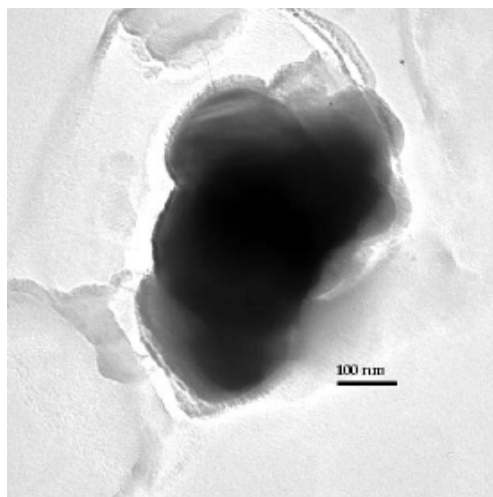

**COMPLAINT FOR CIVIL PENALTIES
AND INJUNCTIVE RELIEF**

(Health & Safety Code § 25249.6 et seq.)

I.
INTRODUCTION

1
2 1. This Complaint is a representative action brought by Environmental Health Advocates,
3 Inc. (“Plaintiff”) in the public interest of the citizens of the State of California (“the People”). Plaintiff
4 seeks to remedy Defendant's failure to inform the People of exposure to Titanium Dioxide (airborne,
5 unbound particles of respirable size) (“TiO2”), a known carcinogen. Defendant exposes consumers to
6 TiO2 by manufacturing, importing, selling, and/or distributing powdered face makeup including, but
7 not limited to, Light Lock Powder – Stay In Bed (“Products”). Defendant knows and intends that
8 customers will use Products containing TiO2. Below are pictures of TiO2 particles found in an exemplar
9 of Defendant's Products:



18 2. Under California’s Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, California
19 Health and Safety Code, section 25249.6 et seq. (“Proposition 65”), “[n]o person in the course of doing
20 business shall knowingly and intentionally expose any individual to a chemical known to the state to
21 cause cancer or reproductive toxicity without first giving clear and reasonable warning to such
22 individual. . . .” (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.6.)

23 3. California identified and listed Titanium Dioxide (airborne, unbound particles of
24 respirable size) (“TiO2”) as a chemical known to cause cancer as early as September 2, 2011.

25 4. Defendant failed to sufficiently warn consumers and individuals in California about
26 potential exposure to TiO2 in connection with Defendant's manufacture, import, sale, or distribution of
27 Products. This is a violation of Proposition 65.

1 11. Venue is proper in Alameda County Superior Court pursuant to Code of Civil
2 Procedure, sections 394, 395, and 395.5. Wrongful conduct occurred and continues to occur in this
3 County. Defendant conducted and continues to conduct business in this County as it relates to Products.

4 12. Defendant has sufficient minimum contacts in the State of California or otherwise
5 purposefully avails itself of the California market. Exercising jurisdiction over Defendant would be
6 consistent with traditional notions of fair play and substantial justice.

7 **IV.**
8 **CAUSES OF ACTION**

9 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

10 **(Violation of Proposition 65 – Against all Defendants)**

11 13. Plaintiff incorporates by reference each and every allegation contained above.

12 14. Proposition 65 mandates that citizens be informed about exposures to chemicals that
13 cause cancer, birth defects, and other reproductive harm.

14 15. Defendant manufactured, imported, sold, and/or distributed Products containing TiO₂
15 in violation of Health and Safety Code, section 25249.6 et seq. Plaintiff is informed and believes such
16 violations have continued after receipt of the Notice (defined *infra*) and will continue to occur into the
17 future.

18 16. In manufacturing, importing, selling, and/or distributing Products, Defendant failed to
19 provide a clear and reasonable warning to consumers and individuals in California who may be exposed
20 to TiO₂ through reasonably foreseeable use of the Products.

21 17. Products expose individuals to TiO₂ through direct inhalation. This exposure is a natural
22 and foreseeable consequence of Defendant placing Products into the stream of commerce. As such,
23 Defendant intends that consumers will use Products, exposing them to TiO₂.

24 18. Defendant knew or should have known that the Products contained TiO₂ and exposed
25 individuals to TiO₂ in the ways provided above. The Notice informed Defendant of the presence of
26 TiO₂ in the Products. Likewise, media coverage concerning TiO₂ and related chemicals in consumer
27 products provided constructive notice to Defendant.

28 19. Defendant's actions in this regard were deliberate and not accidental.

1 20. More than sixty days prior to naming each defendant in this lawsuit, Plaintiff issued a
2 60-Day Notice of Violation (“Notice”) as required by and in compliance with Proposition 65. Plaintiff
3 provided the Notice to the various required public enforcement agencies along with a certificate of merit.
4 The Notice alleged that Defendant violated Proposition 65 by failing to sufficiently warn consumers in
5 California of the health hazards associated with exposures to TiO₂ contained in the Products.

6 21. The appropriate public enforcement agencies provided with the Notice failed to
7 commence and diligently prosecute a cause of action against Defendant.

8 22. Individuals exposed to TiO₂ contained in Products through direct inhalation resulting
9 from reasonably foreseeable use of the Products have suffered and continue to suffer irreparable harm.
10 There is no other plain, speedy, or adequate remedy at law.

11 23. Defendant is liable for a maximum civil penalty of \$2,500 per day for each violation of
12 Proposition 65 pursuant to Health and Safety Code, section 252497(b). Injunctive relief is also
13 appropriate pursuant to Health and Safety Code, section 25249.7(a).

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1 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

2 Wherefore, Plaintiff prays for judgment against Defendant as follows:

- 3 1. Civil penalties in the amount of \$2,500 per day for each violation. Plaintiff alleges that
4 damages total a minimum of \$1,000,000;
- 5 2. A preliminary and permanent injunction against Defendant from manufacturing,
6 importing, selling, and/or distributing Products in California without providing a clear and reasonable
7 warning as required by Proposition 65 and related Regulations;
- 8 3. Reasonable attorney’s fees and costs of suit; and
- 9 4. Such other and further relief as may be just and proper.
