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10 Plaintiffs Doris Charles, Alvin Jones, Jason Peltier and Jennifer Peltier ("Plaintiffs"),
11 individually and on behalf of themselves and all others similarly situated, are informed and believe,
12 and on that basis allege as follows:

13 **NATURE OF ACTION**

14 1. This action seeks, in part, to remedy the continuing failure of the Defendants to warn
15 California consumers of exposure to inorganic arsenic, which is a chemical known to the State of
16 California to cause cancer, birth defects and other reproductive harm. Under the Safe Drinking
17 Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, Health and Safety Code § 25249.6, a.k.a. "Proposition
18 65", businesses must provide persons with a "clear and reasonable warning" before exposing
19 individuals to chemicals known to the State of California to cause cancer or reproductive harm.
20 The purpose of this requirement is to ensure that California citizens are made fully aware of the
21 presence of toxic chemicals in consumer products, allowing them to make an informed
22 choice/decision about whether or not to consume products with excessive levels of toxic chemicals
23 known to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. Inorganic arsenic exposure has occurred, and
24 continues to occur, through the manufacturing, marketing, distribution, sale and consumption of
25 Defendants' wines identified below.

1 2. Inorganic arsenic is an odorless, colorless, and highly toxic poison known to cause
2 illness and death when ingested by humans. During the Middle Ages, arsenic was a favored form of
3 intentional poisoning among the privileged classes, primarily because it was both virtually
4 undetectable and extremely lethal (even in trace amounts over time). The deaths of Napoleon
5 Bonaparte, Simon Bolivar, King George III, Francesco De Medici, King Faisal I, and many other
6 prominent historical figures, whose deaths were believed at the time to have other mysterious
7 causes, were all, through the course of history, proven later to have been caused and/or accelerated
8 by arsenic poisoning.

9 3. California wines are among the most popular and widely consumed wines in the
10 world. The majority of responsible California wineries, through the use of: (1) proper grapes/juice
11 (as opposed to additives, concentrates, clarifiers and other chemicals); (2) proper filtering processes;
12 (3) proper specialized equipment; and (4) reduced manipulation and/or use of additives, clarifiers or
13 other chemicals; are able to successfully limit the amount of inorganic arsenic present in their wines
14 to "trace" levels considered acceptable (if not completely safe) for human consumption. However,
15 three separate testing laboratories skilled in arsenic testing have now independently confirmed that
16 several California wineries (including those named as Defendants in this action) instead produce
17 and market wines that contain dangerously high levels of inorganic arsenic, in some cases **up to**
18 **500% or more** than what is considered the maximum acceptable safe daily intake limit. **Put**
19 **differently, just a glass or two of these arsenic-contaminated wines a day over time could**
20 **result in dangerous arsenic toxicity to the consumer.**

21 4. Despite the known dangers/risks associated with human ingestion of this highly toxic
22 poison, and the fact that the responsible California wineries have been able to limit inorganic
23 arsenic levels in their wines to acceptable legal limits through responsible wine making and filtering
24 procedures, the Defendant wineries do not. Instead the Defendants manufacture, distribute, and/or
25 sell these arsenic-contaminated wines and conceal and fail to disclose, warn, or otherwise advise, to
26 their customers or to the ultimate consumers, the existence and/or the dangers/risks posed by the
27 toxic excessive levels of inorganic arsenic contamination in their wine.

1 5. This action is about a small number of California wineries who make up a
2 disproportionately larger share of the marketplace. The vast majority of California wineries are
3 compliant with California law/standards, and limit the amount of inorganic arsenic in their wines to
4 acceptable levels. However, Defendants manufacture, distribute and/or sell arsenic-contaminated
5 wine, including adding inorganic arsenic into the wine through the use of additives, concentrates
6 and clarifiers, in violation of California laws and labeling standards, which poses a risk to the
7 public, and unfairly undercuts those wine makers and sellers who do not make or sell arsenic tainted
8 wines. Responsible California wineries that employ proper methods and processes to reduce
9 inorganic arsenic to acceptable levels are unable to compete at the same price point in the wine
10 market with those wineries who choose instead not to implement the proper methods and processes
11 (and incur the costs thereof) to ensure their wine customers are not exposed to dangerous levels of
12 inorganic arsenic from their contaminated wines.

13 6. For years, Defendants have long known and/or should have known about the serious
14 health risks posed to their consumers by adding in, failing to limit and/or reducing the amount of
15 highly toxic inorganic arsenic in the offending wines. Yet instead of reducing the exposure to
16 acceptable levels as responsible wineries have done, Defendants have knowingly and recklessly
17 engaged in a consistent pattern and practice of selling arsenic-contaminated wine to California
18 consumers, without disclosing either the existence of the toxin in their product, or the health risks it
19 posed, thereby secretly poisoning wine consumers in direct violation of California law.

20 7. This is a "Proposition 65" action and consumer class action that seeks, among other
21 things, injunctive relief, civil penalties, disgorgement, and damages to remedy several years of
22 Defendants' negligent, reckless and/or knowing sale of inorganic arsenic contaminated wines, as
23 well as Defendants' failure to warn California wine consumers of the existence of, and the
24 dangers/risks associated with, consuming inorganic arsenic when they drink Defendants'
25 contaminated wines, identified in **Exhibit A**, attached hereto. Plaintiffs, upon information and
26 belief, further allege that Defendants are also in violation of California law for the years prior and
27 subsequent to the vintage identified for each wine/variety in **Exhibit A**. The State of California has
28 known, at least since 1987, that exposure to inorganic arsenic causes cancer and causes and/or

1 contributes to a host of other debilitating/fatal diseases including birth defects and reproductive
2 toxicity. This action further seeks to remedy Defendants' unfair, misleading and deceptive conduct,
3 and to ensure that all wine consumers are, at the very least, warned that they are being exposed to
4 toxic levels of inorganic arsenic before purchasing and/or consuming any of the Defendants' wine.

5 8. Pursuant to Proposition 65, Plaintiffs further seek injunctive relief enjoining
6 Defendants from the continued manufacturing, packaging, distribution, marketing and/or sale of the
7 wines listed below without clear and reasonable warnings regarding the risk of cancer posed by
8 exposure to inorganic arsenic through the consumption of these wines. Plaintiffs seek an injunctive
9 order compelling Defendants to bring their business practices into compliance with Proposition 65
10 by providing a clear and reasonable warning to each individual who has been in the past and who in
11 the future may be exposed to inorganic arsenic through consumption of these wines. Plaintiffs seek
12 an injunction prohibiting Defendants from offering these wines for sale in California without either
13 removing the excess levels of inorganic arsenic such that no Proposition 65 warning is necessary or
14 providing clear and reasonable warnings. Plaintiffs also seek an order compelling Defendants to
15 identify and locate each individual person who in the past has purchased these wines, and to provide
16 to each such purchaser a clear and reasonable warning that the consumption of these wines will
17 cause exposure to inorganic arsenic.

18 9. Also pursuant to Proposition 65, in addition to injunctive relief, Plaintiffs seek an
19 assessment of civil penalties of \$2,500 per day, per violation (i.e. per every bottle of offending wine
20 manufactured, distributed, marketed and sold without the clear and reasonable warning required by
21 law) to remedy Defendants' failure to provide clear and reasonable warnings regarding exposure to
22 inorganic arsenic.

6 manufacture, sell and/or distribute wine in California and throughout the United States and the
7 world. Jean-Claude Boisset Wines, USA, Inc., upon information and belief, is a subsidiary
8 company, with its principal place of business is located at 849 Zinfandel Lane, Saint Helena,
9 California; and Raymond Vineyard and Cellar/Raymond Vineyard and Cellar, Inc., upon
10 information and belief, are subsidiary companies, with their principal place of business located at

14 48. Plaintiffs are currently ignorant of the true names and capacities, whether individual,
15 corporate, associate, or otherwise, of the defendants sued herein under the fictitious names Does 1
16 through 200, inclusive, and therefore sue such defendants by such fictitious names. Plaintiffs will
17 amend this complaint to allege the true names and capacities of said fictitiously named defendants
18 when their true names and capacities have been ascertained. Plaintiffs are informed and believe and
19 thereon allege that each of the fictitiously named Doe defendants are legally responsible in some
20 manner for the events and occurrences alleged herein, and for the damages suffered by Plaintiffs
21 and members of the Class.

22 49. As sued herein, “Defendants” shall mean the above-named Defendants, including all
23 entities through which they do business and its predecessors, successors, affiliates, representatives,
24 attorneys, employees, and/or assigns who, in concert and/or acting as agents for one another,
25 engaged in the conduct complained of herein.

26 JURISDICTION AND VENUE

27 50. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to the California Constitution,
28 Article VI, §10, which grants the Superior Court “original jurisdiction in all causes except those

1 given by statute to other courts.” The statutes under which this action is brought do not specify any
2 other basis for jurisdiction.

3 51. The class action claims stated herein are brought pursuant to the California Code of
4 Civil Procedure § 382. The damages and restitution sought by Plaintiffs exceed the minimal
5 jurisdiction limit of the Superior Court and will be established according to proof at trial.

6 52. This Court has jurisdiction over the Defendants because, upon information and
7 belief, each Defendant is a citizen and/or resident of California.

8 53. On March 19, 2015, Plaintiffs sent a 60-Day Notice of Violation of Proposition 65
9 (“Notice”) to the requisite public enforcement agencies, and to the Defendants. A true and correct
10 copy of the Notice is attached hereto as **Exhibit B** and incorporated by reference. The Notice was
11 issued pursuant to, and in compliance with, the requirements of Health & Safety Code §25249.7(d)
12 and the statute’s implementing regulations regarding the notice of the violations to be given to
13 certain public enforcement agencies and to the violator.

14 54. On June 12, 2015, Plaintiffs sent an Amended 60-Day Notice of Violation of
15 Proposition 65 (“Amended Notice”), expressly adding reproductive toxicity, to the requisite public
16 enforcement agencies, and to the Defendants. A true and correct copy of the Amended Notice is
17 attached hereto as **Exhibit C** and incorporated by reference. The Amended Notice was issued
18 pursuant to, and in compliance with, the requirements of Health & Safety Code §25249.7(d) and the
19 statute’s implementing regulations regarding the notice of the violations to be given to certain
20 public enforcement agencies and to the violator.

21 55. At least 60 days have elapsed since Plaintiffs sent the Notice and the Amended
22 Notice to Defendants. Additionally, the appropriate public enforcement agencies have failed to
23 commence and diligently prosecute a cause of action under Health & Safety Code §25249.5, *et*.
24 *seq.*, based upon the allegations herein.

25 56. Venue is proper in this Court because, upon information and belief, all Defendants
26 reside in and/or transact business in this County and the acts and omissions alleged herein took
27 place in this County.

28

1 **GENERAL ALLEGATIONS**

2 57. All allegations in this complaint are based on information and belief that they will
3 have evidentiary support, after a reasonable opportunity for further investigation or discovery.
4 Whenever allegations in this complaint are contrary or inconsistent, such allegations shall be
5 deemed to be alleged in the alternative.

6 **FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS**

7 58. California contains the largest wine region in the United States. California has more
8 than 1,200 wineries, ranging from small boutique wineries to large corporations. California
9 wineries account for nearly 90 percent of American wine production, and are responsible for
10 producing more than 60% of all wine consumed in the country. If California were a separate
11 country, it would be the fourth largest wine producer in the world. According to the Wine Institute,
12 in 2013, California wine shipments within the United States alone were 215 million cases -
13 2,580,000,000 bottles of wine - with an estimated retail value of \$23.1 billion.

14 59. California wineries typically do not disclose the ingredients or chemicals (beyond
15 alcohol content and sulfites) that are present in the wine they are selling. Moreover, no government
16 regulatory agency is regularly monitoring or testing these wines to ensure that they are free from
17 developmental hazard and toxic poisons that could sicken or even kill consumers over time.
18 Specifically, no government agency is regularly testing wine for toxic ingredients such as inorganic
19 arsenic, leaving the wineries to police their own wines, and wine consumers to fend for themselves,
20 without regulatory protection or the necessary warnings to make an informed decision.

21 60. Wine may contain both organic and inorganic arsenic. Of these, inorganic arsenic is
22 substantially more toxic and dangerous to humans. Based upon independent sample testing on the
23 wines at issue in this complaint, inorganic arsenic makes up the overwhelming majority of the
24 arsenic in these wines. Inorganic arsenic is: (1) acutely toxic when introduced into the human body;
25 (2) proven to cause cancer; (3) known to cause and contribute to a host of reproductive harms and
26 debilitating illnesses, and (4) when consumed over time, increases the likelihood of early death.
27 The World Health Organization classifies inorganic arsenic as a "MAJOR PUBLIC HEALTH
28 CONCERN." Ingestion of arsenic can cause nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, severe diarrhea,

1 disturbances of the cardiovascular and nervous systems, and eventual death. Chronic arsenic
2 toxicity results in multi-system disease and has been linked to a variety of dermal symptoms
3 (exfoliative dermatitis, keratosis, vitiligo, skin cancer), peripheral neuropathy, encephalopathy,
4 bronchitis, pulmonary fibrosis, portal hypertension, peripheral vascular disease/“black foot disease,”
5 atherosclerosis, various cancers (including skin, bladder, lung, liver, kidney, nasal passage, prostate
6 and colon cancer) and diabetes mellitus.

7 61. Along with the alarming carcinogenicity of arsenic and its implication in multiple
8 cancers (including skin, bladder, lung, liver, kidney, nasal passages, prostate and colon), comes the
9 very real concern which has been identified in medical literature between arsenic toxicity, type 2
10 diabetes mellitus and obesity. This association is of the utmost importance, as incidence and
11 prevalence of type 2 diabetes and obesity have reached epidemic proportions representing a public
12 health emergency. Specifically, the U.S. Center for Disease Control projects that 1 in 3 of children
13 born in the year 2000 will become diabetic in their lifetime, and 1 in 2 among Hispanic females.

14 62. While inorganic arsenic is considered to be more toxic than organic arsenic, several
15 methyl and phenyl derivatives of arsenic such as monomethylarsonic acid (MMA), and dimethyl
16 arsenic acid (DMA) are of possible health concern as per the Agency for Toxic Substances and
17 Disease Registry (*ATSDR*) 2007 *Toxicological Profile for Arsenic* (1). The International Agency
18 for Research on Cancer has classified arsenic as a Class I human carcinogen. The U.S.
19 Environmental Protection Agency clearly states that the maximum contaminant level goal (MCLG)
20 for *any* arsenic is *zero*, based on the best available science to prevent potential health problems.
21 The resulting maximum contaminant level (MCL), which represents the enforceable target level for
22 arsenic in water, considers cost and feasibility and was set at 10 ppb. Of note, this measurement is
23 for *total* arsenic and does not consider or require any speciation analysis of organic versus
24 inorganic.

25 63. Defendants manufacture, distribute and/or sell wines labeled, marketed and intended
26 for immediate human consumption (without being made a constituent or ingredient of another
27 product, nor requiring substantial additional preparation), including but not limited to the wines
28 referenced herein. These wines are manufactured, distributed and/or sold in California.

1 64. Defendants produce, manufacture and/or distribute wine in California that contains
2 inorganic arsenic in amounts far in excess of what is allowed in drinking water. Defendants do not
3 warn that their products contain unsafe amounts of inorganic arsenic, nor do they disclose even the
4 existence of inorganic arsenic in the wine. Consequently, Defendants' California wine consumers
5 have been made unwitting "guinea pigs" of arsenic exposure, being involuntarily exposed to toxic
6 levels of inorganic arsenic over and over again by the Defendants. Even today, with the
7 sophisticated testing equipment available to wine makers and distributors, Defendants still conceal
8 and/or refuse to warn the typical California wine consumer about the true risks they are taking by
9 ingesting and consuming their product.

10 65. The wines at issue in this case contain toxic inorganic arsenic at levels that exceed
11 California Prop 65 standards, resulting in human ingestion/exposure to Class I carcinogens without
12 any disclosure or warning to the consumer.

13 66. Inorganic arsenic has long been known to be toxic to humans, and acceptable limits
14 of inorganic arsenic in food and drink have been repeatedly lowered over the years. It is now well-
15 understood that even very small amounts of inorganic arsenic can be harmful to humans.

16 67. During the four years preceding the filing of this complaint, in Los Angeles County,
17 California, Defendants sold, and Plaintiffs and the other members of the Class purchased
18 Defendants' wine, described above.

19 68. Plaintiffs and other similarly situated California consumers bought the wine
20 primarily for personal, family, or household purchases. Defendants know and intend that individuals
21 will consume their wines.

22 69. The named Defendants produce and distribute wine to California consumers at
23 inorganic arsenic levels significantly higher than what the State of California considers the
24 maximum acceptable limit for safe daily exposure.

25 70. The named Defendants also add the inorganic arsenic into these wines through the
26 use of one or more chemical additives, clarifiers, concentrates, fining agents, enzymes, tanning,
27 yeasts, cleansers and/or other chemicals added into the wines thereby eliminating any "safe harbor"
28 protections as they may otherwise exist under Prop 65.

1 71. Each of the Defendants manufacture and/or distribute and/or sell wine in California
2 containing toxic levels of inorganic arsenic, yet Defendants have failed, and continue to fail, to
3 comply with state health law standards or to provide the wine consumer with any warning of this
4 fact. Defendants knew and/or should have known of the toxic levels of inorganic arsenic in their
5 wines, yet continued to manufacture and/or distribute their toxic wine without disclosing or warning
6 of that fact, instead actively concealing such information from the general public.

7 72. Defendants' marketing and advertising of their wines was, and continues to be
8 unfair, untrue, deceptive and misleading. This conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- 9 (a) Failing to warn that Defendants' wine contains inorganic arsenic, a chemical
10 known to the State of California to cause cancer and other serious illnesses;
- 11 (b) Failing to warn that Defendants' wine contains levels of inorganic arsenic
12 widely considered to be unsafe and inappropriate for human consumption;
- 13 (c) Representing to Plaintiffs and similarly situated consumers and the general
14 public that Defendants' wines were safe and fit for human use, knowing that
15 said representations were false, and concealing from Plaintiffs and similarly
16 situated consumers and the general public that its wine contains inorganic
17 arsenic;
- 18 (d) Engaging in advertising programs designed to create the image, impression
19 and belief by consumers that Defendants' wines are safe and fit for human
20 use, even though Defendants knew this to be false, and even though
21 Defendants had no reasonable grounds to believe them to be true; and
- 22 (e) Purposefully downplaying and understating the health hazards and risks
23 associated with Defendants' wines.

24 73. Defendants could have taken measures to limit or reduce the amount of inorganic
25 arsenic levels in the offending wines to allowable levels, but did not do so in order to enjoy
26 additional profits at the expense of the wine consumer.

27 74. But for Defendants' unfair, untrue, deceptive and misleading conduct, Defendants
28 would not have been able to sell the wine and Plaintiffs and other similarly situated California

1 consumers would not have purchased the wine.

2 75. But for Defendants' unfair, untrue, deceptive and misleading conduct, Defendants
3 would have to warn consumers of the inorganic arsenic in its wine or take steps in the
4 manufacturing of the wine to prevent unsafe levels of inorganic arsenic from getting into the wine
5 or to reduce the unsafe levels of inorganic arsenic in the wine.

6 76. Plaintiffs and all other California consumers similarly situated are therefore entitled
7 to damages and full restitution of their purchases of Defendants' wines. All Plaintiffs, and all others
8 similarly situated are also entitled to injunctive relief to prevent the continued sale of wine with
9 excessive levels of inorganic arsenic. In addition, all consumers of Defendants' wines who were
10 denied the ability to make an informed choice as to whether to purchase the wines with excessive
11 levels of inorganic arsenic should be refunded the full purchase price of the wines.

12 77. As a result of Defendants' conduct described above, Plaintiffs and the Class have in
13 fact suffered economic injuries and lost money, including the purchase price of the wine, as
14 described herein.

15 **PROPOSITION 65 ALLEGATIONS**

16 78. Plaintiffs bring the Proposition 65 claim in the public interest pursuant to California
17 Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(d).

18 79. Health & Safety Code § 25249.6 provides:

19 No person in the course of doing business shall knowingly and intentionally
20 expose any individual to a chemical known to the state to cause cancer or
21 reproductive toxicity without first giving clear and reasonable warning to
22 such individual . . .

23 80. "Knowingly" refers only to knowledge of the fact that a discharge of, release of, or
24 exposure to a chemical listed pursuant to Section 25249.8(a) of the Act is occurring. "No
25 knowledge that the discharge, release or exposure is unlawful is required." (27 Cal. Code Regs, title
26 27, §25102(n)).

27 81. Proposition 65 also provides that any person "violating or threatening to violate" the
28 statute may be enjoined in a court of competent jurisdiction. (Health & Saf. Code § 25249.7) The

1 phrase “threatening to violate” is defined to mean creating “a condition in which there is a
2 substantial likelihood that a violation will occur.” (Health & Saf. Code § 25249.11(e)). Violators
3 are liable for civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation of the Act. (Health & Saf.
4 Code § 25249.7.)

5 82. Inorganic arsenic is listed by the State of California as a chemical known to cause
6 cancer. Inorganic arsenic is therefore subject to the “clear and reasonable” warning requirements of
7 Proposition 65 for cancer.

8 83. Due to the high toxicity of inorganic arsenic, for cancer-causing toxins, the “safe
9 harbor” is 10 µg/day (micrograms per day). (27 Cal. Code Regs., title 27, CR 25709(b).) However,
10 the commentary to the regulations makes clear that this “safe harbor” is **“not intended to be used
11 for substances that are added as chemicals to the products.”**

12 84. Defendants manufacture, distribute, market and/or sell in California certain wines
13 containing inorganic arsenic in levels exceeding that “safe harbor.”

14 85. Also, upon information and belief, some or all of the excess inorganic arsenic in the
15 offending wines is caused by chemicals added to the wine to filter, clarify, fine, sweeten, color,
16 stabilize or otherwise manipulate the wine product before sale.

17 86. To test Defendants’ wines, Plaintiffs relied on analytical testing by three separate
18 qualified testing laboratories at three different locations. These laboratories each engaged in testing
19 for total arsenic in the wines. One of the laboratories also conducted additional sample testing to
20 confirm the proportion of inorganic to organic arsenic present in the offending wines.

21 87. The results of the testing undertaken by these laboratories confirms that the products
22 tested were well in violation of the 10 µg/day “safe harbor” daily dose limit set forth in Proposition
23 65’s regulations, to the extent that “safe harbor” even applies under the law.

24 88. Inorganic arsenic is also listed by the State of California as a chemical known to
25 cause reproductive toxicity and birth defects (a “developmental toxin”). Inorganic arsenic is
26 therefore subject to the “clear and reasonable” warning requirements of Proposition 65 for
27 reproductive toxicity.

28 89. Since there is no Maximum Allowable Dose Level (“MADL”), to achieve a “safe

1 harbor”, the named Defendants must demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable
2 effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. See, 27 Cal. Code of Regs, title 27, § 25801 *et*
3 *seq.* Clearly, at 1,000 times the inorganic arsenic level in question, the named Defendants are unable
4 to show “no observable effect”.

5 90. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants have knowingly exposed wine
6 consumers to inorganic arsenic in the offending wines without clear and reasonable warning to such
7 individuals.

8 91. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants have failed to place a clear and
9 reasonable Proposition 65 warning for inorganic arsenic, disclosing its cancer-causing and
10 reproductive toxic effects, on its wines.

11 92. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants’ sales representatives have failed to
12 warn consumers that its wines contain cancer-causing and/or reproductively toxic inorganic arsenic.

13 93. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants have failed to place a clear and
14 reasonable Proposition 65 warning for inorganic arsenic on its marketing materials.

15 94. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants have failed to place a clear and
16 reasonable Proposition 65 warning for inorganic arsenic on store shelves.

17 95. At all times relevant to this action, Defendants have failed to place a clear and
18 reasonable Proposition 65 warning for inorganic arsenic on its website.

19 **CLASS ALLEGATIONS**

20 96. Plaintiffs bring the class action claims on their own behalf and on behalf of all
21 persons similarly situated pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure § 382. Plaintiffs seek to represent
22 the following Class:

23 **All persons residing in California who purchased any of the Wines**
24 **Listed on Exhibit A of any vintage from January 1, 2011 through the**
25 **present.**

26 97. Upon information and belief, the scope of this Class definition, including its
27 temporal scope, may be further refined after discovery of Defendants’ and/or third party records.

28 98. Excluded from the Class are governmental entities, Defendants, any entity in which

1 Defendants have a controlling interest, and Defendants' officers, directors, affiliates, legal
2 representatives, employees, successors, subsidiaries, and assigns. Also excluded from the Class is
3 any judge, justice, or judicial officer presiding over this matter and the members of their immediate
4 families and judicial staff.

5 99. All members of the Class, and any subclass that may be certified, were and are
6 similarly affected by Defendants' conduct or omission regarding the non-disclosure of the toxic
7 substances in the product, and the relief sought herein is for the benefit of Plaintiffs and members of
8 the Class and any subclass.

9 100. Plaintiffs' claims are typical of the claims of the Class. Plaintiffs are a member of
10 the Class they seek to represent. Plaintiffs are members of a Class of California consumers, and the
11 members of this Class of consumers were similarly situated and similarly affected by the conduct
12 alleged of Defendants and incurred similar damage, as alleged in this complaint, as a result of
13 Defendants' conduct. Members of the Class are ascertainable from Plaintiffs' description of the
14 Class and/or Defendants' records and/or records of third parties accessible through discovery.

15 101. The representative Plaintiffs will fairly and adequately represent the members of the
16 Class and have no interests that are antagonistic to the claims of the Class. Plaintiffs' interests in
17 this action are antagonistic to the interests of Defendants, and they will vigorously pursue the claims
18 of the Class.

19 102. The representative Plaintiffs have retained counsel who are competent and
20 experienced in consumer class action litigation, and have successfully represented consumers in
21 complex class actions.

22 103. Common questions of law or fact impact the rights of each member of the Class and
23 a common remedy by way of permissible damages, restitutionary disgorgement and/or injunctive
24 relief is sought for the Class.

25 104. There are numerous and substantial questions of law or fact common to all members
26 of the Class that will predominate over any individual issues, including but not limited to:

- 27 (a) whether Defendants' wines contain unacceptably high levels of inorganic
28 arsenic;

- 1 (b) whether Defendants were required or had a duty to disclose to the Class that
2 their wines contain unacceptably high levels of inorganic arsenic;
- 3 (c) whether the Class has been damaged as a result of Defendants' conduct;
- 4 (d) whether the Defendants have been unjustly enriched by their conduct;
- 5 (e) whether Defendants' conduct violated California law; and
- 6 (f) whether the Class members are the beneficiaries of a warranty and if that
7 warranty has been breached.

8 105. A class action provides a fair and efficient method, if not the only method, for
9 adjudicating this controversy. The substantive claims of the representative Plaintiffs and the Class
10 are nearly identical and will require evidentiary proof of the same kind and application of the same
11 law.

12 106. A class action is superior to other available methods for the fair and efficient
13 adjudication of this controversy because the number of Class members is believed to be at least in
14 the thousands and individual joinder is impracticable. The expense and burden of individual
15 litigation would make it impracticable or impossible for proposed Class members to prosecute their
16 claims individually. Trial of Plaintiffs' and the Class members' claims are manageable. Unless a
17 Class is certified, Defendants will be unjustly enriched at the expense of Class members.

18 107. There is no plain, speedy, or adequate remedy other than by maintenance of this
19 class action because Plaintiffs are informed and believe that damage to each member of the Class is
20 relatively small, making it economically unfeasible to pursue remedies other than by way of a class
21 action.

22 108. The persons in the Class are so numerous that the joinder of all such persons
23 individually in this case is impracticable, and the disposition of their claims in this case and as part
24 of a single class action lawsuit, rather than thousands of individual lawsuits, will benefit the parties
25 and greatly reduce the aggregate judicial resources that would be spent if this matter were handled
26 as thousands of separate lawsuits.

27 109. Plaintiffs know of no difficulty that will be encountered in the management of this
28 litigation, which would preclude its maintenance of a class action.

1 110. Defendants have acted on grounds generally applicable to the entire Class, thereby
2 making final injunctive relief or corresponding declaratory relief appropriate with respect to the
3 Class as a whole. Prosecution of separate actions by individual members of the Class would create
4 the risk of inconsistent or varying adjudications with respect to individual members of the Class that
5 would establish incompatible standards of conduct for the Defendants.

6 111. Without a class action, Defendants will likely retain the benefit of their wrongdoing
7 and will continue a course of action that will result in further damages to Plaintiffs and the Class.
8 Plaintiffs envision no difficulty in the management of this action as a class action.

9 112. On the basis of all of the facts alleged hereinabove, Defendants' conduct and actions
10 were despicable, and were done maliciously, oppressively and fraudulently, with a willful and
11 conscious disregard of Plaintiffs' rights, thereby subjecting Plaintiffs to unjust hardship and distress,
12 entitling Plaintiffs to punitive damages under Cal. Civ. Code § 3294. Defendants' officers,
13 directors and managing agents were personally informed and involved in the decision-making
14 process with respect to the misconduct alleged herein and to be proven at trial.

15 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

16 **(Violations Of California Health & Safety Code § 25249.5, *et seq.*)**

17 **(By Plaintiffs, Individually, in the Public Interest Against all Defendants)**

18 113. Plaintiffs re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations contained in the
19 preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

20 114. Proposition 65 (The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act, California
21 Health and Safety Code § 25249.5, *et seq.*) is a "right-to-know" law. It requires businesses to warn
22 California consumers before exposing them to chemicals known to cause birth defects or cancer, by
23 including that information on the product's label. The intent of Proposition 65 is to protect
24 California citizens from exposure to chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other
25 reproductive harm, and to inform California citizens about exposure to such chemicals.

26 115. Proposition 65 requires the State of California to maintain and update a list of
27 chemicals known by the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity. One of the chemicals on that
28 list is inorganic arsenic. If a listed chemical exists in wine, the wine must be labeled to disclose the

1 existence of the toxic chemical to the general public.

2 116. Proposition 65 also requires the State of California to keep a list of No Significant
3 Risk Levels (NSRLs) and Maximum Allowable Dosage Levels (MADLs), which establish “safe
4 harbor” levels for products containing listed toxic chemicals. As to cancer, if the amount of the
5 toxic chemical in the product is below the “safe harbor” limit, then it is exempt from liability under
6 Proposition 65. The “safe harbor” limits for ingestion of inorganic arsenic compounds is 10
7 µg/day. However, the commentary to the regulations makes clear that this safe harbor defense is
8 “not intended to be used for substances that are added as chemicals to products.” Upon information
9 and belief, some or all of the inorganic arsenic in the offending wines is the result of chemical
10 additives and, therefore, do not provide Defendants with safe harbor protection. Regardless, each of
11 the Defendants’ wine products identified in this complaint exceed the “safe harbor” provisions
12 under Proposition 65. Specific to reproductive toxicity, the standard is even more stringent and the
13 amount of inorganic arsenic in these wines also clearly exceed acceptable levels for reproductive
14 toxicity under Prop 65.

15 117. Defendants’ wines cause exposure to excessive levels of inorganic arsenic.
16 Therefore, Proposition 65 requires Defendants to provide a clear and reasonable warning that the
17 ingestion of their wines causes exposure to inorganic arsenic, a chemical known to the State of
18 California to cause cancer and reproductive toxicity. Defendants have failed to provide the required
19 warnings.

20 118. Plaintiffs are informed and reasonably believe that the Defendants knew and or
21 reasonably should have known that the foreseeable consumption of their wines results in exposure
22 to inorganic arsenic, thus requiring the warnings required by Proposition 65.

23 119. Defendants know and intend that Plaintiffs will consume their wines, thus exposing
24 Plaintiffs to inorganic arsenic.

25 120. By manufacturing, supplying and/or distributing wines containing inorganic arsenic
26 without first providing a clear and reasonable warning, Defendants have engaged and continue to
27 engage in conduct which violates Health and Safety Code § 25249.6.

28 121. Proposition 65 provides that any person “violating or threatening to violate” the

1 statue may be enjoined by any court of competent jurisdiction. (Health & Saf. Code § 25249.7.)

2 122. Violators of Proposition 65 are liable for civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day per
3 violation, recoverable in a civil action. (Health & Saf. Code § 25249.7(b).)

4 123. Some containers of the wines manufactured and/or distributed by the Defendants
5 remain unopened and have not yet exposed a person to inorganic arsenic, but the wine in those
6 containers will expose Plaintiffs to inorganic arsenic when consumed. These containers require “a
7 clear and reasonable warning” prior to exposure.

8 124. By engaging in this conduct, Defendants are liable, pursuant to § 25249.7(b), for
9 civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day per bottle sold.

10 125. By continuing to engage in this conduct even after the Notice of Violation has been
11 given, the Defendants have caused irreparable harm to the citizens of the State of California for
12 which there is no plain, speedy or adequate remedy at law.

13 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION**

14 **(Violation of Consumers Legal Remedies Act – Cal. Civ. Code §§ 1750, *et seq.*)**

15 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members Against all Defendants)**

16 126. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
17 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

18 127. Plaintiffs are “consumers” within the meaning of Cal. Civ. Code § 1761(d).

19 128. Defendants have engaged in deceptive practices, unlawful methods of competition,
20 and/or unfair acts as defined by Cal. Civ. Code §§ 1750, *et seq.*, to the detriment of Plaintiffs and
21 members of the Class. The following deceptive practices have been intentionally, knowingly, and
22 unlawfully perpetrated upon Plaintiffs and members of the Class by Defendants:

23 (a) In violation of Cal. Civ. Code § 1770(a)(2), Defendants misrepresented the
24 source, sponsorship, approval, or certification of goods or services;

25 (b) In violation of Cal. Civ. Code § 1770(a)(5), Defendants represented that
26 goods or services have sponsorship, approval, characteristics, ingredients, uses,
27 benefits, or quantities which they do not have;
28

1 (c) In violation of Cal. Civ. Code § 1770(a)(7), Defendants represented that
2 goods or services are of a particular standard, quality, or grade, or that goods are of a
3 particular style or model, if they are of another;

4 (d) In violation of Cal. Civ. Code § 1770(a)(9), Defendants advertised goods or
5 services with intent not to sell them as advertised.

6 129. As a result of the use or employment by Defendants of the above-alleged methods,
7 acts, and practices, Plaintiff and the Class suffered damage within the meaning of Cal. Civ. Code §
8 1780(a), entitling them to, *inter alia*, restitution, injunctive relief, attorneys' fees and costs.
9 Plaintiffs and the Class further intend to seek compensatory damages, and, in light of Defendants'
10 willful and conscious disregard for the rights of Plaintiffs and the Class, and in light of Defendants'
11 intentional and fraudulent concealment of material facts, Plaintiffs and the Class also intend to seek
12 an award of punitive damages. Pursuant to Cal. Civ. Code § 1782(a), Plaintiffs will serve
13 defendants with notice of alleged violations of the CLRA by certified mail return receipt requested.
14 If within 30 days after the date of such notification Defendants fail to provide appropriate relief for
15 the violations of the CLRA, Plaintiffs will amend this complaint to seek monetary damages (both
16 compensatory and punitive) under the CLRA.

17 130. Plaintiffs and the Class request an injunction requiring Defendants to stop selling
18 wine to the public with excessive levels of inorganic arsenic.

19 **THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION**

20 **(Unfair Business Practices – Business & Professions Code §§ 17200, *et seq.*)**

21 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members Against all Defendants)**

22 131. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
23 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein

24 132. California Business & Professions Code §17200 provides that unfair competition
25 shall mean and include “all unlawful, unfair or fraudulent business practices and unfair, deceptive,
26 untrue or misleading advertising.”

27 133. Defendants' business practices are unlawful under Business & Professions Code §§
28 17200, *et seq.* by virtue of, among other things, Defendants' violations of Health & Safety Code §§

1 25249.5, *et seq.*

2 134. Defendants' business practices are unfair under California Business & Professions
3 Code section 17200 because it exposes, without warning, California wine consumers to excessive
4 levels of arsenic, potentially damaging to their health, without warning.

5 135. Defendants' business practices are fraudulent under Business & Professions Code §§
6 17200, *et seq.* because Defendants fail to warn of the high levels of arsenic, which conduct is
7 deceptive and likely to mislead the public.

8 136. As a result of Defendants' illegal business practices, Plaintiffs and the members of
9 the Class are entitled to an order, pursuant to Business and Professions Code §17203, enjoining
10 such future conduct and such other orders and judgments that may be necessary to provide
11 restitutionary disgorgement of Defendants' ill-gotten gains and to restore to any Class member any
12 money paid for the tainted wine.

13 **FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

14 **(Misleading and Deceptive Advertising – Business & Professions Code, §§ 17500, *et seq.*)**

15 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members Against all Defendants)**

16 137. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
17 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

18 138. California Business & Professions Code §17500 provides that it is unlawful for any
19 person, firm, corporation, or association to dispose of property or perform services, or to induce the
20 public to enter into any obligation relating thereto, through the use of untrue or misleading
21 statements.

22 139. By engaging in the conduct described above, Defendants have committed acts of
23 disseminating untrue and misleading statements as defined by California Business & Professions
24 Code §§ 17500, *et seq.*

25 140. The foregoing practices constitute false and misleading advertising within the
26 meaning of California Business & Professions Code §§ 17500, *et seq.*

27 141. As a result of its conduct described above, Defendants have and will be unjustly
28 enriched. Specifically, Defendants have been unjustly enriched by receipt of ill-gotten gains from

1 the sale of the wine, sold in large part as a result of the acts and omissions described herein.

2 142. Pursuant to California Business California Business & Professions Code § 17535,
3 Plaintiffs seek an order of this court compelling the Defendants to provide restitution, damages and
4 injunctive relief calling for Defendants to cease such false and misleading advertising in the future.

5 **FIFTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

6 **(Unjust Enrichment)**

7 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members against all Defendants)**

8 143. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
9 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

10 144. As a result of Defendants' deceptive marketing and sale of its wine products, as
11 described above, Defendants were enriched, at the expense of Plaintiffs and those similarly situated,
12 through the payment of the purchase price for the wine.

13 145. Under the circumstances, it would be against equity and good conscience to permit
14 Defendants to retain the ill-gotten benefits that it received from Plaintiffs and those similarly
15 situated, in light of the fact that the wines purchased by Plaintiffs, and those similarly situated, was
16 not what Defendants purported it to be, *i.e.*, a product safe for human consumption and free of
17 toxins at any level for which labeling and disclosure was required. This, it would be unjust or
18 inequitable for Defendants to retain the benefit without restitution to the Plaintiffs, and those
19 similarly situated, for monies paid to Defendants for the wine.

20 **SIXTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

21 **(Breach Of The Implied Warranty Of Merchantability)**

22 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members against all Defendants)**

23 146. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
24 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

25 147. Plaintiffs and other Class members purchased Defendants' wine product, which were
26 marketed and sold as compliant with California state disclosure requirements and free of toxins at
27 any level for which labeling and disclosure were required. Pursuant to these sales, Defendants
28 impliedly warranted that its wine products would be merchantable and fit for the ordinary purpose

1 for which such goods are used. They were not.

2 148. As a proximate result of this breach of warranty by Defendants, Plaintiffs and Class
3 members have suffered damages in an amount to be determined at trial. In addition, Plaintiffs and
4 Class members were deprived of the benefit of their bargain and spent money on Defendants' wine
5 products, without being told it contained un-safe levels of toxic inorganic arsenic that made it unfit
6 for human consumption.

7 **SEVENTH CAUSE OF ACTION**

8 **(Negligent Misrepresentation/Omission)**

9 **(By Plaintiffs and all Class Members Against all Defendants)**

10 149. Plaintiffs and the Class re-allege and incorporate by reference the allegations
11 contained in the preceding paragraphs of this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

12 150. Defendants owed a duty to Plaintiffs and Class members to exercise reasonable care
13 in making representations and disclosures about their wine when sold to consumers.

14 151. Defendants knew, or should have known by the exercise of reasonable care, that the
15 wine contained unsafe amounts of inorganic arsenic and thus should not have sold the wine to
16 consumers without proper labeling and disclosure of the risks of consumption.

17 152. Plaintiffs and the Class members believed, and relied upon, Defendants' label
18 disclosures (or lack thereof) regarding the potential risks posed to consumers when deciding which
19 wine to purchase, and how much to pay for the wine.

20 153. As a direct and proximate result of Defendants' negligent and/or reckless conduct,
21 Plaintiff and the Class have been damaged in an amount to be proven at trial.

22 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

23 WHEREFORE Plaintiffs, individually and on behalf of all others similarly situated, and on
24 behalf of the general public, pray for judgment against Defendants as follows:

25 1. For an order certifying the class claims as a class action, and appointing Plaintiffs
26 and their counsel to represent the Class;

27 2. For a declaratory judgment that Defendants' exposure to inorganic arsenic to
28 consumers when drinking their wines is unlawful;

1 3. For an order requiring Defendants, at its own cost, to notify all Class members of the
2 unlawful and deceptive conduct herein;

3 4. For an order, pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b), compelling
4 Defendants to identify and locate each individual to whom the offending wines were sold in the past
5 four years, and to provide a warning to such person that consumption of the offending wines will
6 expose them to chemicals known to cause cancer;

7 5. For an order, pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b) enjoining Defendants,
8 their agents, employees, assigns and all persons acting in concert or participating with Defendants
9 in the manufacture, distribution or sale of the offending wines from either reformulating the wines
10 to remove the excess arsenic such that no Proposition 65 warning is necessary or providing a clear
11 and reasonable warning, within the meaning of Proposition 65, that the consumers of these wines
12 will be exposed to excessive levels of inorganic arsenic exposing them to increased risks of cancer
13 and birth defects or other reproductive harms;

14 6. For an order requiring Defendants to make full disclosure of the risks of consuming
15 inorganic arsenic from their wines on the wine's label such that it complies with all applicable food
16 labeling rules and regulations;

17 7. For an order requiring Defendants to stop adding inorganic arsenic into their wines a
18 as a chemical additive and/or clarifier or in any other manner;

19 8. For an order requiring Defendants to engage in corrective advertising regarding the
20 conduct discussed above;

21 9. For assessment of civil penalties pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b)
22 against Defendants in the amount of \$2,500 per day for each violation of Proposition 65;

23 10. For an order awarding, as appropriate, compensatory damages and restitutionary
24 disgorgement to Plaintiffs and the Class;

25 11. For an order enjoining Defendants from continuing to market, advertise, distribute,
26 and sell these products in the unlawful manner described herein, and ordering Defendants to engage
27 in corrective action;

28 12. For all remedies available pursuant to the Civil Code;


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13. For an order awarding attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5 or any other applicable provision(s) of law, as Plaintiffs shall specify in further application to the Court;

- 14. For an order awarding punitive damages;
- 15. For an order awarding pre- and post-judgment interest; and
- 16. For an order providing such further relief as this Court deems proper.

Route of Exposure: The principal route of exposure with regard to the arsenic (inorganic compounds) was through ingestion.



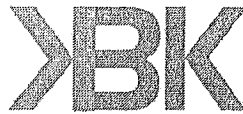
Doris Charles, Alvin Jones, Jason Peltier, and Jennifer Peltier (“the Noticing Parties”) serve this Notice of Violation (“Notice”) on each of the entities listed on the distribution list (“Noticed Party”) pursuant to and in compliance with California Health and Safety Code § 25249.7(d) and 27 California Code of Regulations § 25903.

This Amended Notice satisfies a prerequisite for the Noticing Parties to commence an action against each Noticed Party to enforce the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (“Proposition 65”). The Noticing Parties intend to bring an enforcement action sixty (60) days after effective service of this Notice, unless the public enforcement agencies have commenced an action to rectify the violations discussed in this Notice. This Amended Notice is being served upon each Noticed Party, the California Attorney General and the district attorney of every county in which a violation is alleged to have occurred, and upon the city attorneys of any cities with populations according to the most recent decennial census of over 750,000 and in which the violation is alleged to have occurred. Where the alleged violator has a current registration with the California Secretary of State that identifies a Chief Executive Officer, President, or General Counsel of the corporation, the Notice is addressed to one of those persons.

Attached as Exhibit A to this Amended Notice is a copy of the “The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65): A Summary.” The attached Summary was prepared by the California Environmental Protection Agency and provides general information about Proposition 65.

A description of Noticing Parties, each Noticed Party, and the alleged violations addressed by this Notice are as follows:

The Noticing Parties: This Notice is provided by Doris Charles, Alvin Jones, Jason Peltier, and Jennifer Peltier. The Noticing Parties are acting in the public interest pursuant to California Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(d) and are dedicated to protecting the health of all Californians. The Noticing Parties are located in Los Angeles and San Diego Counties in the State of California.

The Alleged Violator: The Alleged Violators are each of the entities listed in the distribution list accompanying the attached Certificate of Service. Each of the Alleged Violators are believed to be in violation of California Health & Safety Code § 25249.6.

The Violation and the Chemical Involved: On February 27, 1987, the State of California officially listed arsenic (inorganic arsenic compounds) as a chemical known to the State to cause cancer. On May 1, 1997, the State officially listed arsenic (inorganic arsenic oxides) as a chemical known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity (developmental). Each Noticed Party has knowingly and intentionally exposed and continues to knowingly and intentionally expose consumers within the State of California to arsenic (inorganic arsenic compounds) at levels that exceed the No Significant Risk Level without providing clear and reasonable warning of this exposure. Each Noticed Party has knowingly and intentionally exposed and continues to knowingly and intentionally expose consumers within the State of California to arsenic (inorganic arsenic oxides) at levels that exceed the Maximum Allowable Dose Level without providing clear and reasonable warning of this exposure.

The Consumer Products: The products that are subject of this Notice are the particular wine products listed and sold by the corresponding entities listed on the distribution list. These wine products are produced, manufactured, and/or distributed by each of the Noticed Parties.

Route of Exposure: The principal route of exposure with regard to the arsenic (inorganic compounds and inorganic oxides) was through ingestion.


The Duration of the Violations: The violations addressed by this Notice began on or after January 2011, have occurred on every day since January 2011, and are ongoing and continuing.



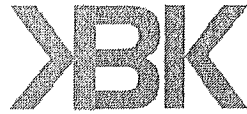

OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH HAZARD ASSESSMENT CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT OF 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and OEHHA's implementing regulations (see citations below) for further information.

FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BASIS FOR THE ALLEGATIONS IN THE NOTICE RELATED TO YOUR BUSINESS, CONTACT THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE NOTICE.

Proposition 65 appears in California law as Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13. The statute is available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65law72003.html>. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 27 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 25102 through 27001.¹ These implementing regulations are available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65Regs.html>.

WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?

The "Governor's List." Proposition 65 requires the Governor to publish a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. This means that chemicals are placed on the Proposition 65 list if they are known to cause cancer and/or birth defects or other reproductive harm, such as damage to female or male reproductive systems or to the developing fetus. This list

must be updated at least once a year. The current Proposition 65 list of chemicals is available on the OEHHA website at:
http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/Newlist.html.

Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under this law. Businesses that produce, use, release or otherwise engage in activities involving listed chemicals must comply with the following:

Clear and reasonable warnings. A business is required to warn a person before “knowingly and intentionally” exposing that person to a listed chemical unless an exemption applies; for example, when exposures are sufficiently low (see below). The warning given must be “clear and reasonable.” This means that the warning must: (1) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed. Some exposures are exempt from the warning requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

Prohibition from discharges into drinking water. A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Some discharges are exempt from this requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?

Yes. You should consult the current version of the statute and regulations (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/index.html>) to determine all applicable exemptions, the most common of which are the following:

Grace Period. Proposition 65 warning requirements do not apply until 12 months after the chemical has been listed. The Proposition 65 discharge prohibition does not apply to a discharge or release of a chemical that takes place less than 20 months after the listing of the chemical.

Governmental agencies and public water utilities. All agencies of the federal, state or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

Businesses with nine or fewer employees. Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees. This includes all employees, not just those present in California.

Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer. For chemicals that are listed as known to the State to cause cancer ("carcinogens"), a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses "no significant risk." This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific "No Significant Risk Levels" (NSRLs) for many listed carcinogens. Exposures below these levels are exempt from the warning requirement. See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of NSRLs, and Section 25701 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question. For chemicals known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity, a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the "no observable effect level" divided by a 1,000. This number is known as the Maximum Allowable Dose Level (MADL). See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of MADLs, and Section 25801 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures to Naturally Occurring Chemicals in a Food. Certain exposures to chemicals that occur in foods naturally (i.e., that do not result from any known human activity, including activity by someone other than the person causing the exposure) are exempt from the warning requirements of the law. If the chemical is a contaminant² it must be reduced to the lowest level feasible. Regulations explaining this exemption can be found in Section 25501.

Discharges that do not result in a "significant amount" of the listed chemical entering into any source of drinking water. The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply if the discharger is able to demonstrate that a "significant amount" of the listed chemical has not, does not, or will not pass into or probably pass into a source of drinking water, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A "significant amount" means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the "no significant risk" level for chemicals that cause cancer or that is 1,000 times below the "no observable effect" level for chemicals that cause reproductive toxicity, if an individual were exposed to that amount in drinking water.

HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys. Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. The notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in Section 25903 of the regulations and in Title 11, sections 3100-3103. A private party may not pursue an independent enforcement action under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an action within sixty days of the notice.

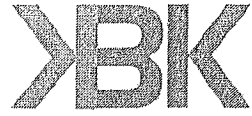
A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court to stop committing the violation.
