
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### JUVENILE JUSTICE IN CALIFORNIA, 2007



### The role of the Criminal Justice Statistics Center is to:

- ☐ Collect, analyze, and report statistical data which provide valid measures of crime and the criminal justice process.
- ☐ Examine these data on an ongoing basis to better describe crime and the criminal justice system.
- ☐ Promote the responsible presentation and use of crime statistics.

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### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The California Department of Justice (DOJ) is responsible for collecting and reporting statistics on juvenile justice in California. The *Juvenile Justice in California 2007* provides insight to the juvenile justice process by reporting information on the number of arrests, referrals to probation departments, petitions filed, and dispositions for juveniles tried in juvenile and adult courts. Law enforcement agencies provided information on the number of arrests, and probation departments provided information on the types of offenses and administrative actions taken by juvenile and adult courts. As a comprehensive source of accurate statistics, this report is of value to anyone needing information on juveniles and the administration of juvenile justice in California.

Since 1947, the Criminal Justice Statistics Center of the DOJ has been compiling and publishing data relating to California's Juvenile Justice System. *Juvenile Justice in California 2007* reflects data extracted from the Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical System. See Appendix 1 for details on the complete evolution of this system. Statistics reported in *Juvenile Justice in California 2007* are a result of data submitted by 56 of California's 58 counties, representing 99 percent of the state's juvenile population. Del Norte and Sierra counties were unable to provide data and, thus, are not included in this report.

This Executive Summary provides highlights from the overall results of each reportable area as noted below. Following is a description of each category and selected findings. Comprehensive and detailed information for these topics can be found in the Data Analysis Section of this report. The Data Tables Section of the report includes statistical data for the current year.

### **Arrests**

The Arrest Section (pages 3-13) provides data on reported juvenile arrests made by law enforcement personnel in 2007.

- More than half of the juveniles were arrested for a misdemeanor offense (56.8 percent). Another quarter were arrested for a felony offense (27.9 percent), and the remainder (15.2 percent) were arrested for a status offense.
- ☐ Eight out of ten juveniles arrested (80.1 percent) were referred to county juvenile probation departments.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

# The Referral Section (pages 15–27) provides data on juveniles who have been brought to the attention of the county probation department in 2007. Nearly ninety percent (89.8 percent) of juveniles referred to county probation departments were referred by law enforcement agencies. Less than one-fourth (24.8 percent) of juveniles referred to county probation departments were detained. Over one-third (35.7 percent) of the juvenile cases referred to county probation departments were closed at intake, indicating that no further action was taken. One-half (50 percent) of the total juveniles referred to county probation departments resulted in the filing of a petition for formal juvenile court adjudication.

### **Petitions**

The Petition Section (pages 29-45) provides data on juveniles whose cases have proceeded for formal processing to the juvenile court in 2007.

- ☐ Of the juveniles handled formally by the juvenile court, the majority (60.5 percent) were made wards of the court.
- □ Nearly one-fifth (19.1 percent) of the petitions for formal juvenile court adjudication were dismissed.

### Adult Court Dispositions


The Adult Court Disposition Section (pages 47-53) provides data on juveniles processed through the adult court system.

☐ More than three-fourths (79.5 percent) of the juvenile dispositions filed in adult court resulted in a conviction in 2007.

### **Acknowledgment**

The DOJ is mandated by the Legislature to submit an annual *Juvenile Justice in California* report. The DOJ extends its appreciation to all of the law enforcement agencies who provided complete and timely data. This report would not have been possible without their cooperation.

At a Glance





# Data Analysis

### **Arrests**

A juvenile may be arrested for either violating a criminal statute or committing a status offense. Status offenses are acts that are offenses only when committed by a juvenile such as curfew violations, truancy, running away, and incorrigibility.

This section contains information on the 236,856 juvenile arrests reported by law enforcement agencies in 2007. It includes information on the characteristics of juvenile arrests and the final law enforcement dispositions of those arrests. Although some arrests involve more than one offense, only the most serious are shown in this report. Data for all 58 counties were extracted from the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register.

The law enforcement disposition of a juvenile arrest is affected by a number of variables including: investigative findings regarding the circumstances of the minor and the facts surrounding the alleged offense; prior arrest record; seriousness of the offense; determined need for admonishment; recourse to other authority; and other factors as determined by the individual case.

Three methods are available to law enforcement agencies for the disposition of a juvenile arrest:

- ☐ Juvenile arrests may be *referred to probation departments* for further processing. Some are handled at the probation level and others are sent to juvenile and criminal courts for final disposition.
- ☐ Juvenile arrests may be handled within the department, *counseled and released*.
- ☐ Juvenile arrests may be *turned over* to another agency.


Note: References to race/ethnicity will be made throughout this report. The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ethnic group data. As commonly used, race refers to large populations which share certain similar physical characteristics, such as skin color. Because these physical characteristics can vary greatly within groups as well as between groups, determination of race is frequently, by necessity, subjective. Ethnicity refers to cultural heritage and can cross-racial lines. For example, the ethnic designation "Hispanic" can include persons of any race. Most commonly, self-identification of race/ethnicity is used in the classification and labeling process.

### **LEVEL OF OFFENSE**

**In 2007**, of the 236,856 juvenile arrests reported:

- ☐ Felony arrests accounted for 27.9 percent (66,191).
- ☐ Misdemeanor arrests accounted for 56.8 percent (134,629).
- ☐ Status offense arrests accounted for 15.2 percent (36,036).


**In 2007**, of the 175,449 arrests of males:

- ☐ Felony arrests accounted for 31.3 percent (54,864).
- ☐ Misdemeanor arrests accounted for 55.3 percent (97,034).
- ☐ Status arrests accounted for 13.4 percent (23,551).

In 2007, of the 61,407 arrests of females:

- ☐ Felony arrests accounted for 18.4 percent (11,327).
- ☐ Misdemeanor arrests accounted for 61.2 percent (37,595).
- ☐ Status arrests accounted for 20.3 percent (12,485).

Figure 3 JUVENILE ARRESTS, 2007 Gender of Arrestee by Level of Offense




Figure 4 JUVENILE ARRESTS, 2007 Age Group of Arrestee by Level of Offense


- A greater percentage of whites were arrested for a misdemeanor (64.2 percent).
- ☐ A greater percentage of blacks were arrested for a felony (37.1 percent).

### **FELONY ARRESTS**

**In 2007**, of the 66,191 juvenile felony arrests reported:

- ☐ 27.3 percent (18,050) were for violent offenses.
- ☐ 8.3 percent (5,499) were for offenses involving drugs.



- ☐ Property offenses accounted for 49.0 percent (5,553).





### In 2007:

- Juveniles in each age group were arrested for similar proportions of violent and property offenses.
- ☐ Proportionately, juveniles in the 15–17 age group were more likely to be arrested for a felony drug offense than juveniles in the under 12 or 12–14 age group (9.9 vs. 1.0 and 4.1 percent, respectively).


- ☐ A greater percentage of whites were arrested for a felony drug offense (10.5 percent).
- ☐ A greater percentage of blacks were arrested for a felony violent offense (39.4 percent).
- □ Regardless of race/ethnic group, the smallest proportion of felony arrests were for drug offenses.

### **MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS**

**In 2007**, of the 134,629 juvenile misdemeanor arrests reported:

- ☐ 16.6 percent (22,337) were for assault and battery.
- ☐ 18.5 percent (24,856) were for theft offenses.
- ☐ 21.3 percent (28,742) were for drug and alcohol offenses.
- ☐ 20.4 percent (27,448) were for malicious mischief offenses.
- ☐ 23.2 percent (31,246) were for all other.

Figure 10 MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2007 By Category



### In 2007:

- Males were more likely to be arrested for a misdemeanor drug and alcohol offense than females (23.5 vs. 15.8 percent, respectively).
- ☐ Females were more likely to be arrested for a misdemeanor theft offense than males (30.7 vs. 13.7 percent, respectively).

Gender of Arrestee by Category




Figure 12 MISDEMEANOR ARRESTS, 2007 Age Group of Arrestee by Category

### In 2007:

□ A greater percentage of misdemeanor drug and alcohol arrestees were in the 15–17 age category than were juveniles under 12 and 12–14 (25.1 vs. 5.1 and 12.8 percent, respectively).


- A greater percentage of whites were arrested for a misdemeanor drug and alcohol offense (29.9 percent).
- A greater percentage of blacks were arrested for a misdemeanor assault and battery offense (22.7 percent).

### **STATUS OFFENSES**

**In 2007**, of the 36,036 status offenses reported:

- ☐ Curfew violations accounted for 58.6 percent (21,134).
- ☐ Runaways accounted for 11.2 percent (4,035).

Figure 14 STATUS OFFENSES, 2007 By Category





### In 2007:

- ☐ Males were more likely to be arrested for curfew violations than females (61.3 vs. 53.6 percent).
- □ Proportionately, females were more than twice as likely to be arrested for being a runaway than males (17.7 vs. 7.8 percent).

Figure 15 STATUS OFFENSES, 2007 Gender of Arrestee by Category





Figure 16 STATUS OFFENSES, 2007 Age Group of Arrestee by Category



### In 2007:

- ☐ A greater percentage of runaways were in the under 12 age group than were juveniles age 12–14 and 15–17 (26.7 vs. 15.9 and 9.6 percent, respectively).
- □ Juveniles in the 15–17 age group were more likely to be arrested for curfew violations than were those juveniles under 12 and 12–14 years of age (59.9 vs. 44.1 and 55.4 percent, respectively).

### In 2007:

Curfew violations made up the greatest percentage of status offenses for all race/ethnic groups.


### LAW ENFORCEMENT LEVEL DISPOSITIONS

When processing juvenile arrestees, law enforcement agencies may refer them to the probation department, counsel and release the juvenile, or turn them over to another agency.

**In 2007**, of the 236,856 law enforcement dispositions reported:

- 80.1 percent resulted in a referral to probation (189,731).
- 18.8 percent resulted in the juvenile being counseled and released (44,420).

By Type of Disposition



Figure 19 LAW ENFORCEMENT DISPOSITIONS, 2007 Gender by Disposition





### In 2007:

- ☐ The proportional breakdown of law enforcement dispositions were similar for each age group.
- Regardless of age group, the majority of juvenile offenders were referred to probation.

- More than 75 percent of juveniles in each race/ethnic group were referred to probation departments by law enforcement.
- ☐ Hispanics were more likely to be counseled and released than any other race/ethnic group (20.4 percent).

### Referrals

Juvenile referrals occur when a juvenile is brought to the attention of the probation department for a review of his or her case. They can be referred by a number of sources with the largest percentage of referrals coming from law enforcement. Referrals may also be generated by schools, parents, public or private agencies, individuals, or by transfers from another county or state.

Referrals to the probation department consist of two types: new and subsequent. The term "new referral" refers to a juvenile who is not currently supervised by the probation department and is typically a first-time offender. The term "subsequent referral" refers to a juvenile who is currently supervised by the probation department. A subsequent referral is generally the result of a new arrest or whether a violation of probation.

After a juvenile is referred to the probation department, a probation officer determines whether the juvenile should be detained or released. The probation department also conducts an investigation and determines whether: the case should be closed or transferred; the juvenile should be placed on informal probation; or whether a petition should be filed with the court.

This section examines referrals by gender, age group, and race/ethnic group. For the purpose of this section, the term "juvenile" refers to those individuals processed through the juvenile court system.

The data used in this section originated from the 56 participating county probation departments and was routed to the Department of Justice from referrals reported via the Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical System (see Appendix 2).

> Note: Arrest data is reported by law enforcement agencies, whereas law enforcement referral data is reported by probation departments. Comparisons between arrest data and referral data should not be made because of differences in the way data is reported between the two sources. ### **REFERRAL SOURCE AND TYPE**


**In 2007**, of the 203,526 referrals to probation reported:

- ☐ 89.8 percent (182,741) were from law enforcement.
- ☐ 1.9 percent (3,929) were from schools, parents, and private agencies and individuals.
- ☐ 4.7 percent (9,473) were from public agencies or individuals.
- ☐ 1.8 percent (3,615) were transfers from another county or state.
- ☐ 1.9 percent (3,768) were from other sources.

**In 2007**, of the 203,526 referrals reported:

- ☐ 73.7 percent (149,909) were new referrals.
- ☐ 26.3 percent (53,617) were subsequent referrals.


Figure 22 REFERRALS, 2007 By Source


Figure 23 REFERRALS, 2007 By Type



Figure 25 TYPE OF REFERRALS, 2007 By Category



Gender by Category




Figure 27 REFERRALS FOR FELONY OFFENSES, 2007 Age Group by Category

□ Regardless of age group, juveniles were most likely to be referred to probation departments for a felony property offense, and least likely for a felony drug offense.


- □ A greater percentage of whites were referred to the probation department for a property offense (44.0 percent).
- □ A greater percentage of blacks were referred to the probation department for a violent offense (37.2 percent).

**In 2007**, of the 144,394 misdemeanor referral offenses reported:

- ☐ 22.2 percent (32,048) were for assault and battery.
- ☐ 14.1 percent (20,294) were for theft offenses.
- ☐ 15.9 percent (22,922) were for drug and alcohol offenses.
- ☐ 18.6 percent (26,848) were for malicious mischief offenses.
- ☐ 29.2 percent (42,212) were for all other misdemeanor offenses.

By Category



### In 2007:

Gender by Category




Figure 31 REFERRALS FOR MISDEMEANOR OFFENSES, 2007 Age Group by Category

### In 2007:

- Juveniles under 12 years of age were twice as likely as juveniles in the 18-24 age group to be referred for a misdemeanor assault and battery (32.4 vs. 15.2 percent).
- The proportion of juveniles referred to probation departments for drug and alcohol offenses increased with age. Conversely. the proportion of juveniles referred to probation departments for assault and battery, theft, and malicious mischief decreased with age.

- ☐ Regardless of race/ethnic group, the percentage of referrals for assault and battery was greater than the percentage for theft offenses.
- ☐ A greater percentage of whites were referred to probation departments for a drug and alcohol offense than were any other race/ethnic group (23.9 percent).


**In 2007**, of the 29,841 referrals for status offenses:

- ☐ 12.4 percent (3,695) were for truancy.
- ☐ 9.9 percent (2,955) were for runaway.
- ☐ 2.4 percent (718) were for curfew.
- ☐ 1.7 percent (511) were for incorrigible.
- ☐ 73.6 percent (21,962) were for other status offenses.

**In 2007**, of all referrals for status offenses:

☐ 73.5 percent (21,929) were males, and 26.5 percent (7,912) were females.






Figure 35 REFERRALS FOR STATUS OFFENSES, 2007 By Age Group

- ☐ 13.4 percent (3,994) were for juveniles in the 18-24 age group.



**In 2007**, of the 192,207 known preadjudication detentions reported:

- ☐ 75.2 percent (144,523) of juveniles were not detained.
- ☐ 95.8 percent (45,705) of those juveniles detained were detained in a secure facility.









By Type





Gender by Disposition Type





### **Petitions**

In the juvenile justice system, a case may be handled informally by the probation department or formally by the juvenile court. If the case proceeds for formal processing, the District Attorney files a petition with the juvenile court to initiate court action.

There are two types of petitions filed in juvenile court: new and subsequent. The term "new petition" refers to a juvenile who is not being supervised by the probation department and is typically a first-time offender. The term "subsequent petition" refers to a juvenile who is currently being supervised by the probation department and subsequently re-offends.

This section examines petitions by gender, age group, race/ethnic group, offense, fitness hearings, and disposition.


The data used originated from the 56 participating county probation departments and was routed to the Department of Justice from referrals reported via the Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical System (see *Appendix 2*).


Figure 45 PETITIONS FILED, 2007 By Type



By Category

















By Category

















Figure 63 FITNESS HEARINGS, 2007 By Outcome




Figure 64 FITNESS HEARINGS, 2007 Gender by Outcome





By Type





Figure 68 JUVENILE COURT DISPOSITIONS, 2007 Gender by Type



Figure 69 JUVENILE COURT DISPOSITIONS, 2007 Age Group by Type







Figure 72 WARDSHIP PROBATION, 2007 Gender by Placement Type



Figure 73 WARDSHIP PROBATION, 2007 Age Group by Placement Type




Juveniles can be transferred to the adult justice system for prosecution if they fail a juvenile court fitness hearing, or at the discretion of the District Attorney. In 2007, probation departments reported information on 1,123 transfers to the adult system. The adult level disposition information discussed herein is for the 733 final dispositions received in 2007.

This section examines adult level dispositions by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition. The data used was obtained from the Department of Justice's Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) file. If a person is arrested for multiple offenses, OBTS selects only the most serious offense based on the severity of possible punishment. If there are multiple court dispositions, OBTS selects the most serious court disposition and the associated offense. (See additional data limitations in Appendix 2.)

Figure 75 ADULT COURT DISPOSITIONS, 2007 By Gender










Figure 80 ADULT COURT DISPOSITIONS, 2007 Age by Type of Disposition



Figure 82 ADULT COURT CONVICTIONS, 2007 By Type of Sentence








Figure 84 ADULT COURT CONVICTIONS, 2007 Age by Type of Sentence

# APPENDIX 1 BACKGROUND

The Department of Justice (DOJ), Criminal Justice Statistics Center, has been compiling and publishing data describing California's juvenile justice system since 1947. In 1969, the first computerized juvenile probation caseload file system was developed to receive information on juveniles who were supervised by probation departments or in detention facilities. The system was designed to track transactions that take place within the juvenile probation system and to provide information on the chain of events that depicted a juvenile's progress through the probation and court processes from the time of referral to final disposition. Individual transactions are linked together to form a comprehensive record of the court and probation activities for a single offender.

In 1979, in an effort to upgrade the first computerized data collection system, the Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical System (JCPSS) was developed as a pilot study. Ten counties participated in the initial study, and, in 1980, the pilot system was made operational statewide.

From 1980 to 1989, the JCPSS collected, compiled, and reported statistical data on the administration of juvenile justice in California by collecting individualized records on delinquent juveniles who were referred to California probation departments. These records contained information about the youth, referral source, referral offense, pre-adjudication detention, probation and court disposition, and current supervision status, and changes in prior supervision status. During this period, transaction reports were submitted at the time a disposition was made or when supervision was terminated.

In 1990, the JCPSS was discontinued because of budget reductions.

In 1995, with the help of Assemblyman Baca and the support of the Chief Probation Officers of California, Assembly Bill 488 was passed, directing the DOJ to reestablish the JCPSS. In June 1996, representatives from 14 probation departments and the DOJ met to

finalize the reporting standards and system development began. In January 1997, several probation departments were submitting data to the JCPSS data.

In 1999, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) recommended that the Legislature withhold 50 percent of the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funds from those probation departments not certified by the DOJ as submitting JCPSS data by March 2000. At that time, only 22 probation departments were submitting data to the JCPSS.

In 2000, the LAO again recommended that the Legislature withhold 50 percent of the TANF funds from those probation departments not certified by the DOJ as submitting JCPSS data by March 2001. In May 2000, a permanent JCPSS Advisory Committee was established to improve county participation and to discuss legislative changes affecting JCPSS; no funds were withheld.

In 2001, the Legislature directed the DOJ, via Senate Bill 314, to include in its annual juvenile justice report, statistics on the administrative actions taken by law enforcement agencies regarding juveniles whose cases were transferred to or directly adjudicated in adult criminal court. This legislation also prompted discussions concerning replacement of the existing JCPSS software provided to probation departments in 1996, with a webenabled application. In 2002, the web-enabled JCPSS application was developed and the DOJ began connecting county probation departments to the DOJ network the same year.

In 2003, the JCPSS web-application became fully operational. Probation departments were trained and data submission began. Currently, 57 counties are connected to the web-enabled application, with 56 of those counties submitting data. The DOJ continues to work with the remaining counties to achieve 100 percent participation.

# APPENDIX 2 DATA LIMITATIONS

# Arrests Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (MACR)

- ☐ If a person is arrested for multiple offenses, the MACR selects only the most serious offense based on the severity of possible punishment.
- ☐ Felony arrest counts may include some misdemeanor warrants for felony offenses.

### Referrals and Petitions Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical Systems (JCPSS)

- ☐ Each year there is a difference between the number of referrals to probation via the JCPSS and the number of juvenile arrests reported by law enforcement agencies as "referred to juvenile court and probation" via the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (MACR). The differences are due, in part, to the different programs and definitions used by law enforcement agencies and probation departments for submitting data to the Department of Justice. However, there are two primary reasons for the difference:
  - a. Probation departments report caseload information while law enforcement agencies report information on individual arrests.
  - b. The JCPSS counts only those juveniles who have a final disposition reported to the DOJ. Many probation departments divert juveniles out of the system into other "community based" programs. As a result, many juveniles who are diverted after being referred by law enforcement agencies are not reported on JCPSS.

- ☐ All juvenile referrals for law violations and status offenses are reported in the JCPSS.
- ☐ The information presented in this report represents the data received from 56 counties. Del Norte and Sierra counties were unable to provide data and are not included in the JCPSS portion of the report.
- ☐ Riverside County Probation Department reported low referral figures due to training issues.
- ☐ Adult disposition information includes those juveniles aged 14 to 17 at the time of a felony arrest, who received an adult level disposition in 2007. The number of adult dispositions received in 2007, that meet the above criteria, will not equal the number of juveniles transferred to the adult system for prosecution. Because of differences between the adult and juvenile systems, not every case transferred to the adult system is adjudicated in the same year. Many of the arrests occurred prior to 2007.
- ☐ In 2003, the JCPSS was modified to accept up to five offenses per referral or petition. Previously, the JCPSS would only accept the most serious offense per referral or petition.
- ☐ The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ ethnic group data. As commonly used, race refers to large populations that share certain similar physical characteristics such as skin color. Because these physical characteristics can vary greatly within groups as well as between groups, determination of race is frequently, by necessity, subjective. Ethnicity refers to cultural heritage and can cross racial lines. For example, the ethnic designation "Hispanic" includes persons of any race. Most commonly, self identification of race/ethnicity is used in the classification and labeling process.

# APPENDIX 3 PENAL CODE SECTIONS

### Welfare and Institutions Code section 285

All probation officers shall make periodic reports to the Attorney General at those times and in the manner prescribed by the Attorney General, provided that no names or social security numbers shall be transmitted regarding any proceeding under Section 300 or 601.

### Penal Code section 13010

It shall be the duty of the department:

- (a) To collect data necessary for the work of the department from all persons and agencies mentioned in Section 13020 and from any other appropriate source.
- (b) To prepare and distribute to all those persons and agencies, cards, forms, or electronic means used in reporting data to the department. The cards, forms, or electronic means may, in addition to other items, include items of information needed by federal bureaus or departments engaged in the development of national and uniform criminal statistics.
- (c) To recommend the form and content of records which must be kept by those persons and agencies in order to insure the correct reporting of data to the department.
- (d) To instruct those persons and agencies in the installation, maintenance, and use of those records and in the reporting of data therefrom to the department.
- (e) To process, tabulate, analyze and interpret the data collected from those persons and agencies.
- (f) To supply, at their request, to federal bureaus or departments engaged in the collection of national criminal statistics data they need from this state.

- (g) To present to the Governor, on or before July 1st, a printed annual report containing the criminal statistics of the preceding calendar year and to present at other times as the Attorney General may approve reports on special aspects of criminal statistics. A sufficient number of copies of all reports shall be printed or otherwise prepared to enable the Attorney General to send a copy to all public officials in the state dealing with criminals and to distribute them generally in channels where they will add to the public enlightenment.
- (h) To periodically review the requirements of units of government using criminal justice statistics, and to make recommendations for changes it deems necessary in the design of criminal justice statistics systems, including new techniques of collection and processing made possible by automation.

### Penal Code section 13010.5

The department shall collect data pertaining to the juvenile justice system for criminal history and statistical purposes. This information shall serve to assist the department in complying with the reporting requirement of subdivisions (c) and (d) of Section 13012, measuring the extent of juvenile delinquency, determining the need for and effectiveness of relevant legislation, and identifying long-term trends in juvenile delinquency. Any data collected pursuant to this section may include criminal history information which may be used by the department to comply with the requirements of Section 602.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.

# **APPENDIX 3** PENAL CODE SECTIONS

### Penal Code section 13012

The annual report of the department provided for in Section 13010 shall contain statistics showing all of the following:

- (a) The amount and the types of offenses known to the public authorities.
- (b) The personal and social characteristics of criminals and delinquents.
- (c) The administrative actions taken by law enforcement, judicial, penal, and correctional agencies or institutions, including those in the juvenile justice system, in dealing with criminals or delinguents.
- (d) The administrative actions taken by law enforcement, prosecutorial, judicial, penal, and correctional agencies, including those in the juvenile justice system, in dealing with minors who are the subject of a petition or hearing in the juvenile court to transfer their case to the jurisdiction of an adult criminal court or whose cases are directly filed or otherwise initiated in an adult criminal court.
- (e) The number of citizens' complaints received by law enforcement agencies under Section 832.5. These statistics shall indicate the total number of these complaints, the number alleging criminal conduct of either a felony or misdemeanor, and the number sustained in each category. The report shall not contain a reference to any individual agency but shall be by gross numbers only.

It shall be the duty of the department to give adequate interpretation of the statistics and so to present the information that it may be of value in guiding the policies of the Legislature and of those in charge of the apprehension, prosecution, and treatment of the criminals and delinquents, or concerned with the prevention of crime and delinguency. The report shall also include statistics which are comparable with national uniform criminal statistics published by federal bureaus or departments heretofore mentioned.

### Penal Code section 13012.5

- (a) The annual report published by the department under Section 13010 shall, in regard to the contents required by subdivision (d) of Section 13012, include the following statewide information:
- (1) The annual number of fitness hearings held in the juvenile courts under Section 707 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, and the outcomes of those hearings including orders to remand to adult criminal court, crossreferenced with information about the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors whose cases are the subject of those fitness hearings.
- (2) The annual number of minors whose cases are filed directly in adult criminal court under Sections 602.5 and 707 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, crossreferenced with information about the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors whose cases are filed directly to the adult criminal court.
- (3) The outcomes of cases involving minors who are prosecuted in adult criminal courts, regardless of how adult court jurisdiction was initiated, including whether the minor was acquitted or convicted, or whether the case was dismissed and returned to juvenile court, including sentencing outcomes, cross-referenced with the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors subject to these court actions.
- (b) The department's annual report published under Section 13010 shall include the information described in subdivision (d) of Section 13012, as further delineated by this section, beginning with the report due on July 1, 2003, for the preceding calendar year.

# APPENDIX 6 JUVENILE JUSTICE GLOSSARY

California Youth Authority (CYA) – the state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from superior courts. (Consolidated with the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and renamed the Division of Juvenile Justice, July 2005.)

Caseload – the number of juveniles under the supervision/jurisdiction of a probation department, excluding courtesy supervision, but including juveniles on diversion, informal probation (654 or 654.2 WI), non-ward probation (725(a) WI), deferred entry of judgment (790 WI), and those who are wards of the juvenile court.

**Closed at Intake** – a referral is closed at intake by the probation department following an investigation of the circumstances and nature of the alleged offense. No further action is taken.

**Deferred Entry of Judgment** – a treatment program for first-time felony offenders aged 14 to 17 (pursuant to 790 WI).

**Deferred Entry of Judgment Failure** – a felony offender who fails the treatment program (pursuant to 793 WI).

**Delinquent Act** – act committed by a juvenile for which an adult could be prosecuted in a criminal court.

**Detention** – the status of a juvenile immediately after arrest and prior to any court action.

**Direct File in Adult Court** – the transfer of a juvenile offender who is alleged to have committed murder, rape, spousal rape, forcible sex offense, lewd and lascivious acts on a child under the age of 14 years, forcible sexual penetration, sodomy, or oral copulation to a court of criminal jurisdiction (pursuant to 602(b) WI).

**Dismissed** – a petition is dismissed by the juvenile court with no further action taken.

**Disposition** – an action taken by the probation officer or juvenile court as a result of a referral.

**Diversion** – any delivery or referral of a minor, by the probation department, to a public or private agency with which the city or county has an agreement to provide diversion services. Diversion services must meet the following criteria:

- The probation department must have referred the minor and continued to be responsible and maintained responsibility for that minor's progress.
- 2) Placement and monitoring of a minor must have a beginning and ending date.

**Diversion Dismissed** – the successful completion of a diversion program.

**Fitness Hearing (707(b) WI)** – a hearing to determine whether the juvenile is a fit and proper subject to be dealt with under the juvenile court law. If the juvenile is found fit, adjudication remains in the juvenile court. If the juvenile is found unfit, adjudication is transferred to the adult court.

**Informal Probation (654 WI)** – supervision of a minor, in lieu of filing a petition, for a period not to exceed six months. The supervision is based on a contractual agreement between a probation officer and a minor's parents or guardian provided for under 654 Welfare and Institutions Code (WI).

**Informal Probation (654.2 WI)** – supervision of a minor, in lieu of declaring a minor a ward of the court, for a period not to exceed six months. The supervision is based on a contractual agreement between a court and a minor's parents or guardian. The period of supervision may be extended.

**Non-Secure Facility –** a facility where a juvenile is not physically restricted from leaving.

# **APPENDIX 6 JUVENILE JUSTICE GLOSSARY**

Non-Ward Probation (725a WI) - probation grant, without wardship, from juvenile court for a specific time not to exceed six months.

Petition – the formal presentation to juvenile court of information surrounding the alleged offense by a juvenile (similar to a criminal complaint for an adult).

**Population at Risk** – that portion of the total population who, because of like characteristics to the specific study group, are considered "at risk." For juveniles, all persons between 10 and 17 would constitute the at-risk population.

**Private Facility** – a facility operated by a private individual or group.

Public Facility – a facility operated by a governmental agency other than a county probation.

Referral – a juvenile who is brought to the attention of the probation department for alleged behavior under 601 and 602 Welfare and Institutions Code (WI).

Remand to Adult Court – a disposition resulting from a fitness hearing that finds a juvenile unfit for the juvenile system and transfers a juvenile to the adult system.

Reverse Remand – occurs when a case is sent back to the juvenile system from the adult system.

Reverse Waiver for Sentencing - occurs when the adult system sends a juvenile back to the juvenile system for sentencing.

Secure Facility – a facility where a juvenile is held behind a locked door, gate, or fence, or in which some person is responsible for physically preventing the juvenile's escape or departure from the facility.

Status Offenses – acts that would not be classified as crimes if committed by adults.

**Technical Violation** – occurs when a juvenile violates a condition of his/her probation but does not commit a new offense.

Traffic Court - a disposition indicating the case was transferred to the traffic court for processing.

**Transfer** – a disposition which transfers the juvenile to another county juvenile court or probation department.

Wardship Probation – a probation grant in which a minor is declared a ward of the juvenile court and placed on formal probation.

WI - Welfare and Institutions Code.

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
