**NOTICE OF DATA BREACH**

Dear Sample A. Sample:

The Hogan Transportation Companies\* (“Hogan”) is writing to notify you of a matter that may involve your information. This letter provides you with information about what happened, our response, and the steps you may take should you feel it appropriate to do so.

**What Happened?** On or around November 29, 2025, Hogan became aware of unusual activity on certain systems in our network and promptly took steps to contain the activity and launched an investigation, with the support of third-party cybersecurity specialists. The investigation determined that the network was accessed without authorization at various periods of time between October 25, 2025, and November 29, 2025, and certain files were accessed or copied. Following our investigation, we conducted a comprehensive review of the data stored on the affected systems to determine what data may have been impacted and to whom the information relates. On or around March 31, 2026, the review was completed. Hogan then took steps to identify contact information to notify individuals.

**What Information Was Involved?** The investigation determined that your name, and [Extra1] may have been present in an impacted files at the time of the incident.

**What We Are Doing.** We take this event and the security of information in our care seriously. Upon learning of this incident, we took steps to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of our systems, and notify those impacted by this event. We also provided notice to federal law enforcement and required regulatory agencies. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we are reviewing and enhancing our existing policies and procedures as appropriate. As an added precaution, we are offering you access to credit monitoring services for 24 months at no cost to you. More information about these services is attached in the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information*.

**What You Can Do.** We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. Suspicious activity should be reported to your bank and/or other applicable institutions. You may also review the information contained in the attached the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information*. Further, you may enroll in the complimentary monitoring services being offered. Although we are making these services available to you, we are unable to enroll you directly.

## **Monitor Your Accounts**

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit [www.annualcreditreport.com](http://www.annualcreditreport.com) or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.
