RE: Notice of Data Breach. Please read this entire letter.

Dear Parent or Guardian of Sample A. Sample:

At Alatus Aerosystems LLC ("Alatus"), we are committed to protecting the confidentiality and security of your personal information. We are sending you this letter to let you know we recently experienced a security incident that resulted in unauthorized disclosure of your child's personal information. Importantly, we are not aware of any misuse of your child's personal information.

What happened? Between March 15, 2023, and March 26, 2023, Alatus experienced a data security incident, which may have resulted in the unauthorized disclosure of certain of your child's personal information. Our team immediately began working with a third-party provider to contain and investigate this incident. In addition, Alatus is cooperating with federal law enforcement. Based on our investigation, an unauthorized user gained access to certain network storage devices, including devices that contained your child's personal information. The process of identifying what data was impacted and how to contact affected individuals was time consuming, and that process did not complete until on or about June 22, 2023.

What information was involved? The information impacted for each individual varied, but may have included your child's name, date of birth, social security number, health information, and health insurance information.

What we are doing to protect your information. Upon discovering this incident on March 26, 2023, Alatus blocked the unauthorized party from further accessing its information systems and began restoring its servers from secure backups. We also worked with forensic investigators to investigate the incident and implement technical security measures designed to reduce the risk of a similar incident in the future.

Although we have no evidence that your child's personal information has been misused, To help protect your child's identity, we are offering a complimentary 24-month membership of Experian's® IdentityWorksSM. This product provides superior identity detection and resolution of identity theft. To activate this membership and start monitoring your child's personal information please follow the steps below:

- Ensure that you enroll by: October 31, 2023 (Your code will not work after this date.)
- Visit the Experian IdentityWorks website to enroll: https://www.experianidworks.com/minorplus
- Provide your activation code: ABCDEFGHI
- Provide your minor's information when prompted

ADDITIONAL DETAILS REGARDING YOUR 24-MONTH EXPERIAN IDENTITYWORKS MEMBERSHIP:

A credit card is **not** required for enrollment in Experian IdentityWorks.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT IDENTITY THEFT PROTECTION

You should remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing credit card account statements and monitoring your credit report for unauthorized activity.

Credit Reports. Under federal law, you are entitled to one free copy of your credit report every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies. You may obtain a free copy of your credit report by going to www. AnnualCreditReport.com or by calling (877) 322-8228. You also may complete the Annual Credit Report Request Form available from the FTC at www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/pdf-0093-annual-report-request-form.pdf, and mail it to AnnualCredit Report Request Service, P.O. Fraud Alert. You may place a fraud alert in your file by calling one of the three nationwide credit reporting agencies above. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay youwhen you seek to obtain credit.

Place a Security Freeze on your Credit Report. You also have the right to place a security freeze on your credit reportby contacting any of the credit bureaus listed at above. A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans and servicesfrom being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may be ableto use an online process, an automated telephone line or a written request. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) dateof birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past five years; and (5) any applicable incident report orcomplaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of agovernment-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. You can place afreeze and lift a security freeze on your credit report free of charge.

You may contact the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and State Attorneys General Offices. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should contact the FTC and/or your state's attorney general office about for information on how to prevent or avoid identity theft.
