



COMPLAINT FOR CIVIL PENALTIES
AND INJUNCTIVE RELIEF

(Violation of Health & Safety Code §25249.5
et seq.)

18 Plaintiff Ema Bell ("Plaintiff"), by and through her attorneys, alleges the following cause
19 of action in the public interest of the citizens of the State of California.

BACKGROUND OF THE CASE

20 1. Plaintiff brings this representative action on behalf of all California citizens to
21 enforce relevant portions of Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, codified
22 as the Health and Safety Code § 25249.5 et seq. ("Proposition 65"), which reads, in relevant part,
23 "In no person in the course of doing business shall knowingly and intentionally expose any
24 individual to a chemical known to the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity without first
25 giving clear and reasonable warning to such individual ..." Health & Safety Code § 25249.6.

26 2. This complaint is a representative action brought by Plaintiff in the public interest
27 of the citizens of the State of California to enforce the People's right to be informed of the health
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1 hazards caused by exposure to Diisononyl phthalate (DINP), a toxic chemical found in Carex
2 Cast Protectors manufactured, sold and/or distributed in California by defendants Compass
3 Health Brands Corp. (“Compass Health”), Acorn Development Companies, Inc. (“Acorn”),
4 Apex Medical Corporation (“Carex”), and Rite Aid Corp. (“Rite Aid”) (collectively, the
5 “Defendants”) in California.

6 3. DINP is a harmful chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer. On
7 December 20, 2013, the State of California listed DINP as a chemical known to the State to
8 cause cancer and it has come under the purview of Proposition 65 regulations since that time.
9 Cal. Code Regs. Tit. 27, § 27001(c); Health & Safety Code §§ 25249.8 & 25249.10(b).

10 4. Proposition 65 requires all businesses with ten (10) or more employees that
11 operate within California or sell products therein to comply with Proposition 65 regulations.
12 Included in such regulations is the requirement that businesses must label any product containing
13 a Proposition 65-listed chemical with a “clear and reasonable” warning before “knowingly and
14 intentionally” exposing any person to it.

15 5. Proposition 65 allows for civil penalties of up to \$2,500.00 per day per violation
16 to be imposed upon defendants in a civil action for violations of Proposition 65. Health & Safety
17 Code § 25249.7(b). Proposition 65 also allows for any court of competent jurisdiction to enjoin
18 the actions of a defendant which “violate[s] or threaten[s] to violate” the statute. Health &
19 Safety Code § 25249.7.

20 6. Plaintiff alleges that Defendants produce, manufacture, distribute, import, sell,
21 and/or offer for sale in California, without the required warning, Carex Cast Protectors
22 (“Product” or “Products”), that contain DINP.

23 7. Defendants’ failure to warn consumers and other individuals in California of the
24 health hazards associated with exposure to DINP in conjunction with the sale, manufacture,
25 and/or distribution of the Product is a violation of Proposition 65 and subjects Defendants to the
26 enjoinder and civil penalties described herein.

27 8. Plaintiff seeks civil penalties against Defendants for their violations of
28 Proposition 65 in accordance with Health and Safety Code § 25249.7(b).

1 **VENUE AND JURISDICTION**

2 16. Venue is proper in the County of Alameda because one or more of the instances
3 of wrongful conduct occurred, and continue to occur in this county and/or because Defendant
4 conducted, and continues to conduct, business in the County of Alameda with respect to the
5 Product.

6 17. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to California Constitution
7 Article VI, § 10, which grants the Superior Court original jurisdiction in all causes except those
8 given by statute to other trial courts. Health and Safety Code § 25249.7 allows for the
9 enforcement of violations of Proposition 65 in any Court of competent jurisdiction; therefore,
10 this Court has jurisdiction over this lawsuit.

11 18. This Court has jurisdiction over Defendant because it is either a citizen of the
12 State of California, has sufficient minimum contacts with the State of California, is registered
13 with the California Secretary of State as foreign corporations authorized to do business in the
14 State of California, and/or has otherwise purposefully availed itself of the California market.
15 Such purposeful availment has rendered the exercise of jurisdiction by California courts
16 consistent and permissible with traditional notions of fair play and substantial justice.

17 **SATISFACTION OF NOTICE REQUIREMENTS**

18 19. On June 28, 2017, Plaintiff gave notice of alleged violation of Health and Safety
19 Code § 25249.6 (the “Notice”) to Defendants concerning the exposure of California citizens to
20 DINP contained in the Product without proper warning, subject to a private action to Defendants
21 and to the California Attorney General’s office and the offices of the County District attorneys
22 and City Attorneys for each city with a population greater than 750,000 persons wherein the
23 herein violations allegedly occurred.

24 20. The Notice complied with all procedural requirements of Proposition 65 including
25 the attachment of a Certificate of Merit affirming that Plaintiff’s counsel had consulted with at
26 least one person with relevant and appropriate expertise who reviewed relevant data regarding
27 DINP exposure, and that counsel believed there was meritorious and reasonable cause for a
28 private action.

1 21. After receiving the Notice, and to Plaintiff's best information and belief, none of
2 the noticed appropriate public enforcement agencies have commenced and diligently prosecuted
3 a cause of action against Defendants under Proposition 65 to enforce the alleged violations which
4 are the subject of Plaintiff's notice of violation.

5 22. Plaintiff is commencing this action more than sixty (60) days from the date of the
6 Notice to Defendants, as required by law.

7 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

8 **(By Plaintiff against Defendant for the Violation of Proposition 65)**

9 23. Plaintiff hereby repeats and incorporates by reference paragraphs 1 through 22 of
10 this complaint as though fully set forth herein.

11 24. Defendants have, at all times mentioned herein, acted as manufacturer, distributor,
12 and/or retailer of the Product.

13 25. The Product contains DINP, a hazardous chemical found on the Proposition 65
14 list of chemicals known to be hazardous to human health.

15 26. The Product does not comply with the Proposition 65 warning requirements.

16 27. Plaintiff, based on her best information and belief, avers that at all relevant times
17 herein, and at least since May 31, 2017, continuing until the present, that Defendants have
18 continued to knowingly and intentionally expose California users and consumers of the Product
19 to DINP without providing required warnings under Proposition 65.

20 28. The exposures that are the subject of the Notice result from the purchase,
21 acquisition, handling and recommended use of the product. Consequently, the primary route of
22 exposure to these chemicals is through dermal absorption. Users may potentially be exposed to
23 DINP by dermal absorption through direct handling of the PVC body during fitting and removal
24 of the cast protector on the lower leg. Dermal exposure to DINP from the cast protector is
25 possible through exposed skin on the lower leg contained in the boot. An enclosed cast or
26 bandage can also become contaminated with DINP and the cast or bandage can subsequently
27 transfer DINP to the user's skin. If the PVC becomes wet during its expected use in the shower
28 or bath, or is handled with wet hands, aqueous HMWP skin permeation rates have been reported

1 to be faster than neat HMWP permeation. The product can be expected to emit gas phase DINP
2 into the air and accumulate DINP at the surface of the item over the lifetime of the product. If
3 the cast protector is stored or transported in a carrier, DINP that leaches from the PVC body may
4 contaminate other articles contained within the storage area or carrier that are subsequently
5 handled, worn, mouthed, or ingested by the user. Finally, some amount of exposure through
6 ingestion can occur by handling the product with subsequent touching of the user's hand to
7 mouth.

8 29. Plaintiff, based on her best information and belief, avers that such exposures will
9 continue every day until clear and reasonable warnings are provided to Product purchasers and
10 users or until this known toxic chemical is removed from the Product.

11 30. Defendants have knowledge that the normal and reasonably foreseeable use of the
12 Product exposes individuals to DINP, and Defendants intend that exposures to DINP will occur
13 by their deliberate, non-accidental participation in the manufacture, importation, distribution,
14 sale and offering of the Product to consumers in California

15 31. Plaintiff has engaged in good faith efforts to resolve the herein claims prior to this
16 Complaint.

17 32. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code § 25249.7(b), as a consequence of the above
18 described acts, Defendants are liable for a maximum civil penalty of \$2,500 per day per
19 violation.

20 33. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code § 25249.7(a), this Court is specifically
21 authorized to grant injunctive relief in favor of Plaintiff and against Defendants.

22 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**



24 WHEREFORE, Plaintiff demands judgment against Defendants and requests the
25 following relief:
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- A. That the court assess civil penalties against Defendants in the amount of \$2,500 per day for each violation in accordance with Health and Safety Code § 25249.7(b);
- B. That the court preliminarily and permanently enjoin Defendants mandating Proposition 65 compliant warnings on the Product;
- C. That the court grant Plaintiff reasonable attorney’s fees and costs of suit.
- D. That the court grant any further relief as may be just and proper.
