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1	THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA ("People" or "Plaintiff"), by and						
2	through ROB BONTA, Attorney General of the State of California, NICOLE A. SILVEIRA,						
3	District Attorney of Merced County, ERIK NASARENKO, District Attorney of Ventura County,						
4	and JEFF W. REISIG, District Attorney of Yolo County, allege the following on information and

6	DEFENDANT						
7	1. Walmart, Inc. ("Walmart" or "Defendant") is a Delaware corporation headquartered						
8	in Arkansas.						
9	2. Defendant Walmart is a large American multinational retail corporation that sells a						
10	wide range of merchandise in physical retail stores as well as online at Walmart.com. Through its						
11	website, Walmart sells products directly to consumers and also provides an e-commerce platform						
12	for third-party sellers. Those e-commerce operations are designed and directed in part from						
13	Walmart's facilities in Sunnyvale and San Bruno, California.						
14	JURISDICTION AND VENUE						
15	3. This Court has jurisdiction over Defendant, as it transacts business in Merced County						
16	and throughout the State of California and did so at all times relevant to this action.						
17	4. Venue is proper, as the violations of law alleged in this Complaint occurred in						
18	Merced County and elsewhere in the State of California.						
19	DEFENDANT'S BUSINESS PRACTICES						
20	5. Metal knuckles are illegal to advertise, sell, or possess in California. Metal knuckles,						
21	also referred to as brass knuckles, are worn on the hand, over the knuckles, and are typically used						
22	in physical altercations to increase the impact of a punch or a blow, or to protect the wearer's						
23	hand while striking a blow. The use of metal knuckles can lead to serious bodily injury, and they						
24	are classified as deadly weapons under California law. (Pen. Code, § 21810.) Metal knuckles are						
25	dangerous weapons that pose a threat to public safety in California.						
26	6. During the relevant time period, Walmart advertised and sold metal knuckles online						
27	through its website at www.walmart.com to California consumers and shipped the products						
28	directly to consumers in the state as well as to Walmart stores for in-store pickup in the state.

7. During the relevant time period, third-party sellers advertised and sold metal knuckles
 online through Walmart's e-commerce platform at www.walmart.com to California consumers
 and shipped the products directly to consumers in the state. During this time, Walmart allowed
 third-party sellers to sell metal knuckles through its platform by failing to properly screen and
 prevent the products from being made available for purchase in California.

8. During the relevant time period, approximately 250 products that may be classified as
metal knuckles were sold to California consumers through Walmart's website. Approximately
60% of those metal knuckles were sold directly by Walmart, and the remaining 40% were sold by
third-party sellers.

9. California law also prohibits the advertising, sale, and possession of composite and
 hard wooden knuckles, certain knives (including, for example, switchblade knives), and other
 unlawful weapons and devices. (Pen. Code, §§ 20310, 20410, 20510, 20610, 20710, 20810,
 20910, 21110, 21510, 21710, 22210, 22410.)

14 10. On information and belief, during the above period of time, other illegal and
15 dangerous weapons were also advertised for sale to California consumers by third-party sellers
16 through Walmart's website, including composite knuckles, certain knives, and saps and similar
17 weapons.

18 FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION 19 VIOLATIONS OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 17200 20 (Unfair Competition Law) 21 The People reallege and incorporate by reference each of the paragraphs above as 11. 22 though fully set forth herein. 23 12. Walmart has engaged in acts or practices that constitute unfair competition as defined 24 in Business and Professions Code section 17200. These acts or practices include, but are not 25 limited to, the following: 26 Violating Penal Code section 21810, including but not limited to, by importing, a. possessing, offering or exposing for sale, or selling metal knuckles in California 27

and

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1	b. Violating Penal Code section 21810, including but not limited to, by allowing							
2	third-party sellers to offer or expose for sale or sell metal knuckles in California							
3	through Walmart's online platform.							
4	PRAYER FOR RELIEF							
5	WHEREFORE, Plaintiff prays for judgment as follows:							
6	1. That Defendant, it successors, agents, representatives, employees, assigns, and all							
7	persons who act in concert with them be permanently enjoined from engaging in unfair							
8	competition as defined in Business and Professions Code section 17200, including but not limited							
9	to, the acts and practices alleged in this Complaint, under the authority of Business and							
10	Professions Code section 17203;							
11	2. That the Court assess a civil penalty of \$2,500 against Defendant for each violation of							
12	Business and Professions Code section 17200 in an amount according to proof, under the							
13	authority of Business and Professions Code section 17206;							
14	3. That the People recover its costs of suit, including all costs of investigation; and							
15	4. For such other and further relief that the Court deems just and proper.
