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The role of the Criminal Justice Statistics Center is to:

- Collect, analyze, and report statistical data which provide valid measures of crime and the criminal justice process.
- Examine these data on an ongoing basis to better describe crime and the criminal *justice system.*

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INTRODUCTION

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Juvenile Justice in California, 2005 is organized to display the flow of the juvenile justice process and provide specific information on the juvenile population, race/ethnic groups, gender, number of arrests, referrals to probation departments, juvenile court dispositions, offenses, and dispositions for those juveniles tried in adult courts.

The reader should also know that the California Department of Justice, Criminal Justice Statistics Center (CJSC) is required by statute to collect, tabulate, analyze, and interpret data that describe the administration of juvenile justice in California. To aid in the collection of data, Welfare and Institutions Code section 285 provides that "All probation officers shall make periodic reports to the Attorney General" Penal Code section 13012 subdivision (d) requires CJSC to include the administrative actions taken by law enforcement, prosecutorial, judicial, penal, and correctional agencies in the juvenile justice system. Penal Code section 13012.5 also requires the inclusion of fitness hearing information and outcomes, direct filings in adult criminal court, and the outcomes of those cases involving minors who are prosecuted in adult criminal courts, in the annual report to the Legislature.

This report is based on data submitted by 55 of California's 58 county probation departments representing approximately 92 percent of the state's population. Of the remaining three counties, Del Norte and Sierra were unable to provide any data, while Riverside only provided partial data for 2005. Therefore, the data from these counties are not included in this report.

The presentation of data in this report is organized to display the flow of the juvenile justice process. Each section examines the relevant data as follows:

- Arrests by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition.
- Referrals by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition.
- Petitions by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition.
- Adult dispositions by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition.
- Minority contact by race/ethnic group.

The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ethnic group data. As commonly used, race refers to large populations that share certain similar physical characteristics such as skin color. Because these physical characteristics can vary greatly within groups as well as between groups, determination of race is frequently, by necessity, subjective. Ethnicity refers to cultural heritage and can cross racial lines. For example, the ethnic designation "Hispanic" includes persons of any race. Most commonly, self identification of race/ethnicity is used in the classification and labeling process.

Comparisons between 2002 and 2005 data are presented in this report at key decision points in the juvenile justice process; i.e., law enforcement, probation department, and juvenile court. Comparisons at all points in the process or for all data are not presented because of changes in the number of reporting probation departments and changes in the number of reportable offenses. In 2002, only the most serious offenses were reported; in 2005, up to five offenses could be reported.

The offenses presented in this report were grouped into the categories of person, property, drug, public order, and status offenses. The use of these categories is intended to provide a valid and comparable measure of offenses and the juvenile justice process.

This logo, which appears repeatedly throughout the report, will alert the reader to featured analyses or items of special interest.

HIGHLIGHTS

ARRESTS

In 2005, of the juveniles arrested, almost two-thirds were arrested for a misdemeanor offense (60.0 percent), another quarter were arrested for a felony offense (26.5 percent), and the remainder (13.4 percent) were status offense arrests. (Source: Table 1.)

In 2005, eight out of ten arrested juveniles (80.3 percent) were referred to county juvenile probation departments for appropriate handling. (Source: Table 1A.)

REFERRALS

Of the total juveniles referred to county probation departments, over one-half (50.8 percent) resulted in a petition being filed to have the case handled formally by the juvenile court. (Source: Table 2.)

Over one-third (35.1 percent) of the juvenile cases referred to county probation departments were closed at intake, indicating no further action was taken. (Source: Table 2.)

PETITIONS

Of the juveniles handled formally by the juvenile court, the majority (63.5 percent) were made a ward of the court. (Source: Table 4.)

Nearly one-fifth (19.2 percent) of the petitions filed to have a juvenile handled formally by the juvenile court were dismissed. (Source: Table 4.)

ADULT DISPOSITIONS

Of the juvenile dispositions in adult court that resulted in a conviction, nearly two-thirds were sentenced to prison (64.6 percent). (Source: Table 13.)

MINORITY CONTACT

When comparing the rate of transfers to adult court by race/ethnic group, blacks and Hispanics exceeded whites by more than three to one (4.70 and 3.44, respectively). (Source: Table 15.)

Juvenile Justice System, 2005 Fallout Chart

The juvenile justice system in California differs from the adult system in the type of offenders received and the manner in which they are processed. The juvenile system primarily deals with persons under 18 years of age who have either violated criminal statutes or have committed "status offenses." Status offenses are acts that are offenses only when committed by a juvenile, such as incorrigibility, truancy, running away, and curfew violations.

Arrests of law violators and status offenders are received from law enforcement agencies throughout California. The law enforcement agency may refer the juvenile to the probation department, counsel and release, or turn the juvenile over to another law enforcement jurisdiction. The law enforcement agency, given the severity of the crime, may refer the juvenile offender to the District Attorney for direct filing in adult court.

Referrals of law violators and status offenders to probation departments are from law enforcement, other public agencies or individuals, other sources, transfers from other counties or states, or from schools, parents, or private agencies or individuals.

The accompanying fallout chart depicts the path of a juvenile through the juvenile justice system in California from arrest to final disposition, including the outcomes of juvenile cases transferred to the adult system for prosecution.

Typically, referrals are made to the probation department in the juvenile's county of residence. The majority come from police and sheriff's departments (87.6 percent), with the remainder coming from other sources.

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- Probation departments decide how to process referred cases. A case may be closed or transferred, a juvenile may be placed on informal probation or in a diversion program, or a petition may be sought for a court hearing.
- Most formal juvenile court hearings resulted in the juvenile being made a ward of the court. Most wards (58.7 percent) were allowed to go home under the supervision of the probation department.
- Juveniles can be transferred to the adult criminal justice system for prosecution by failing a fitness hearing in the juvenile court or sent directly by the District Attorney. More than eight out of ten dispositions received in 2005 resulted in a conviction (83.6 percent).

ARRESTS

Comparing 2002 to 2005, the number of juveniles arrested for a:

- Felony offense increased 0.2 percentage points (26.3 to 26.5 percent).
- Misdemeanor offense increased 2.7 percentage points (57.3 to 60.0 percent).
- Status offense decreased 3.0 percentage points (16.4 to 13.4 percent).

From 2004 to 2005, the number of juveniles arrested for a:

- Felony offense increased 0.1 percentage points (26.4 to 26.5 percent).
- Misdemeanor offense were unchanged (60.0 to 60.0 percent).
- Status offense decreased 0.2 percentage points (13.6 to 13.4 percent).

Note: Because of the differences in the number of reporting probation departments from 2002 to 2005 and the differences in the number of allowable reportable offenses, caution should be used when comparing data reported for 2002 to data reported for 2003, 2004, and 2005.

ARREST LEVEL DISPOSITIONS

When dealing with juvenile arrestees, law enforcement agencies may counsel and release the juvenile, refer them to the probation department, or turn them over to another law enforcement jurisdiction.

When comparing 2002 to 2005, the number of juveniles:

- Referred to probation increased 3.6 percentage points (76.7 to 80.3 percent).
- Counseled and released decreased 3.3 percentage points (20.8 to 17.5 percent).
- Turned over decreased 0.4 percentage points (2.5 to 2.1 percent).

From 2004 to 2005, the number of juveniles:

- Referred to probation increased 1.9 percentage points (78.4 to 80.3 percent).
- Counseled and released decreased 1.9 percentage points (19.4 to 17.5 percent).
- Turned over was unchanged (2.1 to 2.1 percent).

REFERRALS TO PROBATION

Comparing 2002 to 2005, the number of juveniles:

Referred to probation by law enforcement decreased 0.6 percentage points (88.2 to 87.6 percent), while referrals to non-law enforcement entities increased by the same percentage (11.8 to 12.4 percent).

From 2004 to 2005, the number of juveniles:

Referred to probation by law enforcement was unchanged (87.6 to 87.6 percent), and referrals by non-law enforcement entities were also unchanged (12.4 to 12.4).

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REFERRAL DISPOSITIONS

When comparing 2002 to 2005, the number of juveniles whose cases were:

- Closed at intake decreased 4.9 percentage points (40.0 to 35.1 percent).
- Informal probation decreased 1.7 percentage points (4.5 to 2.8 percent).
- Diversion increased 1.1 percentage points (3.6 to 4.7 percent).
- Transferred increased 5.0 percentage points (1.4 to 6.4 percent).
- Petitions filed in juvenile court increased 0.3 percentage points (50.5 to 50.8 percent).
- Directly filed in adult court increased 0.2 percentage points (0.0 to 0.2 percent).

From 2004 to 2005, the number of juveniles whose cases were:

- Closed at intake decreased 0.8 percentage points (35.9 to 35.1 percent).
- Informal probation decreased 0.4 percentage points (3.2 to 2.8 percent).
- Diversion increased 0.1 percentage points (4.6 to 4.7 percent).
- Transferred increased 1.2 percentage points (5.2 to 6.4 percent).
- Petitions filed in juvenile court decreased 0.1 percentage points (50.9 to 50.8 percent).
- Directly filed in adult court was unchanged (0.2 to 0.2 percent).

- Remanded to adult court was unchanged (0.3 to 0.3 percent).

Arrests

A juvenile arrest may be for delinquent acts or status offenses. A delinquent act would be considered a crime if committed by an adult and is typically called a referral action. A status offense is an act that is only illegal because of the age of the offender. Status offenses include curfew violations, truancy, running away, and incorrigibility.

This section examines arrests by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, law enforcement disposition, and direct filings in adult court.

The age groupings used throughout this report represent the most active age groups for the area being discussed.

The race/ethnic groups represented in this section include Hispanic, white, black, Asian, Pacific Islander, American Indian, and other. The other category includes those juveniles whose race/ethnic group is not included in the previously listed groups.

The data used were compiled from arrests reported, via the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register, to the Department of Justice (DOJ) by law enforcement agencies in the 55 Juvenile Court Probation Statistical System (JCPSS) reporting counties.

LEVEL OF OFFENSE

ARRESTS REPORTED

In 2005, of the 222,512 juvenile arrests reported:

26.5 percent (59,027) were for felonies; 60.0 percent (133,606) were for misdemeanors; and 13.4 percent (29,879) were for status offenses.



In 2005, of the 222,512 juvenile arrests reported:

- Females represented more than one-fourth of arrestees (26.4 percent – 58,849).
- Males accounted for more than eight out of ten felony arrests (82.7 percent – 48,791).

In 2005, misdemeanor arrests exceeded felony arrests by more than two to one (60.0 vs. 26.5 percent) and status offense arrests by more than four to one (60.0 vs. 13.4 percent).

In 2005, of the 222,512 juvenile arrests reported:

- Males accounted for 8 out of 10 arrests for drug offenses (80.8 percent).
- Females accounted for more than 3 out of 10 arrests for status offenses (36.7 percent).

- 94.8 percent (325) were male.
- 5.2 percent (18) were female.

ARRESTS BY AGE GROUP

LEVEL OF OFFENSE, 2005

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In 2005, of the 222,512 juvenile arrests reported:

- Juveniles in all age groups were arrested for similar proportions of felony, misdemeanor, and status offenses.
- More than two-thirds of all felony, misdemeanor, and status offense arrestees were aged 15–17 (71.7, 69.7, and 73.5 percent, respectively).

In 2005, of the 222,512 juvenile arrests reported:

- Juveniles aged 12–14 accounted for less than one-third of the arrests for offenses against persons (32.2 percent).
- More drug arrests were for juveniles aged 15–17 than any other age group (80.5 percent).

ARREST LEVEL DISPOSITION BY AGE GROUP

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When dealing with juvenile arrestees, law enforcement agencies may counsel and release the juvenile, refer them to the probation department, or turn them over to another jurisdiction.

In 2005, of the 178,767 referrals to probation:

- 26.7 percent were juveniles aged 12–14 (47,666).
- 71.4 percent were juveniles aged 15–17 (127,678).
- Of the 39,021 receiving counseling:
- 30.2 percent were juveniles aged 12–14 (11,788).
- 66.7 percent were juveniles aged 15–17 (26,041).

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In 2005, of the 222,512 arrests reported:

- Hispanics and whites were responsible for more than threefourths of the arrests (48.4 and 27.6 percent, respectively).
- All other race/ethnic groups were responsible for nearly one-fourth of the arrests (24.1 percent).

In 2005, of the 222,512 arrests reported:

- Hispanics accounted for more than half of the status offense arrests (57.5 percent).
- Whites accounted for more than one-third of the drug arrests (35.2 percent).
- Blacks accounted for more than one-fourth of the arrests for crimes against persons (27.5 percent).
- Asians accounted for less than 1 out of 10 arrests for property offenses (4.5 percent).
- Pacific Islanders and American Indians accounted for less than one percent of all arrests (0.5 and 0.4 percent, respectively).
- All other race/ethnic groups accounted for less than 1 out of 10 arrests for public order offenses (2.9 percent).

ARREST LEVEL DISPOSITIONS BY RACE/ETHNIC GROUP

When dealing with juvenile arrestees, law enforcement agencies may counsel and release the juvenile, refer them to the probation department, or turn them over to another law enforcement jurisdiction.

In 2005, of the 222,512 law enforcement dispositions reported:

- Hispanics accounted for more than half of arrestees receiving counseling (52.1 percent).
- Whites accounted for 28.1 percent of arrestees referred to probation.
- Pacific Islanders were referred to probation and received counseling in similar proportions.

In 2005, three times as many Hispanics were counseled and released following an arrest than were blacks (52.1 vs. 15.9 percent).

- 9.6 percent (33) were white.
- 33.8 percent (116) were black.
- 3.8 percent (13) were Asian.
- 0.6 percent (2) were Pacific Islander.
- 0.3 percent (1) were American Indian.
- 1.7 percent (6) were all other race/ ethnic groups.

Referrals

Juvenile referrals to a probation department may come from several sources, with the largest percentage coming from law enforcement. However, referrals may also be made by schools, parents, public or private agencies and individuals, or by transfers from another county or state.

This section examines referrals by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition.

The age groupings used throughout this report represent the most active age groups for the area being discussed.

The data used were compiled from referrals reported, via the JCPSS, to the DOJ by county probation departments in the 55 JCPSS reporting counties.

Juvenile referrals to a probation department consist of two types: new and subsequent. The term "new referral" refers to a juvenile who is not currently being supervised by the probation department. A new referral is typically a first-time offender. The term "subsequent referral" refers to a juvenile who is currently being supervised by the probation department. A subsequent referral is generally the result of a new arrest or a violation of probation.

The race/ethnic groups presented in this section include Hispanic, white, black, Asian, Pacific Islander, American Indian, and other. The "other" category includes those juveniles whose race/ethnic group is not included in the previously listed groups.

REFERRALS TO PROBATION

In 2005, of the 194,670 referrals to probation reported:

- 87.6 percent (170,533) were from law enforcement.
- 6.8 percent (13,309) were from public agencies or individuals.
- 1.8 percent (3,581) were transfers from another county or state.
- 2.2 percent (4,197) were from other sources.
- 1.6 percent (3,050) were from schools, parents, and private agencies and individuals.

- 55.5 percent (140,441) were for misdemeanors.
- 13.3 percent (33,687) were for status offenses.

- 76.0 percent (147,970) were male.
- 24.0 percent (46,700) were female.

In 2005, of the 140,717 new referrals reported:

- 73.8 percent (103,904) were male.
- 26.2 percent (36,813) were female.

In 2005, of the 53,953 subsequent referrals reported:

- 81.7 percent (44,066) were male.
- 18.3 percent (9,887) were female.

In 2005, of the 253,128 referral offenses reported:

- Males accounted for 80.4 percent (65,086) of the public order referrals.
- Females accounted for 27.7 percent (9,328) of the status offense referrals.

DETENTIONS BY GENDER

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In 2005, of the 194,670 pre-adjudication detentions reported:

- 25.6 percent (34,709) of juveniles not detained were female.
- 24.0 percent (293) of the detainees in non-secure county facilities were female.
- 81.3 percent (36,783) of the detainees in secure county facilities were male.
- 77.9 percent (961) of the detainees who served their detention at home with an electronic monitor were male.

Petitions

In the juvenile justice system, a case may be handled informally by the probation department or formally by the juvenile court. If the case is going to proceed for formal processing, the District Attorney files a petition with the juvenile court to initiate the court action.

This section examines petitions by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, fitness hearings, and disposition.

The age groupings used throughout this report represent the most active age groups for the area being discussed.

The data used were compiled from petitions reported, via the JCPSS, to the DOJ by county probation departments in the 55 JCPSS reporting counties.

Petitions filed in juvenile court consist of two types: new and subsequent. The term "new petition" refers to a juvenile who is not being supervised by the probation department and is typically a first-time offender. The term "subsequent petition" refers to a juvenile who is currently being supervised by the probation department and generally follows a new arrest.

The race/ethnic groups represented in this section include Hispanic, white, black, Asian, Pacific Islander, American Indian, and other. The "other" category includes those juveniles whose race/ethnic group is not included in the previously listed groups.

Adult Dispositions

Juveniles can be transferred to the adult justice system for prosecution by either failing a fitness hearing in the juvenile court or being sent directly by the District Attorney. In 2005, probation departments reported information on 661 transfers to the adult system. The adult disposition information being discussed here is for the 422 dispositions received in 2005.

This section examines adult dispositions by gender, age, race/ethnic group, offense, and disposition. When multiple offenses were received from the courts, only data regarding the most serious offense with the most serious disposition for the event were used in the discussion. The data used were obtained from the Department of Justice's Automated Criminal History System (ACHS).

The race/ethnic groups presented in this section include Hispanic, white, black, Asian, Pacific Islander, American Indian, and other. The "other" category includes those juveniles whose race/ethnic group is not included in the previously listed groups.

Many of the large and small percentages displayed throughout this section are the result of percentages being calculated using the small number of incidents received.

Minority Contact

This section examines the processing of minority youth aged 10 to 17 through the California juvenile justice system. Data were obtained from the 55 JCPSS reporting counties. The areas of the system discussed include arrests, referrals to probation departments, diversion, secure detention, petitions filed in juvenile court, delinquent findings, wardship placements, confinement in secure juvenile correctional facilities, and transfers to adult court.

The rates used throughout this section were calculated using the Federal Disproportionate Minority Contact Relative Rate Index (RRI). The RRI compares the rate, e.g., number per 1,000, of one race/ethnic group to the rate of whites. For example, the arrest rate for whites is 40.88 per 1,000 and the arrest rate for blacks is 102.12 per 1,000. The RRI, therefore, is 2.5 for arrested blacks compared to arrested whites.

The RRI is used to identify areas where more intensive examination of the juvenile justice system may be needed. The juvenile arrest and referral rates are per 1,000 juveniles aged 10 to 17. The remaining rates are per 100 juveniles referred, petitioned, or found delinquent.

In determining over-representation, the RRI compares minority juveniles to white juveniles. An index value of:

- More than one indicates minority over-representation.
- One indicates proportional representation.
- Less than one indicates minority under-representation.

The race/ethnic groups presented in this section include Hispanic, white, black, and Asian. The selection of these race/ethnic groups was based on the one percent rule on the RRI. The one percent rule identifies those race/ ethnic groups whose population exceeds one percent of the statewide population at risk.

The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ethnic group data. As commonly used, race refers to large populations that share certain similar physical characteristics such as skin color. Because these physical characteristics can vary greatly within groups as well as between groups, determination of race is frequently, by necessity, subjective. Ethnicity refers to cultural heritage and can cross racial lines. For example, the ethnic designation "Hispanic" includes persons of any race. Most commonly, self-identification of race/ethnicity is used in the classification and labeling process.

JUVENILE ARRESTS

In 2005, when comparing the rate of white arrests to the rate of minority arrests:

- Hispanics were 1.25 times higher.
- Blacks were 2.55 times higher.
- Asians were 0.4 times lower.

APPENDIX 1 BACKGROUND

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The Department of Justice (DOJ), Criminal Justice Statistics Center (formerly the Bureau of Criminal Statistics), has been compiling and publishing data describing California's juvenile justice system since 1947. In 1969, the first computerized juvenile probation caseload file system was developed to receive information on juveniles being supervised by probation departments or in detention facilities. The system was designed to track transactions that took place within the juvenile probation system and to provide information on the chain of events that depicted a juvenile's progress through the probation and court processes from the time of referral to final disposition. Individual transactions were linked together to form a comprehensive record of the court and probation activities for a single offender.

In 1979, in an effort to upgrade the first computerized data collection system, the Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical System (JCPSS) was developed as a pilot study. Ten counties participated in the initial study, and, in 1980, the pilot system was made operational statewide.

From 1980 to 1989, the JCPSS collected, compiled, and reported statistical data on the administration of juvenile justice in California by collecting individualized records on delinquent juveniles referred to California probation departments. These records contained information about the youth, referral source, referral offense, pre-adjudication detention, probation and court disposition, and current supervision status, and changes in prior supervision status. During this period, transaction reports were submitted at the time a disposition was made or when supervision was terminated.

In 1990, the JCPSS was eliminated because of budget reductions.

In 1995, with the help of Assemblyman Baca and the support of the Chief Probation Officers of California, Assembly Bill 488 was passed, directing the DOJ to

reestablish the JCPSS. In June 1996, representatives from 14 probation departments and the DOJ met to finalize the reporting standards and system development began. In January 1997, several probation departments were submitting data to the JCPSS data.

In 1999, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) recommended that the Legislature withhold 50 percent of the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funds from those probation departments not "certified" by the DOJ as submitting JCPSS data by March 2000. At that time, only 22 probation departments were submitting data to the JCPSS.

In 2000, the LAO again recommended that the Legislature withhold 50 percent of the TANF funds from those probation departments not certified by the DOJ as submitting JCPSS data by March 2001. In May 2000, a permanent JCPSS Advisory Committee was established to discuss improving county participation and legislative changes affecting JCPSS; no funds were withheld.

In 2001, the Legislature directed the DOJ, via Senate Bill 314, to include in its annual juvenile justice report, statistics on the administrative actions taken by law enforcement agencies regarding juveniles whose cases are transferred to or directly adjudicated in adult criminal court. This legislation also prompted discussions about replacing the existing JCPSS software, first provided to the probation departments in 1996, with a web-enabled application. In February 2002, development of the webenabled JCPSS application began, and by October 2002, the DOJ began connecting county probation departments to the DOJ network.

In 2003, the JCPSS web-application became fully operational. Probation departments were trained and data submission began. Currently, 57 counties are connected to the web-enabled application, with 55 of those counties certified and submitting data. The DOJ continues to work with the remaining counties to achieve 100 percent participation.

APPENDIX 2 DATA LIMITATIONS

Juvenile Court and Probation Statistical Systems

- Each year there is a difference between the number of referrals to probation via the JCPSS and the number of juvenile arrests reported by law enforcement agencies as "referred to juvenile court and probation" via the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (MACR). The differences are due, in part, to the different programs and definitions used by law enforcement agencies and probation department for submitting data to the DOJ. However, there are two primary reasons for the difference:
 - a. Probation departments report caseload information while law enforcement agencies report information on individual arrests.
 - b. The JCPSS counts only those juveniles who have a final disposition reported to the DOJ. Many probation departments divert juveniles out of the system into other "community based" programs. As a result, many juveniles who are diverted after being referred by law enforcement agencies are not reported on JCPSS.
- 2. All juvenile referrals for law violations and status offenses are reported in the JCPSS.
- 3. The information presented in this report represents the data received from 55 JCPSS certified counties (Alameda, Alpine, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Humboldt, Imperial, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Lake, Lassen, Los Angeles, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Merced, Modoc, Mono, Monterey, Napa, Nevada, Orange, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Siskiyou, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare, Tuolumne, Ventura, Yolo, and Yuba).

- 4. Adult disposition information includes those juveniles aged 14 to 17 who received an adult level disposition in 2005. The number of adult dispositions received in 2005, that meet the above criteria, will not equal the number of juveniles transferred to the adult system for prosecution. Because of differences between the adult and juvenile systems, not every case transferred to the adult system is adjudicated in the same year. Many of the arrests occurred prior to 2005.
- 5. For adult dispositions with multiple offenses, the most serious offense with the most severe punishment was used in the analysis.
- 6. In 2003, the JCPSS was modified to accept up to five offenses per referral or petition. Previously, the JCPSS would only accept the most serious offense per referral or petition.
- 7. The Riverside Probation only provided partial data for 2005. Therefore, data for this county is not included in this report.

Arrests

Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (MACR)

1. If a person is arrested for multiple offenses, the MACR selects only the most serious offense based on the severity of possible punishment.

2. Felony arrest counts may include some misdemeanor warrants for felony offenses.

3. The subjectivity of the classification and labeling process must be considered in the analysis of race/ ethnic group data.

APPENDIX 3 PENAL CODE SECTIONS

Welfare and Institutions Code Section 285

All probation officers shall make periodic reports to the Attorney General at those times and in the manner prescribed by the Attorney General, provided that no names or social security numbers shall be transmitted regarding any proceeding under Section 300 or 601.

Penal Code Section 13010

It shall be the duty of the department:

(a) To collect data necessary for the work of the department from all persons and agencies mentioned in Section 13020 and from any other appropriate source.

(b) To prepare and distribute to all those persons and agencies, cards, forms, or electronic means used in reporting data to the department. The cards, forms, or electronic means may, in addition to other items, include items of information needed by federal bureaus or departments engaged in the development of national and uniform criminal statistics.

(c) To recommend the form and content of records which must be kept by those persons and agencies in order to insure the correct reporting of data to the department.

(d) To instruct those persons and agencies in the installation, maintenance, and use of those records and in the reporting of data therefrom to the department.

(e) To process, tabulate, analyze and interpret the data collected from those persons and agencies.

(f) To supply, at their request, to federal bureaus or departments engaged in the collection of national criminal statistics data they need from this state. (g) To present to the Governor, on or before July 1st, a printed annual report containing the criminal statistics of the preceding calendar year and to present at other times as the Attorney General may approve reports on special aspects of criminal statistics. A sufficient number of copies of all reports shall be printed or otherwise prepared to enable the Attorney General to send a copy to all public officials in the state dealing with criminals and to distribute them generally in channels where they will add to the public enlightenment.

(h) To periodically review the requirements of units of government using criminal justice statistics, and to make recommendations for changes it deems necessary in the design of criminal justice statistics systems, including new techniques of collection and processing made possible by automation.

Penal Code Section 13010.5

The department shall collect data pertaining to the juvenile justice system for criminal history and statistical purposes. This information shall serve to assist the department in complying with the reporting requirement of subdivisions (c) and (d) of Section 13012, measuring the extent of juvenile delinquency, determining the need for and effectiveness of relevant legislation, and identifying long-term trends in juvenile delinquency. Any data collected pursuant to this section may include criminal history information which may be used by the department to comply with the requirements of Section 602.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.

APPENDIX 3 PENAL CODE SECTIONS

Penal Code Section 13012

The annual report of the department provided for in Section 13010 shall contain statistics showing all of the following:

(a) The amount and the types of offenses known to the public authorities.

(b) The personal and social characteristics of criminals and delinquents.

(c) The administrative actions taken by law enforcement, judicial, penal, and correctional agencies or institutions, including those in the juvenile justice system, in dealing with criminals or delinquents.

(d) The administrative actions taken by law enforcement, prosecutorial, judicial, penal, and correctional agencies, including those in the juvenile justice system, in dealing with minors who are the subject of a petition or hearing in the juvenile court to transfer their case to the jurisdiction of an adult criminal court or whose cases are directly filed or otherwise initiated in an adult criminal court.

(e) The number of citizens' complaints received by law enforcement agencies under Section 832.5. These statistics shall indicate the total number of these complaints, the number alleging criminal conduct of either a felony or misdemeanor, and the number sustained in each category. The report shall not contain a reference to any individual agency but shall be by gross numbers only.

It shall be the duty of the department to give adequate interpretation of the statistics and so to present the information that it may be of value in guiding the policies of the Legislature and of those in charge of the apprehension, prosecution, and treatment of the criminals and delinquents, or concerned with the prevention of crime and delinquency. The report shall also include statistics which are comparable with national uniform criminal statistics published by federal bureaus or departments heretofore mentioned.

Penal Code Section 13012.5

(a) The annual report published by the department under Section 13010 shall, in regard to the contents required by subdivision (d) of Section 13012, include the following statewide information:

(1) The annual number of fitness hearings held in the juvenile courts under Section 707 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, and the outcomes of those hearings including orders to remand to adult criminal court, cross-referenced with information about the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors whose cases are the subject of those fitness hearings.

(2) The annual number of minors whose cases are filed directly in adult criminal court under Sections 602.5 and 707 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, cross-referenced with information about the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors whose cases are filed directly to the adult criminal court.

(3) The outcomes of cases involving minors who are prosecuted in adult criminal courts, regardless of how adult court jurisdiction was initiated, including whether the minor was acquitted or convicted, or whether the case was dismissed and returned to juvenile court, including sentencing outcomes, cross-referenced with the age, gender, ethnicity, and offense of the minors subject to these court actions.

(b) The department's annual report published under Section 13010 shall include the information described in subdivision (d) of Section 13012, as further delineated by this section, beginning with the report due on July 1, 2003, for the preceding calendar year.

APPENDIX 6 JUVENILE JUSTICE GLOSSARY

California Youth Authority (CYA) – the state agency which has jurisdiction over and maintains institutions as correctional schools for the reception of wards of the juvenile court and other persons committed from superior courts.

Caseload – the number of juveniles under the supervision/jurisdiction of a probation department, excluding courtesy supervision, but including juveniles on diversion, informal probation (654 or 654.2 WI), nonward probation (725(a) WI), deferred entry of judgment (790 WI), and those who are wards of the juvenile court.

Closed at Intake – a referral is closed at intake by the probation department following an investigation of the circumstances and nature of the alleged offense. No further action is taken.

Deferred Entry of Judgment – a treatment program for first-time felony offenders aged 14 to 17 (pursuant to 790 WI).

Deferred Entry of Judgment Failure – a felony offender who fails the treatment program (pursuant to 793 WI).

Detention – the status of a juvenile immediately after arrest and prior to any court action.

Direct File in Adult Court – the transfer of a juvenile offender who is alleged to have committed murder, rape, spousal rape, forcible sex offense, lewd and lascivious acts on a child under the age of 14 years, forcible sexual penetration, sodomy, or oral copulation to a court of criminal jurisdiction (pursuant to 602(b) WI).

Dismissed – a petition is dismissed by the juvenile court with no further action taken.

Disposition – an action taken by the probation officer or juvenile court as a result of a referral.

Diversion – any delivery or referral of a minor, by the probation department, to a public or private agency with which the city or county has an agreement to provide diversion services. Diversion services must meet the following criteria:

- The probation department must have referred the minor and continued to be responsible and maintained responsibility for that minor's progress.
- 2) Placement and monitoring of a minor must have a beginning and ending date.

Fitness Hearing (707(b) WI) – a hearing to determine whether the juvenile is a fit and proper subject to be dealt with under the juvenile court law. If the juvenile is found fit, adjudication remains in the juvenile court. If the juvenile is found unfit, adjudication is transferred to the adult court.

Informal Probation (654 WI) – supervision of a minor, in lieu of filing a petition, for a period not to exceed six months. The supervision is based on a contractual agreement between a probation officer and a minor's parents or guardian provided for under 654 Welfare and Institutions Code (WI).

Informal Probation (654.2 WI) – supervision of a minor, in lieu of declaring a minor a ward of the court, for a period not to exceed six months. The supervision is based on a contractual agreement between a court and a minor's parents or guardian. The period of supervision may be extended.

Non-Secure Facility – a facility where a juvenile is not physically restricted from leaving.

Non-Ward Probation (725a WI) – probation grant, without wardship, from juvenile court for a specific time not to exceed six months.

APPENDIX 6 JUVENILE JUSTICE GLOSSARY

Population at Risk – that portion of the total population who, because of like characteristics to the specific study group, are considered "at risk." For juveniles, all persons between 10 and 17 would constitute the at-risk population.

Private Facility – a facility operated by a private individual or group.

Public Facility – a facility operated by a governmental agency other than a county probation.

Race/Ethnic Groups:

American Indian – a person whose ancestry is any of the original peoples of North America and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

Asian – a person whose ancestry is Cambodian, Chinese, Filipino, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Other Asian (a person who may be Asian but whose specific ethnic origin is not known or declared, or none of the other Asian codes apply), or Vietnamese.

Black – a person whose ancestry is any of the black racial groups of Africa.

Hispanic – a person of Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Central and South America or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race.

Other/Unknown – a person who cannot be linked to any of the general or specific racial/ethnic groups listed.

Pacific Islander – a person whose ancestry is Guamanian, Hawaiian, Pacific Islander, or Samoan.

White – a person whose ancestry is any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

Referral – a juvenile who is brought to the attention of the probation department for alleged behavior under 601 and 602 Welfare and Institutions Code (WI).

Remand to Adult Court – a disposition resulting from a fitness hearing that finds a juvenile unfit for the juvenile system and transfers a juvenile to the adult system.

Reopen – a disposition that refers to a case previously closed at intake.

Reverse Remand – occurs when a case is sent back to the juvenile system from the adult system.

Reverse Waiver for Sentencing – occurs when the adult system sends a juvenile back to the juvenile system for sentencing.

Secure Facility – a facility where a juvenile is held behind a locked door, gate, or fence, or in which some person is responsible for physically preventing the juvenile's escape or departure from the facility.

Technical Violation – occurs when a juvenile violates a condition of his/her probation but does not commit a new offense.

Traffic Court – a disposition indicating the case was transferred to the traffic court for processing.

Transfer – a disposition which transfers the juvenile to another county juvenile court or probation department.

Ward Probation – a probation grant in which a minor is declared a ward of the juvenile court and placed on formal probation.

WI – Welfare and Institutions Code.
