AB 354: Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training Author(s): Rodriguez

 criminal history background check,
- Would authorize the commission, Peace Officer Standards Accountability Division, and all persons for whom background checks have been completed and their duties require access to inspect or duplicate any information derived from CLETS, any criminal history information, criminal offender record information, or criminal justice information, or any other sensitive, confidential or privileged information if the commission determines that the information is needed in the course of the commission's duties.

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Chief O'Keefe: Okay. Good afternoon, everyone. As Vice Chair, I would like to call the meeting to order. I appreciate everyone making the trip today and attending. Next on the agenda will be the roll call. Chris.

I would like to ask for all members to identify themselves before speaking or making a motion or

seconding a motion for the transcript. Also, for the audience members that would like to make a comment, please use the microphone. Public comments will be limited to three minutes per person. Members of the public will not be permitted to yield their allotted time to other members of the public to make comments.

For the Chairman's Report, we have a new member introduction on the agenda: Chief Jim Munro representing the League of California Cities. Chris, please read Chief Munro's bio.

Mr. Blair: Thank you. Serving his community since 1998, Jim is the Chief of Police for the Grover Beach Police Department, a progressive police department on the Central Coast of California. Prior to joining the Grover Beach Police Department, Jim spent 23 years with the Clovis Police Department located in the Central Valley of California.

As a former dispatcher, detective, SWAT member, and

experienced public information officer, Jim enjoys using his experience to help lead a 21st century police organization into the future. Jim has a passion for technology and law enforcement and is recognized as a subject matter expert in the field. He serves on the California Police Chief's Association Technology Committee and has previously served on the Communications Committee.

Jim is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, and he has a master's degree in Law Enforcement and Public Safety Leadership from the University of San Diego.

Additionally, he is a graduate of Class 403 of the Sherman Block Supervisory Leadership Institute.

In his free time, Jim enjoys spending time with his family, traveling, skiing, and playing beach volleyball.

Chief O'Keefe: Thank you, Chris. Please, everyone, join me in welcoming Chief Munro to the committee. Chief, not to put you on the spot, but any comment you'd like to make?

Chief Munro: Happy to join this great group. It's great to meet everybody and see some familiar faces in the audience as well. So, I'm looking forward to serving with you, and we'll be seeing each other for quite a while. Thank you.

Chief O'Keefe: Thank you, Chief. Before moving onto

the next item, is there any public comment? Hearing none, seeing none, let's go to our next agenda item. That's the Executive Secretary's Report. I'll turn it over to our Executive Secretary.

Mr. Blair: Thank you. For the report, we'll be discussing CLETS traffic, misuse statistics, and action items from previous meetings.

In the fourth quarter of 2024 between October and December, there were approximately 243 million total messages for inbound and outbound. The monthly average is approximately 81 million, daily average is approximately 2.6 million, and the peak day is approximately 3.2 million messages.

During this quarter, of the total 155 direct connections, this is a list of agencies falling below 95 percent uptime for the fourth quarter. Only a single agency fell below the average uptime, averaging 80.14 percent. This is Santa Barbara County Sheriff. This is one of their connections. No other agencies use this connection, and the agency is currently working to replace this connection.

For CLETS misuse statistics, as of 2/28/25 for the 2024 calendar year, we have 1,086 agencies or ORIs submitting the report, 611 not reporting at this time -- or as of 2/28/25, 1,058 reporting no misuse, and 28

reporting misuse. As of April 4th, 2025, DOJ has received reports for around 300 additional ORIs that are not reflected in these statistics, so those statistics will be included in the Fall 2025 report. DOJ's efforts to obtain misuse reports from the remaining agencies are ongoing.

For 2024, there were 107 investigations performed related to CLETS misuse. 32 of those investigations are ending, 39 found no CLETS misuse, 42 violations were found from the 107 investigations performed, 9 resulted in counseling, 3 resulted in reprimand, 12 resulted in training, 8 resulted in suspension, 8 resulted in resignation, 9 resulted in termination, 1 "other" and 4 resulted in no action taken. And for the "no action taken" and "other," the agency reporting "other" took several different administrative actions, including counseling and training, and reported them accordingly. For "no action," -- all four instances where no action taken was reported -- CLETS misuse was unfounded.

Onto action items. Actions items are requests that staff received from the committee at previous meetings.

Mr. Ponce: Hi. Good afternoon, Vice Chair and committee members. My name is John Ponce. I'm the Legislative Manager for the Department of Justice, California Justice Information Services Division, and I'm here to provide a legislative update for one bill and

that is Assembly Bill 354 by Assembly Member Rodriguez. It's the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. Assembly Bill 354 would require employees of the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, or POST, whose job duties require access to criminal offender record information, state summary criminal history information, or information obtained from CLETS, to undergo a fingerprint-based state and national criminal history background check. This bill would authorize the commission and the Peace Officer Standards Accountability Division and all persons for whom background checks have been completed and required by their duties, to inspect and duplicate any information derived from CLETS, any criminal history information, criminal offender record information, or criminal justice information, or any other sensitive, confidential, or privileged information, if the commission determines that the information is needed in the course of the commission's duties. The bill has been referred to the Assembly Committee on Public Safety and is awaiting a hearing.

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Chief O'Keefe: Thank you, John. Appreciate that.

Does the committee have any questions? Not seeing any or
hearing any, is there any public comment on this issue of
this report? Not seeing any. Thank you very much, John.

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Mr. Ponce: Thank you.

Chief O'Keefe: Okay. Next on the agenda is a vote, a new service request. Chris, please present the request for the new CLETS service.

Mr. Blair: Thank you. The new request is from Rio Hondo College Campus Police and Safety Department located in Whittier, California in Los Angeles County. The agency is a Class 3 law enforcement subunit of a non-law enforcement agency. The statute of entitlement is California Penal Code 830.32. The primary function of the agency is to enforce criminal traffic and parking laws on and around the campus of Rio Hondo College. Officers are POST certified. They have peace officer powers, and they have 10 to 15 projected sworn personnel. They are seeking access to CLETS through the Los Angeles County Sheriff. Their system has a local area network, wide area network, computer-aided dispatch, and records management system. Their type of connection will be a dedicated landline and wireless with Wi-Fi and cellular. They plan to have three fixed terminals and three mobile terminals. Their network does have internet access, and it meets CLETS Firewall Policy. The level of access they are seeking is "full." Additionally, this agency qualifies for CLETS service and has been assigned an ORI by the FBI. However, the

application is still under DOJ review to ensure the 1 2 agency meets technical, security, and administrative requirements. DOJ's recommendation is approval pending 3 4 successful DOJ technical, security, and administrative review. 5 6 Chief O'Keefe: Thank you, Chris. The approval for 7 this agency requires a vote. Chief O'Keefe: Just from the Governor's Office of Emergency Services, I think just everything for us has been the Los Angeles fires and continuing through the recovery. I don't know if anybody has seen it, but I was down there several times. It's devasting what happened. So, it just comes down to preparation and we never know when these events are going to happen. It's just tragic what happened down in the Los Angeles area, but we still continue to work with the government, FEMA. The governor is very, very much involved in this and we are trying to bring as much as we can to those communities. Thank you.

Chief Munro: Chief Munro representing the League of California Cities. No report at this time, but we'll see

for the next time. Thank you.

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Chief O'Keefe: Thank you.

Chief Bonini: Mark Bonini for California State
Association of Counties. I don't have anything to report.

Chief White: Chief White for California Peace
Officers Association. Nothing to report.

Chief O'Keefe: Thank you. Is there any public comment on this item? Okay.

Community discussion, open forum, public comment.

For this next agenda item, I would like to first open it up to the committee to request any new items members would like to recommend for future committee meetings.

Although any committee member may identify a topic of interest, committee members may not substantially discuss or take action on any matter raised during the meeting that is not included on this agenda, except if you decide to place a matter on the agenda for a future meeting. Now I'd like to open it up to any public comment of this item that is not agendized. Okay. Not hearing or seeing anything, the next meeting will be scheduled on or about September -- oh. I'm sorry. I would like to - would the committee like to make any comments? Yes.

Chief White: Chief White. This will be my last meeting. I have notified the California Peace Officers'
Association of my intent to step down from here and allow

somebody else to do it. It's been I think almost five years -- four or five years. So, I just wanted to thank everybody up here for serving on this. I also wanted to thank the DOJ staff -- I know up here we kind of work through all this stuff, but on the back end I know there's a tremendous amount of work. There's a super reliable system that I think we should all be proud of and it keeps officers safe, it keeps the community safe. I know through working on this committee and working with the Department of Justice, I've come to find out the incredible skill set that your staff have, the developers, everybody else that makes it all work. On the front end we just put in information, we get the right information at the right time. So, it's been a pleasure and all the best to you as you move forward.

Chief O'Keefe: Thank you, Chief. I want to thank you for your career in law enforcement. Hopefully you're not leaving. You're retiring?

Chief White: No.

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Chief O'Keefe: Okay. Just leaving. I can tell you Chief White and I have worked on other committees and he is one of the most learned, if you will, of police chiefs like us. He's very knowledgeable in the areas of technology and whether it's communications, or whether it's what we're doing with CLETS. I just want to thank

you very much for everything you've done, you're always a resource, and I know you'll take the call when people have questions. Thank you.

Our next meeting will be in September or October of 2025. Staff will be looking for a date, so you will be informed on that. I move to adjourn the meeting. Do we need a second, Chris? Okay. We don't need it. Thank you all for coming. Take care. (Recording Ends)
