**COMPLAINT FOR CIVIL PENALTIES  
AND INJUNCTIVE RELIEF**

(Health & Safety Code § 25249.6 et seq.)

I.  
**INTRODUCTION**

1  
2           1.       This Complaint is a representative action brought by Environmental Health Advocates,  
3 Inc. (“Plaintiff”) in the public interest of the citizens of the State of California (“the People”). Plaintiff  
4 seeks to remedy Defendants' failure to inform the People of exposure to diethanolamine (“DEA”), a  
5 chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer. DEA is a common component of cosmetic  
6 and grooming products, and often functions as an emulsifier or foaming agent. Defendants expose  
7 consumers to DEA by manufacturing, importing, selling, and/or distributing a variety of toners  
8 including, but not limited to The Ordinary Glycolic Acid 7% Exfoliating Toner (“Products”).  
9 Defendants know and intend that customers will use Products containing DEA.

10           2.       Under California’s Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, California  
11 Health and Safety Code, section 25249.6 et seq. (“Proposition 65”), “[n]o person in the course of doing  
12 business shall knowingly and intentionally expose any individual to a chemical known to the state to  
13 cause cancer or reproductive toxicity without first giving clear and reasonable warning to such  
14 individual. . . .” (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.6.)

15           3.       On or around June 22, 2012, the State of California added DEA to Proposition 65 as a  
16 known carcinogen, thereby requiring a clear and reasonable warning about potential exposure to DEA  
17 on any consumer good. Despite this, Defendants failed to sufficiently warn consumers and individuals  
18 in California about potential exposure to DEA in connection with Defendants' manufacture, import, sale,  
19 or distribution of Products. This is a violation of Proposition 65.

20           4.       Plaintiff seeks injunctive relief compelling Defendants to sufficiently warn consumers  
21 in California before exposing them to DEA in Products. (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.7(a).) Plaintiff  
22 also seeks civil penalties against Defendants for violations of Proposition 65 along with attorney’s fees  
23 and costs. (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.7(b).)

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**II.**  
**PARTIES**

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2           5.       Plaintiff ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH ADVOCATES, INC. (“Plaintiff”) is a  
3 corporation in the State of California dedicated to protecting the health of California citizens through  
4 the elimination or reduction of toxic exposure from consumer products. Plaintiff has prosecuted a  
5 number of Proposition 65 cases in the public interest. These cases have resulted in significant public  
6 benefit—including the reformulation and repackaging of numerous consumer products—to make them  
7 safer for California consumers, and to properly apprise California consumers of any health risks  
8 associated with their usage. Plaintiff brings this action in the public interest pursuant to Health and  
9 Safety Code, section 25249.7.

10           6.       Defendant DECIEM BEAUTY GROUP INC. ("Deciem BG") is a corporation  
11 organized and existing under the laws of Canada. Deciem BG is registered to do business in California,  
12 and does business in the County of Alameda, within the meaning of Health and Safety Code, section  
13 25249.11. Deciem BG manufactures, imports, sells, or distributes the Products in California and  
14 Alameda County.

15           7.       Defendant THE ESTEE LAUDER COMPANIES INC. ("Estee Lauder") is a  
16 corporation organized and existing under the laws of Delaware. Estee Lauder is registered to do business  
17 in California, and does business in the County of Alameda, within the meaning of Health and Safety  
18 Code, section 25249.11. Estee Lauder manufactures, imports, sells, or distributes the Products in  
19 California and Alameda County.

20           8.       Defendant ULTA SALON, COSMETICS & FRAGRANCE, INC. ("Ulta") is a  
21 corporation organized and existing under the laws of Delaware. Ulta is registered to do business in  
22 California, and does business in the County of Alameda, within the meaning of Health and Safety Code,  
23 section 25249.11. Ulta manufactures, imports, sells, or distributes the Products in California and  
24 Alameda County.

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1           15.       Proposition 65 requires the State of California to maintain “a list of chemicals known to  
2 the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity,” which is to be “revised and republished in light of  
3 additional knowledge” on at least an annual basis. (Health & Safety Code, § 25249.8(a).)

4           16.       On June 22, 2012, the State of California formally identified and listed DEA as a  
5 chemical known to cause cancer. DEA is a common component of cosmetic and grooming products,  
6 and often functions as an emulsifier or foaming agent.

7           17.       In 2012, the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) also formally  
8 identified DEA as a Group 2B possible human carcinogen. (*See* IARC Working Group on the Evaluation  
9 of Carcinogenic Risks to Humans, Some Chemicals Present in Industrial and Consumer Products, Food  
10 and Drinking-Water. Lyon (FR): International Agency for Research on Cancer; 2013, (IARC  
11 Monographs on the Evaluation of Carcinogenic Risks to Humans, No. 101.)  
12 DIETHANOLAMINE, available at: <https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/books/NBK373177/> [last visited  
13 January 8, 2025].)

14           18.       Animal studies have reported effects on various organ systems from long-term topical  
15 administration of DEA. For example, a study conducted by the National Toxicology Program  
16 (hereinafter, the “NTP study”) showed that dermal exposure to DEA amplified the development of  
17 tumors in the liver and kidney tubules. (*See* National Toxicology Program, NTP Toxicology and  
18 Carcinogenesis Studies of Diethanolamine (CAS No. 111-42-2) in F344/N Rats and B6C3F1 Mice  
19 (Dermal Studies). Natl Toxicol Program Tech Rep Ser. 1999 Jul; 478:1-212. PMID: 12571685.,  
20 available at: <https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/12571685/> [last visited January 8, 2025].)

21           19.       The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (“OEHHA”) has established  
22 specific safe harbor levels for many of the chemicals listed under Proposition 65. For cancer-causing  
23 chemicals in particular, a safe harbor level is called a “No Significant Risk Level,” or “NSRL.” An  
24 NSRL is the daily intake level calculated to result in one excess case of cancer in an exposed human  
25 population of 100,000, assuming lifetime exposure at the level in question. (*See* OEHHA’s Proposition  
26 65 Process for Developing Safe Harbor Numbers (February 2001), *available at*  
27 <https://oehha.ca.gov/media/downloads/cmr/2001safeharborprocess.pdf> [last visited January 8, 2025].)

28 The State of California has not yet established an NSRL for DEA. However, research suggests that an

1 NSRL of 5.6 micrograms/day of DEA is appropriate, where dermal absorption is the route of exposure.  
2 (See Wang B, Amacher DE, Whittaker MH. Derivation of a No-Significant-Risk-Level (NSRL) for  
3 diethanolamine (DEA). Regul Toxicol Pharmacol. 2014 Feb;68(1):76-84. doi:  
4 10.1016/j.yrtph.2013.11.009. Epub 2013 Nov 23. PMID: 24275050. [last visited January 8, 2025].) This  
5 NSRL is derived from the NTP study described above, using a benchmark dose modeling method based  
6 on the incidence of hepatocellular carcinomas in female mice, in accordance with the guidelines of the  
7 California Environmental Protection Agency.

8 20. In order to ensure that the injunctive relief sought herein confers a public benefit upon  
9 California consumers, EHA adopts the NSRL of 5.6 micrograms/day for DEA derived from the NTP  
10 study.

11 **V.**  
**CAUSES OF ACTION**

12 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**

13 **(Violation of Proposition 65 – Against all Defendants)**

14 21. Plaintiff incorporates by reference each and every allegation contained above.

15 22. Proposition 65 mandates that citizens be informed about exposures to chemicals that  
16 cause cancer, birth defects, and other reproductive harm.

17 23. Defendants manufactured, imported, sold, and/or distributed Products containing DEA  
18 in violation of Health and Safety Code, section 25249.6 et seq. Plaintiff is informed and believes such  
19 violations have continued after receipt of the Notices and will continue to occur into the future.

20 24. In manufacturing, importing, selling, and/or distributing Products, Defendants failed to  
21 provide a clear and reasonable warning to consumers and individuals in California who may be exposed  
22 to DEA through reasonably foreseeable use of the Products.

23 25. Products expose individuals to DEA through dermal absorption. This exposure is a  
24 natural and foreseeable consequence of Defendants placing Products into the stream of commerce. As  
25 such, Defendants intend that consumers will use Products, exposing them to DEA.

26 26. Defendant's Products exceed the NSRL of 5.6 micrograms/day, which was derived from  
27 the NTP study.

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1           27.       Defendants knew or should have known that the Products contained DEA and exposed  
2 individuals to DEA in the ways provided above. The Notice informed Defendants of the presence of  
3 DEA in the Products. Likewise, media coverage concerning DEA and related chemicals in consumer  
4 products provided constructive notice to Defendants.

5           28.       Defendants' actions in this regard were deliberate and not accidental.

6           29.       More than sixty days prior to naming each defendant in this lawsuit, Plaintiff issued a  
7 60-Day Notice of Violation upon each Defendant as required by and in compliance with Proposition 65.  
8 Plaintiff provided the Notice to the various required public enforcement agencies along with a certificate  
9 of merit. The Notice alleged that Defendants violated Proposition 65 by failing to sufficiently warn  
10 consumers in California of the health hazards associated with exposures to DEA contained in the  
11 Products.

12           30.       The appropriate public enforcement agencies provided with the Notice failed to  
13 commence and diligently prosecute a cause of action against Defendants.

14           31.       Individuals exposed to DEA contained in Products through dermal absorption resulting  
15 from reasonably foreseeable use of the Products have suffered and continue to suffer irreparable harm.  
16 There is no other plain, speedy, or adequate remedy at law.

17           32.       Defendants are liable for a maximum civil penalty of \$2,500 per day for each violation  
18 of Proposition 65 pursuant to Health and Safety Code, section 252497(b). Injunctive relief is also  
19 appropriate pursuant to Health and Safety Code, section 25249.7(a).

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1 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

2 Wherefore, Plaintiff prays for judgment against Defendants as follows:

- 3 1. Civil penalties in the amount of \$2,500 per day for each violation. Plaintiff alleges that  
4 damages total a minimum of \$1,000,000;
- 5 2. A preliminary and permanent injunction against Defendants from manufacturing,  
6 importing, selling, and/or distributing Products in California without providing a clear and reasonable  
7 warning as required by Proposition 65 and related Regulations;
- 8 3. Reasonable attorney’s fees and costs of suit; and
- 9 4. Such other and further relief as may be just and proper.
