

1 *et seq.*) also known as “Proposition 65,” businesses with ten or more employees must provide a
2 “clear and reasonable warning” prior to exposing persons to these chemicals.

3 **II**

4 **PARTIES**

5 2. Plaintiff ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes,
6 helping safeguard the public from health hazards by reducing the use and misuse of hazardous and
7 toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees and encouraging
8 corporate responsibility.

9 3. Defendant MOUNTAIN MEADOW is a business that manufactures, distributes and/or
10 sells nutritional health products that have exposed users to lead in the State of California within the
11 relevant statute of limitations period. These “Covered Products” are: (1) “Dr. Clark Research
12 Association Uva Ursi 500 mg”, (2) “Pure Body Institute of Ventura Cleanse Purify Colon
13 Program”, (3) “Pure Body Institute of Ventura Cleanse Purify Whole Body Program”, and (4)
14 “Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit” (kit includes the following
15 products: a) “Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 1 Fiber Formula,”
16 b) “Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 2 Liver Cleanse Formula,”
17 and c) “Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 3 Metal Cleanse
18 Formula”).

19 4. MOUNTAIN MEADOW is a company subject to Proposition 65 as it employs ten or
20 more persons, and has employed ten or more persons at all times relevant to this action.

21 5. Defendants Does 1-100, are named herein under fictitious names, as their true names
22 and capacities are unknown to ERC. ERC is informed and believes, and thereon alleges, that each
23 of said Does is responsible, in some actionable manner, for the events and happenings hereinafter
24 referred to, either through said Defendant’s conduct, or through the conduct of its agents, servants
25 or employees, or in some other manner, causing the harms alleged by ERC in this complaint.
26 When said true names and capacities of Does are ascertained, ERC will seek leave to amend this
27 complaint to set forth the same.

1 **III**

2 **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

3 6. This Court has jurisdiction pursuant to California Constitution Article VI, Section 10
4 which grants the Superior Court original jurisdiction in all causes except those given by statute to
5 other trial courts. The statute under which this action is brought does not specify any other basis for
6 jurisdiction.

7 7. This Court has jurisdiction over MOUNTAIN MEADOW because, based on
8 information and belief, MOUNTAIN MEADOW is a business having sufficient minimum
9 contacts with California, or otherwise intentionally availing itself of the California market
10 through the distribution and sale of the Covered Products in the State of California to render the
11 exercise of jurisdiction over it by the California courts consistent with traditional notions of fair
12 play and substantial justice.

13 8. The Complaint is based on allegations contained in a Notice of Violation dated
14 January 31, 2014, served on the California Attorney General, other public enforcers and
15 MOUNTAIN MEADOW. The Notice of Violation constitutes adequate notice to MOUNTAIN
16 MEADOW because it provided adequate information to allow MOUNTAIN MEADOW to
17 assess the nature of the alleged violation, consistent with Proposition 65 and its implementing
18 regulations. Each copy of the Notice of Violation was accompanied by a certificate of merit and
19 a certificate of service, both of which comply with Proposition 65 and its implementing
20 regulations. The Notice of Violation served on MOUNTAIN MEADOW also included a copy of
21 “The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65): A Summary”.
22 Service of the Notice of Violation and accompanying documents complied with Proposition 65
23 and its implementing regulations. A true and correct copy of this Notice of Violation and
24 associated documents is attached hereto as Exhibit A. More than 60 days have passed since the
25 Notice of Violation was mailed and no public enforcement entity has filed a complaint in this
26 case.

27 9. This Court is the proper venue for the action because the causes of action have arisen in
28 the County of Alameda where some of the violations of law have occurred. Furthermore, this

1 Court is the proper venue under Code of Civil Procedure section 395.5 and Health & Safety Code
2 section 2524.

3 **IV**

4 **STATUTORY BACKGROUND**

5 10. The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 is an initiative statute
6 passed as “Proposition 65” by an overwhelming majority vote of the people in November of 1986.

7 11. The warning requirement of Proposition 65 is contained in Health & Safety Code
8 section 25249.6, which provides:

9 No person in the course of doing business shall knowingly and intentionally expose
10 any individual to a chemical known to the state to cause cancer or reproductive
11 toxicity without first giving clear and reasonable warning to such individual, except
as provided in Section 25249.10.

12 12. Implementing regulations for Proposition 65 define expose as “to cause to ingest,
13 inhale, contact via body surfaces or otherwise come into contact with a listed chemical.” An
14 individual may come into contact with a listed chemical through water, air, food, consumer
15 products and any other environmental exposure as well as occupational exposures.” (Cal. Code
16 Regs., tit. 27, § 25102, subd. (i).)

17 13. In this case, the exposures at issue are caused by consumer products. Implementing
18 regulations for Proposition 65 define a consumer product exposure as “ an exposure which results
19 from a person’s acquisition, purchase, storage, consumption, or other reasonably foreseeable use
20 of a consumer good, or any exposure that results from receiving a consumer service.” (Cal. Code
21 Regs., tit. 27, § 25602, subd. (b).)

22 14. Whenever a clear and reasonable warning is required under Health & Safety Code
23 section 25249.6, the “method employed to transmit the warning must be reasonably calculated
24 considering the alternative methods available under the circumstances, to make the warning
25 message available prior to exposure.” (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 27, § 25601.) The warning
26 requirement may be satisfied by a warning that appears on a product’s label or other labeling, shelf
27 labeling, signs, a system of signs, public advertising identifying the system and toll-free
28 information services, or any other, system, that provides clear and reasonable warnings. (Cal.

1 Code Regs., tit. 27, § 25603.1, subd. (a)-(d).)

2 15. Proposition 65 establishes a procedure by which the State is to develop a list of
3 chemicals “known to the State to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity.” (Health & Safety
4 Code, § 25249.8.) There is no duty to provide a clear and reasonable warning until 12-months
5 after the chemical was published on the State list. (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.10, subd. (b).)
6 Lead was listed as a chemical known to the State of California to cause developmental toxicity in
7 the fetus and male and female reproductive toxicity on February 27, 1987. Lead was listed as a
8 chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer on October 1, 1992. (Cal. Code Regs.,
9 tit. 27, § 27001.)

10 16. The Maximum Allowable Dose Level for lead as a chemical known to cause
11 developmental toxicity is 0.5 micrograms per day. (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 27, § 25805.) The No
12 Significant Risk Level for lead as a carcinogen is 15 micrograms per day. (Cal. Code Regs., tit.
13 27, § 25705.)

14 17. Proposition 65 may be enforced by any person in the public interest who provides
15 notice sixty days before filing suit to both the violator and designated law enforcement officials.
16 The failure of law enforcement officials to file a timely complaint enables a citizen suit to be filed
17 pursuant to Health & Safety Code section 25249.7, subdivisions (c) and (d).

18 18. Proposition 65 provides that any person “violating or threatening to violate”
19 Proposition 65 may be enjoined in any court of competent jurisdiction. (Health & Safety Code, §
20 25249.7, subd. (a).) To “threaten to violate” means “to create a condition in which there is a
21 substantial probability that a violation will occur.” (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.11, subd. (e).)
22 Furthermore, violators are subject to a civil penalty of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation.
23 (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.7, subd. (b)(1).

24 **V**

25 **STATEMENT OF FACTS**

26 19. MOUNTAIN MEADOW has manufactured, distributed and/or sold the Covered
27 Products containing lead to the State of California. Consumers have been ingesting these
28 products for many years, without any knowledge of their exposure to lead, a very dangerous

1 chemical.

2 20. For many years, MOUNTAIN MEADOW has knowingly and intentionally exposed
3 numerous persons to lead, without providing a Proposition 65 warning. Prior to ERC's Notice of
4 Violation, MOUNTAIN MEADOW failed to provide a warning on the label of the Covered
5 Products. MOUNTAIN MEADOW has at all times relevant hereto been aware that the Covered
6 Products contained lead and that persons using these products have been exposed to the chemical.
7 MOUNTAIN MEADOW's website represents to the public that it has a "state of the art GMP
8 certified and FDA inspected facility, where extreme attention to detail brings you amazing, potent,
9 liquid extracts you can use with confidence." The website further states that "[t]he fresh, pure
10 extracts of individual herbs are made daily" and that it is "home to carefully researched, safe and
11 highly effective herbal extracts and compounds." As a company that researches, formulates, and
12 manufactures dietary supplement products, MOUNTAIN MEADOW is undoubtedly aware of the
13 composition of its products. Nevertheless, company's website touts MOUNTAIN MEADOW's
14 commitment to consumers, and represents to the public that's its products are high quality and
15 safe. MOUNTAIN MEADOW has been aware of the lead in the Covered Products and has failed
16 to disclose the presence of this chemical to the public, who undoubtedly believed they have been
17 ingesting totally healthy and pure products.

18 21. Both prior and subsequent to ERC's Notice of Violation, MOUNTAIN MEADOW
19 failed to provide consumers of the Covered Products with a clear and reasonable warning that they
20 have been exposed to a chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer, birth defects
21 and other reproductive harm.

22 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

23 **(Violation of Section 25249.6 of the Health and Safety Code, Failure to Provide Clear**
24 **and Reasonable Warning under Proposition 65)**

25 22. ERC refers to paragraphs 1-21, inclusive, and incorporates them herein by this
26 reference.

27 23. By committing the acts alleged above, MOUNTAIN MEADOW has, in the course of
28 doing business, knowingly and intentionally exposed users of the Covered Products to lead, a

1 chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer, birth defects and other reproductive
2 harm without first giving clear and reasonable warning to such individuals, within the meaning of
3 Health & Safety Code section 25249.6.

4 24. Said violations render MOUNTAIN MEADOW liable for civil penalties up to
5 \$2,500 per day, for each violation.

6 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION**

7 **(Declaratory Relief)**

8 25. ERC refers to paragraphs 1-24, inclusive, and incorporates them herein by this
9 reference.

10 26. There exists an actual controversy relating to the legal rights and duties of the parties,
11 within the meaning of Code of Civil Procedure section 1060, between ERC and MOUNTAIN
12 MEADOW concerning whether MOUNTAIN MEADOW has exposed individuals to a chemical
13 known to the State of California to cause cancer, birth defects and other reproductive harm without
14 providing clear and reasonable warning.

15 **VI**

16 **PRAYER**

17 WHEREFORE ERC prays for relief as follows:

18 1. On the First Cause of Action, for civil penalties for each and every violation according
19 to proof;

20 2. On the First Cause of Action, and pursuant to Health & Safety Code section 25249.7,
21 subdivision (a), for such temporary restraining orders, preliminary and permanent injunctive
22 orders, or other orders, prohibiting MOUNTAIN MEADOW from exposing persons to lead
23 without providing clear and reasonable warning;

24 3. On the Second Cause of Action, for a declaratory judgment pursuant to Code of Civil
25 Procedure section 1060 declaring that MOUNTAIN MEADOW has exposed individuals to a
26 chemical known to the State of California to cause, birth defects and other reproductive harm
27 without providing clear and reasonable warning; and

1 4. On all Causes of Action, for reasonable attorneys' fees pursuant to section 1021.5 of the
2 Code of Civil Procedure or the substantial benefit theory;

3 5. For costs of suit herein; and

4 6. For such other relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

**NOTICE OF VIOLATIONS OF
CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTION 25249.5 ET SEQ.
(PROPOSITION 65)**

Dear Alleged Violator and the Appropriate Public Enforcement Agencies:

I represent Environmental Research Center (“ERC”), 3111 Camino Del Rio North, Suite 400, San Diego, CA 92108; Tel. (619) 500-3090. ERC’s Executive Director is Chris Heptinstall. ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes, helping safeguard the public from health hazards by bringing about a reduction in the use and misuse of hazardous and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees, and encouraging corporate responsibility.

ERC has identified violations of California’s Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (“Proposition 65”), which is codified at California Health & Safety Code §25249.5 *et seq.*, with respect to the products identified below. These violations have occurred and continue to occur because the alleged Violator identified below failed to provide required clear and reasonable warnings with these products. This letter serves as a notice of these violations to the alleged Violator and the appropriate public enforcement agencies. Pursuant to Section 25249.7(d) of the statute, ERC intends to file a private enforcement action in the public interest 60 days after effective service of this notice unless the public enforcement agencies have commenced and are diligently prosecuting an action to rectify these violations.

General Information about Proposition 65. A copy of a summary of Proposition 65, prepared by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, is an attachment with the copy of this letter served to the alleged Violator identified below.

Alleged Violator. The name of the company covered by this notice that violated Proposition 65 (hereinafter the “Violator”) is:

Mountain Meadow Herbs, Inc.

Consumer Products and Listed Chemicals. The products that are the subject of this notice and the chemical in those products identified as exceeding allowable levels are:

1. **Dr. Clark Research Association Uva Ursi 500 mg - Lead**
2. **Pure Body Institute of Ventura Cleanse Purify Colon Program - Lead**
3. **Pure Body Institute of Ventura Cleanse Purify Whole Body Program - Lead**
4. **Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit - Lead**
(kit includes the following products):
 - a) **Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 1 Fiber Formula**
 - b) **Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 2 Liver Cleanse Formula**
 - c) **Seychelles Organics Inc. Life-Flo Complete Body Cleanse Kit 3 Metal Cleanse Formula**

On February 27, 1987, the State of California officially listed lead as a chemical known to cause developmental toxicity, and male and female reproductive toxicity. On October 1, 1992, the State of California officially listed lead and lead compounds as chemicals known to cause cancer.

Exhibit A

It should be noted that ERC may continue to investigate other products that may reveal further violations and result in subsequent notices of violations.

Route of Exposure. The consumer exposures that are the subject of this notice result from the purchase, acquisition, handling and recommended use of these products. Consequently, the primary route of exposure to these chemicals has been and continues to be through ingestion, but may have also occurred and may continue to occur through inhalation and/or dermal contact.

Approximate Time Period of Violations. Ongoing violations have occurred every day since at least January 31, 2011, as well as every day since the products were introduced into the California marketplace, and will continue every day until clear and reasonable warnings are provided to product purchasers and users or until these known toxic chemicals are either removed from or reduced to allowable levels in the products. Proposition 65 requires that a clear and reasonable warning be provided prior to exposure to the identified chemicals. The method of warning should be a warning that appears on the product label. The Violator violated Proposition 65 because it failed to provide persons handling and/or using these products with appropriate warnings that they are being exposed to these chemicals.

Consistent with the public interest goals of Proposition 65 and a desire to have these ongoing violations of California law quickly rectified, ERC is interested in seeking a constructive resolution of this matter that includes an enforceable written agreement by the Violator to: (1) reformulate the identified products so as to eliminate further exposures to the identified chemicals, or provide appropriate warnings on the labels of these products; and (2) pay an appropriate civil penalty. Such a resolution will prevent further unwarned consumer exposures to the identified chemicals, as well as an expensive and time consuming litigation.

ERC has retained me as legal counsel in connection with this matter. **Please direct all communications regarding this Notice of Violations to my attention at the law office address and telephone number indicated on the letterhead.**

APPENDIX A

OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH HAZARD ASSESSMENT CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT OF 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and OEHHA's implementing regulations (see citations below) for further information.

FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BASIS FOR THE ALLEGATIONS IN THE NOTICE RELATED TO YOUR BUSINESS, CONTACT THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE NOTICE.

Proposition 65 appears in California law as Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13. The statute is available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65law72003.html>. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 27 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 25102 through 27001.¹ These implementing regulations are available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65Regs.html>.

WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?

The "Governor's List." Proposition 65 requires the Governor to publish a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. This means that chemicals are placed on the Proposition 65 list if they are known to cause cancer and/or birth defects or other reproductive harm, such as

damage to female or male reproductive systems or to the developing fetus. This list must be updated at least once a year. The current Proposition 65 list of chemicals is available on the OEHHA website at:

http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/Newlist.html.

Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under this law. Businesses that produce, use, release or otherwise engage in activities involving listed chemicals must comply with the following:

Clear and reasonable warnings. A business is required to warn a person before “knowingly and intentionally” exposing that person to a listed chemical unless an exemption applies; for example, when exposures are sufficiently low (see below). The warning given must be “clear and reasonable.” This means that the warning must: (1) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed. Some exposures are exempt from the warning requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

Prohibition from discharges into drinking water. A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Some discharges are exempt from this requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?

Yes. You should consult the current version of the statute and regulations (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/index.html>) to determine all applicable exemptions, the most common of which are the following:

Grace Period. Proposition 65 warning requirements do not apply until 12 months after the chemical has been listed. The Proposition 65 discharge prohibition does not apply to a discharge or release of a chemical that takes place less than 20 months after the listing of the chemical.

Governmental agencies and public water utilities. All agencies of the federal, state or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

Businesses with nine or fewer employees. Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees. This includes all employees, not just those present in California.

Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer. For chemicals that are listed as known to the State to cause cancer (“carcinogens”), a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses “no significant risk.” This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific “No Significant Risk Levels” (NSRLs) for many listed carcinogens. Exposures below these levels are exempt from the warning requirement. See OEHHA’s website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of NSRLs, and Section 25701 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question. For chemicals known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity, a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the “no observable effect level” divided by a 1,000. This number is known as the Maximum Allowable Dose Level (MADL). See OEHHA’s website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of MADLs, and Section 25801 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures to Naturally Occurring Chemicals in a Food. Certain exposures to chemicals that occur in foods naturally (i.e., that do not result from any known human activity, including activity by someone other than the person causing the exposure) are exempt from the warning requirements of the law. If the chemical is a contaminant² it must be reduced to the lowest level feasible. Regulations explaining this exemption can be found in Section 25501.

Discharges that do not result in a “significant amount” of the listed chemical entering into any source of drinking water. The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply if the discharger is able to demonstrate that a “significant amount” of the listed chemical has not, does not, or will not pass into or probably pass into a source of drinking water, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A “significant amount” means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the “no significant risk” level for chemicals that cause cancer or that is 1,000 times below the “no observable effect” level for chemicals that cause reproductive toxicity, if an individual were exposed to that amount in drinking water.

HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys. Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. The notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in Section 25903 of the regulations and in Title 11, sections 3100-3103. A private party may not pursue an independent enforcement action under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an action within sixty days of the notice.

A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court to stop committing the violation.
