Hebrew Home for Aged Disabled d/b/a San Francisco Campus for Jewish Living ("SFCJL") is writing to inform you of a recent data incident that may have resulted in unauthorized access to your personal information. While we are unaware of any fraudulent misuse of your personal information at this time, we are providing you with details about the incident, steps we are taking in response, and resources available to help you protect against the potential misuse of your information.

What Happened?

On December 27, 2024, SFCJL discovered that an unauthorized user gained access to an employee's e-mail user account (the "Incident"). Upon discovery of the Incident, SFCJL promptly secured the e-mail account and engaged a specialized cybersecurity incident response firm to investigate and determine the cause and scope of the unauthorized activity. The forensic investigation, which concluded on February 6, 2025, determined that an unauthorized user gained limited access to one (1) employee e-mail user account.

Based on these findings, SFCJL conducted a review of the information that was potentially accessed by the unauthorized user to identify the specific individuals and the types of information that may have been affected by the Incident. On April 1, 2025, SFCJL finalized the list of individuals to notify.

What Information Was Involved?

Based on the investigation, the following information related to you may have been subject to unauthorized access: name; address; <<Breached Elements>>.

Please note the Incident did not involve your Social Security number or your financial information. Further, SFJCL has received no evidence to date that any personal information has been misused by third parties as a result of this incident.
