of Burglary and Type of Entry





### **Burglary (continued)**

In 2004, of all burglaries reported:

- Residential burglary accounted for 57.0 percent (139,581).
- Nonresidential burglary accounted for 43.0 percent (105,333). Included in this category are commercial establishments, public buildings, etc.
- Daytime burglary accounted for 38.1 percent (93,226).
- Nighttime burglary accounted for 28.0 percent (68,505).
- Burglaries that occurred during an unknown hour accounted for 34.0 percent (83,183).



#### **Motor Vehicle Theft**

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.


#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

■ The rate of reported motor vehicle thefts increased 39.0 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

The motor vehicle theft rate increased 2.7 percent.


MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT CRIMES, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population

# Motor Vehicle Theft (continued)

In 2004, of 251,747 motor vehicle thefts reported:

- Autos accounted for 74.8 percent (188,311).
- Trucks and buses accounted for 19.2 percent (48,262). Included in this category are pickup trucks, vans, and motor homes.
- Other vehicles accounted for 6.0 percent (15,174). Included in this category are motorcycles, snowmobiles, motor scooters, and trail bikes.

### Larceny-Theft

Larceny-Theft - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another (except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, and worthless checks).

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

The rate of total reported larceny-thefts increased 2.2 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


The total larceny-theft rate decreased 1.9 percent.

#### In 2004, of 726,614 larceny-thefts reported:

- Thefts under \$50 in value accounted for 34.6 percent (251,127).
- Thefts \$50 to \$199 in value accounted for 20.0 percent (145,082).
- Thefts \$200 to \$400 in value accounted for 15.8 percent (114,873).
- Thefts over \$400 in value accounted for 29.7 percent (215,532).


In 2004, larceny-thefts decreased in rate; this is the first decrease since 2000.


#### LARCENY-THEFT CRIMES, 2004 By Value Category of Loss

### Larceny-Theft (continued)

In 2004, of 726,614 larceny-thefts reported:

- Shoplifting accounted for 12.9 percent (93,482).
- Thefts from motor vehicles accounted for 38.6 percent (280,665).
- Thefts of motor vehicle accessories accounted for 11.3 percent (82,037).
- Thefts of bicycles accounted for 3.5 percent (25,231).
- Thefts from buildings accounted for 13.8 percent (99,960).
- All other types of larceny-thefts accounted for 20.0 percent (145,239).

In 2004, nearly half (49.9 percent) of all larceny-theft crimes involved theft from motor vehicles and theft of motor vehicle accessories.



### Value of Stolen and **Recovered Property**

As part of the UCR Program, law enforcement agencies submit monthly reports showing the estimated dollar value of property stolen and property recovered. In these reports, the type of property is categorized in a uniform manner. However, agencies do not report these data consistently and frequently vary in their methods of estimating the dollar value of stolen property. Furthermore, property stolen and property recovered in any given time period are not necessarily the same property. For these reasons, dollar values of such property must be viewed as rough estimates.


#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 5.0 percent increase in the dollar value of all stolen property.
- There was a 3.6 percent increase in the dollar value of motor vehicles stolen.
- There was a 6.5 percent increase in the dollar value of all other stolen property.

**In 2004,** of the total dollar value (\$2,643,105,000) of all property reported stolen:

- Motor vehicles accounted for \$1,363,249,000 (51.6 percent).
- All other property accounted for \$1,279,856,000 (48.4 percent).


VALUE OF STOLEN PROPERTY, 2004 By Type



# Value of Stolen and Recovered Property (continued)

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 4.7 percent increase in the dollar value of all recovered property.
- There was a 4.3 percent increase in the dollar value of motor vehicles recovered.
- There was a 10.9 percent increase in the dollar value of all other recovered property.

**In 2004,** of the total dollar value (\$971,113,000) of property reported recovered:

- Motor vehicles accounted for \$907,370,000 (93.4 percent).
- All other property accounted for \$63,743,000 (6.6 percent).

In 2004, motor vehicle value constituted over half of the total value of all stolen property (51.6 percent) and almost all of the value of recovered property (93.4 percent).

# OR KID

#### Arson

Arson - Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or the personal property of another, etc.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

The rate of reported arsons decreased 18.6 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


The arson rate decreased 9.2 percent.

#### In 2004, of 12,660 arsons reported:

- Structural properties were targeted in 29.9 percent (3,786) of the offenses.
- Mobile properties were targeted in 38.3 percent (4,846) of the offenses.
- Other properties were targeted in 31.8 percent (4,028) of the offenses. Included in this category are crops, timber, fences, signs, etc.


In 2004, arsons decreased in rate for the third consecutive year.


#### ARSON CRIMES, 2004 By Type of Property Targeted

**In 2004,** the total estimated value of all property damaged was \$154,128,000. The value of damage resulting from arsons directed at:

- Structural properties accounted for \$114,840,000 (74.5 percent).
- Mobile properties accounted for \$35,184,000 (22.8 percent).
- Other properties accounted for \$4,104,000 (2.7 percent).

In 2004, almost one-third (29.9 percent) of arson crimes involved structural property; structural property constituted almost three-quarters (74.5 percent) of the total value of all property damaged by arson.

# RIME

#### Clearances

Crimes can be cleared by arrests or "exceptional means." An offense is cleared or "solved" for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the crime, and turned over to the court for prosecution or referred to juvenile authorities. In certain situations a clearance may be counted by "exceptional means" when the police definitely know the identity of the offender, have enough information to support an arrest, and know the location of the offender but for some reason cannot take the offender into custody.

A clearance rate is the percentage obtained when the number of clearances reported are divided by the number of crimes reported.




#### CRIME IN CALIFORNIA, 1999-2004 Clearance Rate by Crime Category

#### In 2004,

- Aggravated assault had the highest clearance rate (57.7 percent).
- Motor vehicle theft had the lowest clearance rate (9.4 percent).

The homicide clearance rate decreased 8.2 percent from 1999 to 2004 (see Table 15).

#### WHAT IS AN ARREST?

Arrests occur when persons are taken into custody because they are believed to have violated the law. Not all arrests result in persons being placed in jail. Arrestees may be released by the arresting agency, may post bail, or may be released on their own recognizance to appear in court at a later date. Some are issued citations, much like traffic tickets, which direct them to appear in court.

Arrests are divided into two major groups: felony arrests and misdemeanor arrests. An arrest for a felony-level offense can result in a sentence to state prison if the offender is convicted as an adult. An arrest for a misdemeanor-level offense can result in a sentence of up to one year in a county jail, a fine, probation, restitution, or any combination of the four.

Juveniles may also be arrested for truancy, incorrigibility, running away, and curfew violations. These are commonly referred to as status offenses because agency intervention is based solely on the juvenile's status as a minor. Status offenses are acts that would not be "crimes" if committed by adults.

#### HOW ARE ARRESTS REPORTED?

Unlike crimes, which are classified by nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) standards, arrests are

reported by California statute definition of the offense. This may cause some differences in the definitions of certain crimes and the reporting of the arrests for those crimes. For instance, theft from a locked automobile is a burglary by California Penal Code definition. The crime would be classified and reported as a theft under the UCR definition. The arrest offenses in this section are defined by California statute for which specific code sections are listed in Appendix 4.

All California law enforcement agencies report arrest and citation information to the Department of Justice on the "Monthly Arrest and Citation Register," which lists each arrestee; includes information on age, gender, and race/ethnic group; and specifies the "most serious" arrest offense and law enforcement disposition.


#### WHAT IS AN ARREST RATE?

An arrest rate describes the number of arrests made by law enforcement agencies per 100,000 total population or per 100,000 population considered to be at risk for arrest. The following section includes three at-risk comparison populations: total (10-69 years of age), adult (18-69 years of age), and juvenile (10-17 years of age). The formula used to calculate at-risk rates can be found in Appendix 2.

The above chart displays arrest rates beginning with 1960, the first year complete data were available. Felony and misdemeanor arrest rates are based on population at risk, 10-69 years of age.

#### Comparing 1960 to 2004:

- There was a 57.6 percent increase in the rate of felony arrests (from 1,170.0 to 1,843.6).
- There was a 38.3 percent decrease in the rate of misdemeanor arrests (from 5,404.0 to 3,334.5).

Felony arrests as a proportion of total arrests increased from 15.4 percent in 1960 to 34.9 percent in 2004.

The 2004 misdemeanor arrest rate of 3,334.5 per 100,000 population at risk was slightly lower than the 2003 rate of 3,349.9. Misdemeanor arrests as a proportion of total arrests decreased from 71.4 percent in 1960 to 63.1 percent in 2004.

Status offense arrests as a proportion of total arrests decreased from 13.2 percent in 1960 to 2.1 percent in 2004.





#### **TOTAL ARRESTS, 1999-2004** Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk








**TOTAL ARRESTS, 1999-2004** By Level of Offense Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk




#### FELONY ARRESTS, 2004 By Category



#### **Arrests for Violent Offenses**

**Violent Offense Arrests -** felony arrests for homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, and kidnapping.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- There was a 15.2 percent decrease in the rate of total arrests for violent offenses.
- There was a 12.8 percent decrease in the rate of adult arrests and a 29.3 percent decrease in the rate of juvenile arrests.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 5.0 percent rate decrease in total arrests for violent offenses.




FELONY ARRESTS FOR VIOLENT OFFENSES, 2004 By Offense


FELONY ARRESTS FOR VIOLENT OFFENSES, 2004 Offense by Adult and Juvenile Arrests













#### FELONY ARRESTS FOR PROPERTY OFFENSES, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk




#### FELONY ARRESTS FOR PROPERTY OFFENSES, 2004 By Offense
















FELONY ARRESTS FOR DRUG OFFENSES, 2004 By Offense







The adult and total arrest rate for dangerous drug offenses increased for the fifth consecutive year and the juvenile arrest rate increased for the second consecutive year.










#### MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2004 Offense by Adult and Juvenile Arrests





- There was a 4.6 percent increase in the rate of total drug offense arrests.
- There was an 8.8 percent increase in the rate of adult arrests and a 19.8 percent decrease in the rate of juvenile arrests.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 2.2 percent rate increase in total drug offense arrests.

In 2004, of 140,198 arrests for drug offenses:





- Adult arrests accounted for 99.2 percent (175,653).
- Juvenile arrests accounted for 0.8 percent (1,403).






FELONY AND MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2004 Gender of Arrestee by Level of Offense


#### FELONY AND MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2004 By Age of Arrestee



The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ethnic group data. As commonly used, race refers to large populations which share certain similar physical characteristics such as skin color. Because these physical characteristics can vary greatly within groups as well as between groups, determination of race is frequently, by necessity, subjective. Ethnicity refers to cultural heritage and can cross racial lines. For example, the ethnic designation "Hispanic" includes persons of any race. Most commonly, self-identification of race/ethnicity is used in the classification and labeling process.



FELONY AND MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2004 By Race/Ethnic Group of Arrestee






### DISPOSITIONS

The Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) system in California describes the processing of adults arrested for felony offenses from arrest through final disposition. Data on the adjacent flow chart pertain specifically to adult felony arrests that received final dispositions in 2004 and were added to the Automated Criminal History System (ACHS) by the Department of Justice by May 2005.

#### WHAT IS A FINAL DISPOSITION?

In the OBTS system, the term "final disposition" refers to a specific legal action that takes place following an adult felony arrest. Final dispositions shown occur at the law enforcement, prosecutor, or court level. For example, if an arrestee is released by a law enforcement agency or the complaint is denied by a prosecutor who has determined that there is not enough evidence to justify the filing of a complaint, the release is recorded as a final disposition. If an arrestee is referred to court for adjudication, the outcome (e.g., dismissal, diversion dismissal, acquittal, or conviction) is also recorded as a final disposition. "Intermediate" dispositions (e.g., placements into diversionary programs) are not included in the OBTS file.

#### **HOW ARE OBTS DATA REPORTED?**

Dispositions of adult felony arrests were reported by approximately 1,200 agencies in 2004. These agencies include law enforcement, prosecutors, and courts of the California criminal justice system.

OBTS data are taken directly from the Department of Justice's Automated Criminal History System (ACHS). The arrest dispositions received generally describe statewide processing of adult felony arrestees through California's criminal justice system. (See Appendix 1, Data Characteristics and Known Limitations.)

> The OBTS data file for 2004 was closed in May 2005 and is considered preliminary. The "final" file will be closed in fall 2005. Fluctuations from year to year in counts may not necessarily be due to actual occurrences in the criminal justice system but only reflect the degree to which dispositions are reported and processed. Due to processing changes, 2002 OBTS convictions by offense data are not available. In 2003, a processing modification was made allowing these data to become available. 


#### ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS, 1999-2004 Type of Disposition by Year

In 2004, as a percentage of recorded adult felony arrest dispositions:

- Convictions accounted for 69.8 percent (225,217).
- Dismissals or acquittals accounted for 14.1 percent (45,521).
- Prosecutor complaints denied accounted for 12.8 percent (41,377).
- Law enforcement releases accounted for 3.3 percent (10,584).

In 2004, as a percentage of recorded adult felony arrest dispositions for each arrest category:

- The largest percentage of prosecutor complaints denied was for the violent offense category (21.7 percent).
- The largest percentage of dismissals and acquittals was for the drug offense category (18.3 percent).





ADULT FELONY ARRESTEES CONVICTED, 2004a By Type of Sentence









#### ADULT FELONY ARRESTEES CONVICTED OF PROPERTY OFFENSES, 2004a By Type of Sentence





## **Adult Felony Arrestees Convicted of Drug Offenses**

During the 1999-2004 time period, the percentage of adult felony arrestees convicted of drug offenses and sentenced to:

- State institutions ranged from 17.8 to 27.7 percent.
- Probation ranged from 6.3 to 31.6 percent.
- Probation with jail ranged from 46.6 to 64.2 percent.
- Jail ranged from 2.8 to 4.0 percent.

In 2004, of adult felony arrestees convicted of drug offenses:

- Probation with jail sentences were the most frequent given (46.6 percent).
- "Straight" jail sentences were the least frequent given (4.0 percent).

In 2004, the percentage of adult felony arrestees receiving probation was over four times the percentage in 1999. During this time, the percentage sentenced to state institutions decreased 9.0 percentage points and the percentage sentenced to probation with jail decreased 16.6 percentage points. These changes are most likely the result of the implementation of Proposition 36 (Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act, 2000).

Proposition 36 went into effect July 2001 and required that offenders convicted of nonviolent drug possession be sentenced to probation and drug treatment instead of prison, jail, or probation without treatment.


# DISPOSITIONS

#### **Conviction Rates**

The conviction rates shown are calculated using two different bases. The first is based on total adult felony arrest dispositions and the second is based on total complaints filed. Each is valid and by presenting both, the reader is provided two perspectives from which to evaluate the effectiveness of the criminal justice system.

Conviction rates based on total adult felony arrest dispositions describe the overall processing of offenders by the criminal justice system. This method of calculation focuses on the proportion of convictions out of the total number of arrests.


DISPOSITIONS OF ADULT FELONY ARRESTS, 2004a By Type of Disposition

#### DISPOSITIONS OF COMPLAINTS FILED RESULTING FROM ADULT FELONY ARRESTS, 2004a By Type of Disposition





## **Conviction Rates (continued)**

Conviction rates based on total complaints filed describe the processing of defendants in the courts. This method of calculation focuses on those arrests for which a complaint was filed by the district attorney.

Formulas used to calculate conviction rates based on total adult felony arrest dispositions and total complaints filed can be found in Appendix 2.



#### WHAT IS ADULT CORRECTIONS?

Adults convicted in California courts are frequently placed under the jurisdiction of either the state correctional system or a correctional system operated by local government. The state correctional system provides confinement, rehabilitation, and parole services through the California Department of Corrections (CDC), which includes the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC). The state correctional system also includes the California Youth Authority (CYA) and the California Department of Mental Health (CDMH). Local correctional agencies provide confinement, rehabilitation, and probation services for those sentenced to their care and also those persons awaiting trial or sentencing.


#### HOW ARE ADULTS UNDER SUPERVISION COUNTED?

At the state level, supervision data are obtained annually from the CDC and CYA. At the local level, supervision data are obtained from the Board of Corrections and county probation departments.



- There was a 8.9 percent decrease in the rate of adults under state supervision and a 6.3 percent decrease in the rate of adults under local supervision.

- There was a 0.2 percent rate decrease in adults under supervision.

- There was a 6.8 percent decrease in the rate of adults in institutions.
- There was a 11.7 percent decrease in the rate of adult parolees/outpatients.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


- There was a 1.2 percent rate decrease of adults in institutions.
- There was a 2.9 percent rate decrease in adult parolees/outpatients.

In 2004, of 278,068 adults under state supervision:

- Those in institutions accounted for 59.0 percent (164,169).
- Parolees/outpatients accounted for 41.0 percent (113,899).



#### ADULTS UNDER STATE SUPERVISION, 1999-2004 Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk





#### ADULTS UNDER STATE SUPERVISION, 2004





## **Adults Under Local Supervision**

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- There was a 6.8 percent rate decrease in the average daily jail population.
- There was a 6.2 percent decrease in the rate of adults on active probation.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 0.7 percent rate increase in the average daily jail population.
- There was a 0.9 percent rate increase in adults on active probation.

In 2004, of 425,256 adults under local supervision:

- The average daily jail population accounted for 18.3 percent (77,814). Of these.
  - There were 26,306 serving sentences.
  - There were 51,508 awaiting trial or sentencing.
- Those on active probation accounted for 81.7 percent (347,442).

In 2004, slight increases were seen in the average daily jail population and in adults on active probation.





#### ADULTS ON ACTIVE PROBATION, 1999-2004





#### ADULTS ON ACTIVE PROBATION, 2004 By Level of Offense





#### Adults Placed on Probation

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- There was a 5.9 percent increase in the rate of adults placed on probation.
- There was a 7.6 percent increase in the rate of adults placed for felony offenses and a 1.7 percent increase in the rate of adults placed for misdemeanor offenses.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 6.5 percent rate increase in adults placed on probation.
- There was a 7.9 percent rate increase in adults placed for felony offenses and a 2.8 percent rate increase in adults placed for misdemeanor offenses.

In 2004, of the 197,358 adults placed on probation:

- Those placed for felony offenses accounted for 72.8 percent (143,735).
- Those placed for misdemeanor offenses accounted for 27.2 percent (53,623).

The rate of adults placed on probation has increased from 721.2 in 2001 to 825.5 in 2004.

## **Adults Removed From Probation**

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- There was a 9.1 percent increase in the rate of adults removed from probation.
- There was a 2.0 percent increase in the rate of terminations, an 18.2 percent increase in revocations, and a 6.8 percent increase in those removed for other reasons.

#### From 2003 to 2004:


- There was a 13.3 percent increase in the rate of adults removed from probation.
- There was a 4.9 percent increase in the rate of terminations, a 5.3 percent increase in revocations, and a 144.8 percent increase in those removed for other reasons.

In 2004, of the 190,857 adults removed from probation:

- Those whose probation was terminated (completed their terms of probation successfully) accounted for 43.8 percent (83,674).
- Those whose probation was revoked accounted for 43.4 percent (82,774).
- Those removed for other reasons accounted for 12.8 percent (24,409).


#### ADULTS REMOVED FROM PROBATION, 1999-2004 By Type of Removal

Rate per 100,000 Population at Risk





#### ADULTS REMOVED FROM PROBATION, 2004 By Type of Removal





## Adults Committed to State **Institutions**

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:

- There was a 2.7 percent decrease in the rate of adults committed to state institutions.
- There was a 1.5 percent decrease in the rate of CDC commitments.
- There was a 45.3 percent decrease in the rate of commitments to CRC and a 71.4 percent decrease in the rate of commitments to CYA.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- There was a 6.0 percent increase in the rate of adults committed to state institutions.
- There was a 6.6 percent increase in the rate of CDC commitments.
- There was a 23.9 percent decrease in the rate of commitments to the CRC and a 33.3 percent decrease in the rate of commitments to the CYA.

In 2004, of 65,533 adults committed to state institutions:

- New commitments accounted for 72.8 percent (47,689).
- Parolees/outpatients returned with new commitments accounted for 27.2 percent (17,844).

#### And.

- Commitments to CDC accounted for 98.6 percent (64,635).
- Commitments to CRC accounted for 1.3 percent (842).
- Commitments to CYA accounted for 0.1 percent (56).

After decreasing for three straight years, the rate of adults committed to state institutions has increased the last two years.

# EXPENDITURES & PERSONNEL

## HOW ARE EXPENDITURE AND PERSONNEL DATA REPORTED?

Expenditure data are obtained from the State of California *Governor's Budget* and the annual report of financial transactions concerning cities and counties in California. Both reports are provided by the Controller of the State of California.


Included in the criminal justice expenditures are salaries and employee benefits, services, and supplies. Capital outlay expenditures are excluded. Expenditures by the Department of Justice and regulatory agencies are also excluded.

Personnel data are obtained from the State of California *Governor's Budget*, the annual report of the Administrative Office of the Courts, and personnel surveys (one-day counts) conducted by staff of the Department of Justice. Personnel counts for the Department of Justice and other regulatory agencies are not included.

Note: The 2003/04 expenditure data were not available from the Controller of the State of California in time for inclusion in this publication. Therefore, charts and narrative for expenditure data cover the four-year period, 1998/99 to 2002/03, only. Expenditure data obtained from the *Governor's Budget* (state agencies) are displayed in Table 51 in the Data Tables Section.

## **Expenditures**

Criminal justice expenditures are shown in both current and constant dollars.

#### Comparing fiscal year 1998/99 to 2002/03:

■ There was a 24.5 percent increase in current-dollar expenditures and a 9.3 percent increase in constant-dollar expenditures.

Constant dollars are adjusted to reduce the effects of inflation. The State and Local Government Implicit National Deflator, provided by the California Department of Finance, is used to make this adjustment. Fiscal year 1980/81 is used as the base year.


## **Expenditures (continued)**

#### Comparing fiscal year 1998/99 to 2002/03:

- Law enforcement agency expenditures increased 30.1 percent.
- Corrections expenditures increased 29.3 percent.
- Prosecution agency expenditures decreased 22.9 percent.
- Public defense agency expenditures increased 29.2 percent.
- Courts and court-related expenditures increased 3.0 percent.

The 22.9 percent decrease in prosecution expenditures is the result of an organizational shift. Assembly Bill 196 (1999) required that countylevel child support programs, previously administered by district attorneys, be operated by local child support agencies.



For the last five fiscal years in which expenditure data were available, the average current-dollar expenditures reported by criminal justice agencies showed that:

- Law enforcement spent 47.5 percent.
- Prosecution spent 5.7 percent.
- Public defense spent 2.4 percent.
- Courts and court-related agencies spent 6.2 percent.
- State and local corrections spent 38.3 percent.

# PERSONNE

#### **Personnel**

Data for full-time personnel were obtained from one-day annual surveys and from the Governor's Budget.

#### Comparing 1999 to 2004:


- Total reported criminal justice full-time personnel increased 3.4 percent.
- Law enforcement personnel increased 9.8 percent.
- Corrections personnel increased 6.0 percent.
- Prosecution personnel decreased 44.4 percent.
- Public defense personnel decreased 3.2 percent.
- Court personnel increased 1.9 percent.

#### From 2003 to 2004:

- Total reported criminal justice full-time personnel decreased 1.4 percent.
- Law enforcement personnel decreased 1.8 percent.
- Corrections personnel decreased 0.5 percent.
- Prosecution personnel decreased 3.3 percent.
- Public defense personnel decreased 1.5 percent.
- Court personnel remained the same.

The 44.4 percent decrease in prosecution personnel since 1999 is the result of an organizational shift. The passage of Assembly Bill 196 (1999) required that county-level child support programs, previously administered by district attorneys, be operated by local child support agencies.


**CRIMINAL JUSTICE** FULL-TIME PERSONNEL, 1999-2004 By Type of Agency


## Citizens' Complaints Against **Peace Officers**

Section 13012 of the Penal Code states, "The annual report of the department provided for in Section 13010 shall contain statistics showing: . . . (e) The number of citizens complaints received by law enforcement agencies under Section 832.5. These statistics shall indicate the total number of these complaints, the number alleging criminal conduct of either a felony or misdemeanor, and the number sustained in each category. The report shall not contain a reference to any individual agency but shall be by gross numbers only . . . . "

Section 832.5(a) of the Penal Code requires that "Each department or agency in this state that employs peace officers shall establish a procedure to investigate complaints by members of the public against the personnel of such departments or agencies, and shall make a written description of the procedure available to the public."

Because of the nature of the requirements of Penal Code section 832.5, reporting definitions and procedures vary among individual reporting agencies. The data shown are accurate and complete to the extent that contributing agencies met their reporting obligations.



#### **Domestic Violence**

Effective January 1, 1986, in compliance with Penal Code section 13730(a), law enforcement agencies began reporting monthly the number of domestic violence-related calls for assistance and indicating which cases involved the use of a weapon. This information is reported to the Attorney General.

Section 13730(b) of the Penal Code also instructs the Attorney General to report annually on the number of domestic violence-related calls received statewide, in each county, and by individual law enforcement agencies. Statewide data are reported here. County and agency-level data will be published in the Criminal Justice Profile, 2004 publication series.

Domestic violence is defined as "... abuse committed against an adult or a fully emancipated minor who is a spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, or person with whom the suspect has had a child or is having or has had a dating or engagement relationship." [13700(b) PC]

Within this definition, abuse is further defined as "... intentionally or recklessly causing or attempting to cause bodily injury, or placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent serious bodily injury to himself or herself, or another." [13700(a) PC]

#### DATA CHARACTERISTICS AND KNOWN LIMITATIONS

### CRIMES Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR)

- Crime data from the UCR Program have been published continuously for 51 years and are available in a somewhat consistent format since 1952.
- The number of reported homicide, forcible rape, and aggravated assault crimes represents known victims, while for robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson, the number represents known incidents.
- In 2003, larceny-theft over \$400 was added to the property crime category to give a more representative depiction of crime in California. Since these data have only been available since 1983, property crime data from 1983 to 2003 have been adjusted. Therefore, property crime data presented in this report will differ from data published previously.
- If multiple crimes occur during the same event, only the most serious (based upon a hierarchy) is counted. Arson is the exception.

### ARRESTS Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (MACR)

- Arrest data from the MACR reporting system date back to 1957. Prior to 1957, only adult felony arrest data were available.
- If a person is arrested for multiple offenses, MACR selects only the most serious offense, based on the severity of possible punishment.
- Felony arrest counts may include some misdemeanor warrants for felony offenses.
- The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ethnic group data.
- Beginning in 2004, the race/ethnic group "other" includes the Department of Finance's new race/ethnic group of "multi-racial."
- The Bakersfield Police Department was unable to provide arrest data for February through December 1995. The 1995 estimates for this agency were calculated by averaging the number of arrests reported for 1992, 1993, and 1994. The Oakland Police Department was unable to provide any arrest data for 1995. This department requested that the number of arrests reported by their agency for 1994 be reduced by five percent to create 1995 estimates. Estimates by both agencies were added to the 1995 statewide MACR master file count for trend tables.

### ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS)

- Disposition data from the OBTS system are available from 1975. The OBTS system, which began with a 25 percent sample in four counties in 1973, became operational on a statewide basis in 1975. All 58 counties were reporting by 1978.
- OBTS data are grouped by the year of disposition regardless of the year in which the arrest occurred.
- Adult Felony Arrest Disposition data represent final dispositions equal to approximately 65-75 percent of the total adult felony arrests made during a calendar year. Therefore, final dispositions may occur in a year following the year of arrest.
- The 1999 file was accessed in May 2001. The 2000 file was accessed in January 2002. The 2001 file was accessed in January 2003. The 2002 file was accessed in May 2004. The 2003 file was accessed in October 2004. The 2004 file was accessed in May 2005 and is considered preliminary.
- Caution should be used when comparing conviction and nonconviction dispositions since budget constraints necessitated the processing of conviction dispositions on a priority basis. The impact of this procedural change has yet to be determined.
- Only the final disposition of an arrest event is selected for statistical purposes. Intermediate dispositions (diversion programs, suspended proceedings, reopenings, retrials, or subsequent actions) are not included in OBTS data.
- If a person is arrested for multiple offenses, OBTS selects only the most serious offense, based on the severity of possible punishment. If there are multiple court dispositions, OBTS selects the most serious court disposition and the associated offense.
- OBTS data on state institutional commitments may vary from information compiled and reported by other state agencies because of differences in the data collection systems and criteria.
- The OBTS file includes some persons whose age at arrest was under 18. These minors received a final disposition in adult court under provisions of the Welfare and Institutions Code sections 602, 707(a), 707(b), 707(c), and 707.1(a).
- 2002 OBTS data for convictions by type of offense are not available due to a procedural change that allowed a large percentage of convictions to be incorrectly recorded as "all other offenses." This caused "violent," "property," and "drug" offenses to be under-recorded and "all other offenses" to be over-recorded.

#### **ADULT CORRECTIONS**

- Adult corrections data are compiled from a number of sources and are complete from 1966. State supervision data are available from 1960, and state institutional data are available from 1952.
- The source for county and city jail data is now the California Board of Corrections (BOC), "Jail Profile Survey." Data will not match previously published data due to the change in data source.
- Counts may not add to the total due to projections and rounding of numbers made by the BOC.
- CJSC jail population counts in this publication are based on type II, III, and IV facilities only. Some juveniles may be included.
- Probation data include adults placed on supervised probation only. Court probation, diversion, and summary probation are not included.
- Persons are counted once for each jurisdiction. Therefore, data include original grants of probation and do not include subsequent grants of probation to persons already under probation supervision ordered by the same level court in the same county. Also, the probationers under jurisdiction of both superior and lower courts (or unified courts) and any who are jurisdictional cases of more than one county are counted more than one time in statewide totals.
- For 2001, data submitted by San Bernardino County and Yolo County were missing three months of reporting due to data system problems. San Francisco County did not report data for 2001 due to data system problems.
- For 2002, data submitted by Marin County was missing two months of reporting due to data system problems. San Francisco County did not report data for 2002 due to data system problems.
- For 2003, Contra Costa, Siskiyou, Tulare, and Yolo counties did not report misdemeanor counts resulting in active probation cases. San Francisco County did not report data for 2003 due to data system problems and budgetary issues.
- For 2004, Contra Costa, Merced, Siskiyou, Tulare, and Yolo counties did not report misdemeanor counts resulting in active probation cases. San Francisco County did not report data for 2004.
- In addition to the CRC, Civil Narcotic Addicts are also housed at 10 other facilities: Central California Women's Facility, California Institute for Men, California Institute for Women, Deuel Vocational Institution, High Desert State Prison, North Kern State Prison, San Quentin, Substance Abuse Treatment Facility, Valley State Prison, and Wasco State Prison.

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE EXPENDITURES AND PERSONNEL

- Expenditure data, as published in previous CJSC publications, are available from the 1967/68 fiscal year, while personnel data are available from 1969.
- The UCR definition specifies that law enforcement agencies should only report personnel paid by funds designated for law enforcement.
- Expenditure data for 2003/2004 were not available from the Office of the State Controller in time for inclusion in this publication.
- The 1996 data collection survey forms were revised in an attempt to collect counts on the number of criminal justice personnel employed by prosecutors, public defenders, and probation departments, regardless of the funding source. Prior to 1996, counts excluded state- and federally-funded positions.

#### CITIZENS' COMPLAINTS AGAINST PEACE OFFICERS

- Citizens' Complaints Against Peace Officers has been collected since 1981. Data are available in a statewide total only.
- Because of the nature of the requirements of Penal Code section 832.5, reporting definitions and procedures may vary among individual reporting agencies.
- Based on a survey conducted in 2004, it is estimated that complaints from inmates in prisons and jails may constitute approximately one-third of all complaints reported by law enforcement agencies.

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- Reporting of Domestic Violence-Related Calls for Assistance began in July 1986. The first full year of reporting was 1987.
- The definition of "domestic violence" is subject to varying interpretations by law enforcement agencies. As a result, different types of domestic relationships are included in the database.
- San Francisco Police Department did not report data from April 1997 to December 1999.
- Included in the data are any cases which resulted in a report being written by the responding law enforcement agencies. Data, therefore, include both cases where an arrest was made and those where circumstances did not warrant an arrest.
- In April 2002, law enforcement agencies were given clarification about reporting personal weapons. This corresponds to a notable decrease in the number of personal weapons reported.

# APPENDIX 2

#### **COMPUTATIONAL FORMULAS**

#### **CRIMES**

**Crime rate** - A crime rate describes the number of crimes reported to law enforcement agencies per 100,000 total population. A crime rate is calculated by dividing the number of reported crimes by the total population. The result is multiplied by 100,000. For example, in 2004 there were 61,573 robberies in California and the population was 36,590,814. This equals a robbery crime rate of 168.3 per 100,000 general population.

$$\frac{61,573}{36,590,814} = .0016827 \times 100,000 = 168.3$$

**Clearance rate** - A clearance rate describes the percentage of clearances reported to the number of crimes reported. A clearance rate is calculated by dividing the number of clearances by the number of crimes reported. The result is multiplied by 100. For example, in 2004 there were 1,314 clearances for homicide crimes and 2,394 homicides reported. This equals a homicide clearance rate of 54.9 percent.

$$\frac{1,314}{2.394}$$
 = .54887 x 100 = 54.9 percent

#### **ARRESTS**

**Arrest rate** - An arrest rate describes the number of arrests made by law enforcement agencies per 100,000 total population or per 100,000 population considered to be at risk for arrest. Regardless of the population used, both rates are calculated in the same manner. An arrest rate is calculated by dividing the number of reported arrests by the desired population. The result is multiplied by 100,000. For example, in 2004 there were 522,781 total felony arrests. The total population was 36,590,814 and the population at risk (10-69) was 28,357,204.

$$\frac{522,781}{36,590,814} = .014287 \times 100,000 = 1,428.7 \text{ per } 100,000 \text{ population}$$

$$\frac{522,781}{28,357,204} = .0184355 \times 100,000 = 1,843.6 \text{ per } 100,000 \text{ population at risk}$$

#### ADULT FELONY ARREST DISPOSITIONS

**Conviction rate** - A conviction rate describes the proportion of defendants convicted within a given population. Conviction rates are computed using two different bases: total dispositions and total complaints filed. Both are calculated in the same manner. The total number of convictions is divided by the desired population and multiplied by 100. For example, 225,217 adult felony arrests resulted in a conviction in 2004. There were 322,699 total felony arrest dispositions and 270,738 total complaints filed. The conviction rate for total felony arrest dispositions was 69.8 percent and for total complaints filed was 83.2 percent.

$$\frac{225,217}{322,699}$$
 = .697916 x 100 = 69.8 percent of total felony arrest dispositions  $\frac{225,217}{270,738}$  = .831863 x 100 = 83.2 percent of total complaints filed

#### **ADULT CORRECTIONS**

**Adult correction rate** - An adult correction rate describes the number of adults under supervision per 100,000 adult at-risk population. An adult correction rate is calculated by dividing the number of adults under supervision by the adult population at risk (18-69). The result is multiplied by 100,000. For example, in 2004 there were 703,324 adults under state and local supervision and the adult population at risk was 23,906,564. This equals an adult correction rate of 2,942.0 per 100,000 population at risk.

$$\frac{703,324}{23,906,564} = .029419 \times 100,000 = 2,942.0$$

#### **ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

**Percent change** - A percent change describes the change in number or rate from one year to another. A percent change is calculated by subtracting the base-year data from the current-year data. The result is divided by the base-year data and multiplied by 100. For example, in 2004 the robbery crime rate was 168.3. In 1999 the robbery crime rate was 176.4. The percent change in rate from 1999 to 2004 is a 4.6 percent decrease.

$$\frac{168.3 - 176.4}{176.4} = -.045918 \times 100 = -4.6 \text{ percent}$$

**Populations at risk** - The Arrest section of this report includes three comparison populations: total (10-69 years of age), adult (18-69 years of age), and juvenile (10-17 years of age).

When a series of rates are calculated using different populations, the rate calculated for the total will not be equal to the sum of the rates for the parts. For example, the arrest rate calculated using the total at-risk population will not equal the juvenile arrest rate (based on the juvenile at-risk population) plus the adult arrest rate (based on the adult at-risk population).

Also, the percent changes calculated for these at-risk rates cannot be added. This is because the percent change in the total arrest rate is the result of independent changes in both the number of arrests and the at-risk populations of adults and juveniles.

#### NOTES

*Crime in California* presents statistics showing the amounts and types of offenses known to public authorities and the administrative actions taken by the criminal justice system. For 52 years, *Crime in California* has provided information on crimes and the criminal justice process. The collection and publication of these data are mandated by California Penal Code sections 13010-13012.

- Crime and arrest rates are calculated using annual population estimates provided by the Demographic Research Unit, California Department of Finance. Beginning in 2004, population estimates are based on the 2000 Census. Population estimates for 1990 through 2003 are based on the 1990 Census. Readers are advised to exercise care in interpreting changes in percent and rate between decennial census samples.
- A number of factors can influence counts in particular jurisdictions. These factors should be considered when using crime statistics, especially for comparative purposes.

Variations in composition of the population, particularly age structure.

Population density and size of locality and its surrounding area.

Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting patterns, and transient factors.

Modes of transportation and highway system.

Economic conditions, including median income and job availability.

Cultural conditions, such as education, recreation, and religious characteristics.

Family conditions with respect to divorce and family cohesiveness.

Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.

Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).

Attitudes of citizenry toward crime.

Crime reporting practices of citizenry.

Illegal drug supply, cost, and demand.

- Historical data are included in this Crime in California report to provide long-term trend data. The time periods for which data are available vary from database to database depending upon the date each program was instituted. For additional information, see Appendix 1, Data Characteristics and Known Limitations, on pages 168-169.
- Since 1952, there have been many changes in laws and data collection procedures. For instance, in 1986 legislation was enacted which required reporting domestic violence as criminal conduct. As a result, the aggravated assault rate increased over 35 percent in one year. These types of changes should be considered when comparing data.

## APPENDIX 5

#### CRIMINAL JUSTICE GLOSSARY

**ACQUITTAL:** a judgment of a court, based either on the verdict of a jury or a judicial officer, that the defendant is not guilty of the offense(s) for which he/she was tried.

**ADJUDICATION:** the formal hearing and settling of a case by judicial procedure.

ADULT: a person 18 years of age or older.

**AGGRAVATED ASSAULT:** an unlawful attack or attempted attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm (UCR definition).

**APPEAL:** a petition initiated by a defendant for a rehearing in an appellate court regarding a previous sentence or motion.

**ARREST:** ". . . taking a person into custody, in a case and in the manner authorized by law. An arrest may be made by a peace officer or by a private person." (834 PC)

**ARREST RATE:** the number of arrests per 100,000 population. See computational formulas page for further explanation.

**ARSON:** any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. (UCR definition).

AUTOMATED CRIMINAL HISTORY SYSTEM (ACHS): a centralized, automated system containing criminal history summary information on persons arrested and fingerprinted in California.

AVERAGE DAILY JAIL POPULATION: the average number of inmates housed in a local facility per day. The number includes inmates housed in single cells, double cells, dormitories (multiple occupancy cells), disabled housing, disciplinary segregation, and administrative segregation. The values reported are based upon each facility's "early morning" count. See Type I, II, III, and IV Facilities.

**BOARD OF CORRECTIONS (BOC):** the state agency which develops and maintains standards for the construction and operation of local jail and juvenile detention facilities.

**BURGLARY:** the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted burglary is included (UCR definition).

**CALIFORNIA CRIME INDEX (CCI):** a group of offenses chosen to serve as an index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. These offenses, chosen because of their seriousness and likelihood of being reported to the police by the public, are willful homicide,

forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and motor vehicle theft. These offenses are reported according to definitions taken from the FBI's *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook*. (Use suspended in 2003.)

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (CDC): the state agency that has jurisdiction over the California Rehabilitation Center and the California prison system.

**CALIFORNIA REHABILITATION CENTER (CRC):** an institution operated by the California Department of Corrections, which is designated for the treatment of persons addicted to narcotics or in imminent danger of addiction. Commitment to the facility is by civil procedure only.

#### CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF THE YOUTH AUTHORITY

**(CYA):** the state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from criminal courts.

**CASELOAD:** the total number of clients or cases on probation or under supervision with a given agency.

**CHARGE:** a formal allegation that a specific person has committed a specific offense.

**CITATION:** a written order, issued by the police for a violation, to appear before a magistrate or probation officer at a later date.

**CIVIL COMMITMENT:** a type of commitment in which criminal proceedings are suspended while a defendant undergoes treatment at the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC) as a narcotic addict.

**CLEARANCE:** an offense is cleared or "solved" for crime reporting purposes when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to the court for prosecution or cited to juvenile authorities. In certain situations a clearance may be counted by "exceptional means" when the police definitely know the identity of the offender, have enough information to support an arrest, and know the location of the offender but for some reason cannot take the offender into custody.

**CLEARANCE RATE:** method used to determine the percentage of crimes cleared. The rate is based on the number of crimes reported.

**COMBINED CASES:** cases declined by the prosecutor in favor of other counts/cases.

**COMMITMENT:** a warrant, order, or process by which the court directs a judicial officer to take a person to a correctional facility.

**COMPLAINT:** a verified written accusation, filed by a prosecuting attorney with a local criminal court, which

charges one or more persons with the commission of one or more offenses.

**CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE:** a drug, substance, or immediate precursor which is included in Schedules I through V inclusive, as set forth in Health and Safety Code Sections 11054 through 11058. These would include heroin, marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, and psychedelics.

**CONVICTION:** a judgment, based either on the verdict of a jury or a judicial officer or on the guilty plea of the defendant, that the defendant is guilty.

**CORRECTIONS:** those agencies or facilities concerned with the custody, confinement, supervision, or treatment of alleged or adjudicated offenders.

**COURT:** an agency of the judicial branch of government, authorized or established by statute or constitution, having one or more judicial officers on its staff. A court has the authority to decide upon controversies in law and disputed matters of fact brought before it. Because of court consolidation we no longer distinguish between lower court and superior court.

CRC: see California Rehabilitation Center.

**CRIME:** "... an act committed or omitted in violation of a law forbidding or commanding it. .." (15 PC).

**CRIME INDEX:** crimes chosen to serve as an index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. See California Crime Index and FBI Crime Index. (Use suspended in 2003.)

**CRIME RATE:** the number of reported crimes per 100,000 general population. See computational formulas page for further explanation.

**CRIMINAL COMMITMENT:** a type of commitment which results when a defendant is sentenced to prison or the California Department of the Youth Authority.

**CYA:** see California Department of the Youth Authority.

**DEFENDANT:** a person against whom a criminal proceeding is pending.

**DEFERRED PAROLE REVOCATION:** action taken by a prosecutor to revoke the parole status of an offender to return the subject to state prison in lieu of filing new charges.

**DELINQUENT ACTS:** those acts described under Welfare and Institutions Code section 602 which involve violations by a juvenile of any law or ordinance defining crime, or the violation of a court order of the juvenile court.

**DETERMINATE SENTENCING:** sentencing which, by law, requires imposition of a prescribed term of imprisonment.

**DISMISSAL:** a decision by a judicial officer to terminate a case without a determination of guilt or innocence.

**DISPOSITION - COURT:** an action taken as the result of an appearance in court by a defendant. Examples are: adults - dismissed, acquitted, or convicted and sentenced; juveniles - dismissed, transferred, remanded to adult court, placed on probation, or sentenced to the California Department of the Youth Authority.

**DISPOSITION - LAW ENFORCEMENT:** an action taken as the result of an arrest. Examples of police dispositions are: adults - released by law enforcement, referred to another jurisdiction, or a misdemeanor or felony complaint sought; juveniles - handled within the department, referred to another agency, or referred to the probation department or juvenile court.

**DISPOSITION - PROSECUTOR:** an action taken as the result of complaints which were requested by the arresting agency. Dispositions include granting a misdemeanor or a felony complaint, or denying a complaint for such reasons as lack of corpus, lack of sufficient evidence, interest of justice, complainant refuses to testify, witness unavailable, inadmissible search, deferred parole revocation, prefiling deferral and other.

**DIVERSION:** a disposition of a criminal defendant either before adjudication or following adjudication but prior to sentencing, in which the court directs the defendant to participate in a work, educational, or rehabilitation program.

**DIVERSION DISMISSED:** the successful completion of a diversion program.

**DRUGS:** see Controlled Substance.

**FBI CRIME INDEX:** the FBI chose seven crimes to serve as an index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. These offenses include homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth index offense in 1979. (Use suspended in 2003.)

**FELONY:** a crime which is punishable with death or by imprisonment in the state prison (17 & 18 PC).

**FILING:** a document filed with the court clerk by a prosecuting attorney alleging that a person committed or attempted to commit a crime.

**FINE:** the penalty imposed upon a convicted person by a court requiring the payment of a specified sum of money.

**FORCIBLE RAPE:** the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are included (UCR definition).

**GRANT:** the act of placing an adult on probation.

**GUILTY PLEA:** a defendant's formal answer in open court to charge(s) in a complaint, indictment, or information stating that the charge(s) is true and that he/she has committed the offense(s) as charged.

# APPENDIX 5

**HOMICIDE:** the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter are included (UCR definition).

**INCIDENT-BASED DATA SYSTEM:** a data collection method which provides unique data for each recorded event (e.g., Monthly Arrest and Citation Register database).

**INFRACTION:** an offense punishable by fine or other penalty, but not by incarceration.

**JAIL:** a county or city facility for incarceration of sentenced and unsentenced persons. See Type I, II, III, and IV Facilities.

**JURISDICTION:** the territory, subject matter, or person over which lawful authority may be exercised.

JUVENILE: a person under the age of 18.

**LARCENY-THEFT:** the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession of another (except embezzlement, fraud, forgery, and worthless checks) (UCR definition).

**LOCAL SUPERVISION:** local correctional agencies provide confinement, rehabilitation, and probation services for those sentenced to their care and also house persons awaiting trial or sentencing.

MANDATORY SENTENCING: sentencing mandated by law which limits judicial discretion for specific offenses and/or convicted offenders.

**MISDEMEANOR:** a crime punishable by imprisonment in a county jail for up to one year.

MONTHLY ARREST AND CITATION REGISTER (MACR): a reporting system used to collect information on adult and juvenile arrests and citations by police and sheriffs' departments. This register contains data on arrest offenses, arrestee characteristics (age, gender, and race/ethnic group), and law enforcement dispositions.

**MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT:** the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle (UCR definition).

NOT AGGRAVATED (SIMPLE) ASSAULT: assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon is used and which do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim (UCR definition).

**OFFENDER-BASED TRANSACTION STATISTICS (OBTS):** a system designed to collect statistical information on the various processes within the criminal justice system that occur between the point of the felony arrest of an adult and the point of final disposition.

**OFFENSE:** the charged offense is the crime for which the defendant was arrested or filed on by the district attorney. The convicted offense is the offense the defendant was convicted

of or pled guilty to in court. The sustained offense is the offense for which the juvenile court sustains a petition.

**OUTPATIENT:** a period of supervision following release from the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC).

**PAROLE:** an added period of control following release from prison (3000(a) PC).

**PAROLE VIOLATION:** violation of one or more of the conditions of parole or an illegal act for which parole is revoked rather than proceeding with criminal prosecution. See Deferred Parole Revocation.

**PC** (**PENAL CODE**): the California Penal Code contains statutes that define criminal offenses and specify corresponding punishments along with criminal justice system mandates and procedures.

**PETITION TO REVOKE PROBATION:** action taken by a prosecutor to revoke the probation status of an offender to return the subject to county jail or state prison.

**POPULATION AT RISK:** that portion of the total population, who because of like characteristics to the specific study group, are considered "at risk." For example, if one were studying juvenile arrestees, all persons between 10 and 17 years of age would constitute the at-risk population.

**PRE-FILING DEFERRAL:** action taken by a prosecutor to defer the filing of felony charges against a first-time offender who committed a less serious felony. A case is filed but there is no further disposition until the subject completes a diversionary program (e.g., support group, rehabilitation program).

**PRISON:** a state correctional facility where persons are confined following conviction for a felony offense.

**PROBATION:** a judicial requirement that a person fulfill certain conditions of behavior in lieu of a sentence to confinement. See Straight Probation.

**PROBATION WITH JAIL:** a type of disposition given upon conviction which imposes a jail term as a condition of probation.

PROBATION REVOCATION: see Petition to Revoke Probation.

**PROPERTY CRIMES:** crimes against property. This category includes burglary, motor vehicle theft, and larceny-theft over \$400.

**PROPERTY OFFENSES:** arrest offenses for crimes against property. This category includes burglary, theft; motor vehicle theft; forgery, check, and access card offenses; and arson.

**PROSECUTOR:** an attorney employed by a governmental agency whose official duty is to initiate and maintain criminal proceedings on behalf of the government against persons accused of committing criminal offenses.

**PUNISHMENT:** penalty imposed for wrong doing; varies by type of crime committed. See Felony, Misdemeanor, and Infraction.

**RATE:** a comparison of a number of events to a population.

**REMOVAL:** a case removed from an active caseload and no longer under the supervision of the probation department or a case not removed but escalated to a more advanced level of supervision.

**REVOCATION:** cancellation or suspension of parole or probation.

**REVOKE:** to withdraw, repeal, or cancel probation or parole for an adult.

**ROBBERY:** the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by creating fear in the victim (UCR definition).

**SECONDARY GRANT:** a subsequent grant of probation in the same court for an adult still on probation for the initial grant.

**SENTENCE:** the penalty imposed by a court upon a convicted person.

**STATE INSTITUTION:** a facility for housing defendants who are under the jurisdiction of state correctional or treatment programs.

STATE SUPERVISION: the state correctional system provides confinement, rehabilitation, and parole services. The principal provider of these services for adults is the California Department of Corrections (CDC), which includes the California Rehabilitation Center (CRC). Based on special circumstances, some adult offenders are placed in the California Youth Authority (CYA) and California Department of Mental Health (CDMH).

**STATUS OFFENDER:** a juvenile who has been adjudicated by a judicial officer of a juvenile court as having committed a status offense.

**STATUS OFFENSE**: an act or conduct, described by Welfare and Institutions Code section 601, which is declared by statute to be an offense but only when committed or engaged in by a juvenile and which can be adjudicated only in juvenile court.

**STRAIGHT PROBATION:** probation granted to adults without condition or stipulation that the defendant serve time in jail as a condition of probation.

**SUBSEQUENT DISPOSITION:** a judicial decision or sentence given at the time of a court return.

SUBSEQUENT GRANT: see Secondary Grant.

**SUMMARY DATA SYSTEM:** a data collection method based on the sum of the number of events/counts which occur in a specified period of time (e.g., Uniform Crime Reporting data base).

**SUSTAINED:** to affirm or approve as when an appellate court sustains the decision of a lower court.

**SWORN PERSONNEL:** a full-time employee of a law enforcement agency who has sworn to carry out law enforcement duties and has full arrest powers.

**TERMINATED:** satisfactorily completed specified term of probation.

TYPE I FACILITY: a local detention facility used for detainment of persons for not more than 96 hours after booking, excluding holidays. Type I facilities may also detain persons on a court order, for either their own safekeeping or sentence persons to a city jail as an inmate worker. This facility may also house inmate workers sentenced to the county jail, provided such placement in the facility is made voluntarily by the inmate. As used in this section, they define an inmate worker as a person assigned to do designed tasks outside his/her cell or dormitory, pursuant to the written policy of the facility, for a minimum of four hours each day on a five-day scheduled work week.

**TYPE II FACILITY:** a local detention facility for the detention of persons pending an arraignment, during a trial, or a sentence of commitment.

**TYPE III FACILITY:** a local detention facility used only for persons convicted and sentenced.

**TYPE IV FACILITY:** a local detention facility or portion of it designated for the housing of inmates eligible under Penal Code section 1208 for work/education furlough and/or other programs involving inmate access into the community.

**UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING (UCR):** a federal reporting system which provides data on crime based on police statistics submitted by law enforcement agencies throughout the nation. DOJ administers and forwards the data for California to the federal program.

**VIOLATION:** breach or infringement of the terms or conditions of probation.

**VIOLENT CRIMES:** crimes against persons. This category includes homicide, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

**VIOLENT OFFENSES:** arrest offenses for crimes against people. This category includes homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, and kidnapping.

**YOUTH AUTHORITY:** see California Department of the Youth Authority.

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
