



#### **Background**



## Useful Collections For Researching Americans of African Descent

- The Freedmen's Bureau Records (formally known as the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands)
  - In the years following the Civil War, the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands (the Freedmen's Bureau) provided assistance to tens of thousands of former slaves and impoverished whites in the Southern States and the District of Columbia. The Bureau was established in the War Department in 1865 to undertake the relief effort and the unprecedented social reconstruction that would bring freed people to full citizenship.
- U.S., Colored Troops Military Service Records, 1863-1865
  - Contains compiled military service records for the United States Colored Troops that volunteered to serve with the Union in the American Civil War.
- U.S., African American Photo Collection, 1850-2000
- Cohabitation Register Records
  - Cohabitation Registers provide critical insight into the formerly enslaved population's family connections and last slave owners. In many cases records found there among few documents to capture the marital relationships of newly freed formerly enslaved persons whose relationships dated back to their years of enslavement. The information was provided by the formerly enslaved themselves and is likely quite accurate to the best of their recollections.

### Getting Beyond The 1870 U.S. Census

- In 1850 and 1860, enslaved men, women, and children were not listed on the census population schedules, nor were their names typically recorded in birth, marriage, and death records or other go-to family history documents.
- Shift your attention to slave owners
- Manifests, property records, wills and probate records, manumission and emancipation papers, and newspapers all may mention the enslaved

To reach a sound conclusion, we need to meet all five components of the GPS.

- 1. Reasonably exhaustive research.
- 2. Complete and accurate source citations.
- 3. Thorough analysis and correlation.
- 4. Resolution of conflicting evidence.
- 5. Soundly written conclusion based on the strongest evidence.
