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24 Plaintiff, the People of the State of California (“Plaintiff” or the “People”), by its attorney,
25 Kamala D. Harris, Attorney General of the State of California, by Judith Fiorentini and Albert
26 Norman Shelden, Deputy Attorneys General, is informed and believes and thereupon alleges as
27 follows:
28

1 Defendants knew, or by the exercise of reasonable care should have known, the written and oral
2 representations were not true as a result of the manner in which the prescription drugs were
3 manufactured.

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6 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION**
7 **Violations of Business and Professions Code**
8 **Section 17200 (Acts of Unfair Competition)**

9 16. The People reallege and incorporate by reference each and every allegation contained
10 in the preceding paragraphs 1 through 15 as though fully set forth here.

11 17. Defendants, in the course of engaging in the development, manufacture, promotion,
12 sales, and interstate distribution of prescription drugs, have engaged in unfair competition as
13 defined in Business and Professions Code section 17200, by:

14 a. Violating Business and Professions Code section 17500 as alleged in paragraph
15 15 of the above First Cause of Action and which is incorporated by reference as though fully set
16 forth here.

17 b. Representing the prescription drugs had sponsorship, approval characteristics,
18 ingredients, uses, benefits, quantities, or qualities that they do not have as a result of the manner
19 in which the prescription drugs were manufactured; and

20 c. Creating the likelihood of confusion or of misunderstanding as to the source,
21 sponsorship, approval, or certification of the prescription drugs as a result of the manner in which
22 the prescription drugs were manufactured.

23 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

24 **WHEREFORE**, Plaintiff prays that:

25 1. An injunction be issued pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 17203
26 and 17535 restraining and enjoining Defendants and their agents, employees, and all other
27 persons or entities, corporate or otherwise, in active concert or participation with any of them,
28 from violating Business and Professions Code sections 17200 or 17500.

1 2. Pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 17206 and 17536, Defendants be
2 assessed a civil penalty of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500) for each violation of Business and
3 Professions Code sections 17200 and 17500, as proved at trial.


4 3. The Court order Defendants to pay Plaintiff's attorneys fees and costs.

5 4. Plaintiff is given such other and further relief as the nature of this case may require
6 and that this Court deems equitable and proper to fully and successfully dissipate the effects of
7 the alleged violations of Business and Professions Code sections 17200 and 17500.
