20 1. INTRODUCTION

21 1.1 On September 23, 2014, Plaintiff Environmental Research Center, Inc.
22 ("ERC"), a non-profit corporation, as a private enforcer, and in the public interest, initiated this
23 action by filing a Complaint for Injunctive and Declaratory relief and Civil Penalties (the
24 "Complaint") pursuant to the provisions of California Health and Safety Code section 25249.5
25 et seq. ("Proposition 65"), against Fit Foods Ltd. dba Mutant Mass and DOES 1-100
26 (collectively "Fit Foods"). In this action, ERC alleges that the following products
27 manufactured, distributed or sold by Fit Foods contain lead, a chemical listed under Proposition
28

1 65 as a carcinogen and reproductive toxin, and expose consumers at a level requiring a
2 Proposition 65 warning:

3 1. Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Pump

4 2. Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Whey Vanilla Infusion Flavor

5 3. Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Whey Triple Chocolate Eruption Flavor

6 1.2 ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes,
7 helping safeguard the public from health hazards by reducing the use and misuse of hazardous
8 and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees, and
9 encouraging corporate responsibility.

10 1.3 Fit Foods is a business entity that, at all relevant times for the purpose of this
11 Consent Judgment, employed ten or more persons and qualified as a "person in the course of
12 business" within the meaning of Proposition 65. Fit Foods manufactures, distributes and sells the
13 Covered Products.

14 1.4 ERC and Fit Foods are referred to individually as "Party" or collectively as the
15 "Parties."

16 1.5 The Complaint is based on allegations contained in ERC's Notice of Violation,
17 dated September 13, 2013, that was served on the California Attorney General, other public
18 enforcers, and Fit Foods ("Notice"). A true and correct copy of the Notice is attached as
19 Exhibit A and is hereby incorporated by reference. More than 60 days have passed since the
20 Notice was mailed and uploaded onto the Attorney General's website, and no designated
21 governmental entity has filed a complaint against Fit Foods with regard to the Covered Products
22 or the alleged violations.

23 1.6 ERC's Notice and Complaint allege that use of the Covered Products exposes
24 persons in California to lead without first providing clear and reasonable warnings in violation
25 of California Health and Safety Code section 25249.6. Fit Foods denies all material allegations
26 contained in the Notice and Complaint.

27 1.7 The Parties have entered into this Consent Judgment in order to settle,
28 compromise and resolve disputed claims and thus avoid prolonged and costly litigation.

1 Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall constitute or be construed as an admission by any of
2 the Parties, or by any of their respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents,
3 parent companies, subsidiaries, divisions, affiliates, franchises, licensees, customers, suppliers,
4 distributors, wholesalers, or retailers. Except for the representations made above, nothing in
5 this Consent Judgment shall be construed as an admission by the Parties of any fact, issue of
6 law, or violation of law, nor shall compliance with this Consent Judgment be construed as an
7 admission by the Parties of any fact, issue of law, or violation of law, at any time, for any
8 purpose.

9 **1.8** Except as expressly set forth herein, nothing in this Consent Judgment shall
10 prejudice, waive, or impair any right, remedy, argument, or defense the Parties may have in any
11 other or future legal proceeding unrelated to these proceedings.

12 **1.9** The Effective Date of this Consent Judgment is the date on which it is entered as
13 a Judgment by this Court.

14 **2. JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

15 For purposes of this Consent Judgment and for any further court action that may become
16 necessary to enforce this Consent Judgment, the Parties stipulate that this Court has subject matter
17 jurisdiction over the allegations of violations contained in the Complaint, personal jurisdiction
18 over Fit Foods as to the acts alleged in the Complaint, that venue is proper in Alameda County,
19 and that this Court has jurisdiction to enter this Consent Judgment as a full and final resolution of
20 all claims up through and including the Effective Date which were or could have been asserted in
21 this action based on the facts alleged in the Notice and Complaint.

22 **3. INJUNCTIVE RELIEF, REFORMULATION, TESTING AND WARNINGS**

23 **3.1** Beginning six months from the Effective Date ("Compliance Date"), Fit Foods
24 shall be permanently enjoined from manufacturing for sale in the State of California,
25 "Distributing into the State of California", or directly selling in the State of California, any
26 Covered Product which exposes a person to a "Daily Exposure Level" of more than 0.5
27 micrograms per day when the maximum suggested dose is taken as directed on the Covered
28 Product's label, unless it meets the warning requirements under Section 3.2.

1 3.1.1 As used in Consent Judgment, the term "Distributing into the State of
2 California" shall mean to directly ship a Covered Product into California for sale in California
3 or to sell a Covered Product to a distributor that Fit Foods knows will sell the Covered Product
4 in California.

5 3.1.2 For purposes of this Consent Judgment, "Daily Lead Exposure Level"
6 shall be measured in micrograms and shall be calculated using the following formula:
7 micrograms of lead per gram of product, multiplied by grams of product per serving of the
8 product (using the largest serving size appearing on the product label), multiplied by servings
9 of the product per day (using the largest number of servings in a recommended dosage
10 appearing on the product label), which equals micrograms of lead exposure per day, excluding
11 amounts of naturally occurring lead in the ingredients listed in the table below in accordance
12 with the Attorney General's Stipulation Modifying Consent Judgments in *People v Warner*
13 *Lambert, et al* San Fran. Sup. Ct. Case No. 984503 as well as the Cocoa powder allowance
14 listed in the table below.

15 If at any time after the Compliance Date, ERC tests a Covered Product and the test
16 results indicate that the daily exposure level is greater than 0.5 micrograms per gram, Fit Foods
17 Agrees to Confidentially supply to ERC within 30 days a list of ingredients, including the
18 percentage of each ingredient ("Ingredient List"), of that particular Covered Product so that
19 ERC may be able to calculate the daily exposure based on the allowances contained in the table
20 below. If at any time Fit Foods refuses to provide said Ingredient List to ERC following a test
21 result of greater than 0.5 micrograms per gram, then Fit Foods shall not receive the allowances
22 for that particular Covered Product.

INGREDIENT	NATURALLY OCCURING AMOUNT OF LEAD
Calcium	0.8 micrograms/gram
Ferrous Fumarate	0.4 micrograms/gram
Zinc Oxide	8.0 micrograms/gram
Magnesium Oxide	0.4 micrograms/gram

1	Magnesium Carbonate	0.332 micrograms/gram
2	Magnesium Hydroxide	0.4 micrograms/gram
3	Zinc Gluconate	0.8 micrograms/gram
4	Potassium Chloride	1.1 micrograms/gram
5	Cocoa-powder	1.0 micrograms/gram

6 In the event that a dispute arises with respect to compliance with the terms of this
7 Consent Judgment as to any contribution from naturally occurring lead levels under this
8 Section, the Parties shall employ good faith efforts to seek entry of a protective order that
9 governs access to and disclosure of the Ingredient List provided. Should a dispute arise, this
10 Section is subject to the meet and confer requirements and attorney's fees provisions set forth in
11 Section 15 below.

12 **3.2 Clear and Reasonable Warnings**

13 If Fit Foods is required to provide a warning pursuant to Section 3.1, then subject to the
14 provisions below, the following warning must be utilized:

15 **WARNING: This product contains [lead,] a chemical known to the State of California**
16 **to cause [cancer and] birth defects or other reproductive harm.**

17 Fit Foods shall use the phrase "cancer and" in the warning only if the maximum daily dose
18 recommended on the label contains more than 15 micrograms of lead as determined pursuant to
19 the quality control methodology set forth in Section 3.4.

20 Fit Foods shall provide the warning on one of the following: 1) for website purchases only,
21 on its website, where the warning conspicuously appears prior to a customer's purchase of a
22 product or 2) for non-website purchases, on the label of Fit Foods' products in California.

23 The warning shall be at least the same size as the largest of any other health or safety
24 warnings correspondingly appearing on the label, container, or website and the word
25 "WARNING" shall be in all capital letters. No other statements about Proposition 65 may
26 visually accompany the warning.

27 In all instances, Fit Foods must display the above warnings with such conspicuousness, as
28 compared with other words, statements, or design of the label or container, as applicable, to render

1 the warning likely to be read and understood by an ordinary individual under customary conditions
2 of purchase or use of the product.

3 Notwithstanding any of the foregoing, Fit Foods may use the following safe-harbor
4 warning language in a warning required by Section 3.1 if such warning was displayed on Fit
5 Foods products already in the stream of commerce on the Effective Date: "For California
6 Residents Only. Required Prop 65 Text: WARNING: This product contains chemicals known to
7 the State of California to cause cancer and birth defects or other reproductive harm."

8 3.3 Reformulated Covered Products

9 A Reformulated Covered Product is one for which the Daily Exposure Level when the
10 maximum suggested dose is taken as directed on the Reformulated Covered Product's label,
11 contains no more than 0.5 micrograms of lead per day as determined by the quality control
12 methodology described in Section 3.4.

13 3.4 Testing and Quality Control Methodology

14 3.4.1 All testing pursuant to this Consent Judgment shall be performed using a
15 laboratory method that complies with the performance and quality control factors appropriate
16 for the method used, including limit of detection, qualification, accuracy, and precision that
17 meets the following criteria: Inductively Coupled Plasma-Mass Spectrometry (ICP-MS)
18 achieving a limit of quantification of less than or equal to 0.010 mg/kg or any other testing
19 method subsequently agreed upon in writing by the Parties.

20 3.4.2 All testing pursuant to this Consent Judgment shall be performed by an
21 independent third-party laboratory certified by the California Environmental Laboratory
22 Accreditation Program or an independent third-party laboratory that is registered with the
23 United States Food & Drug Administration. Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall limit Fit
24 Foods' ability to conduct, or require that others conduct, additional testing of the Covered
25 Products, including the raw materials used in their manufacture.

26 3.4.3 Fit Foods shall arrange, for at least three consecutive years and at least
27 once per year, for the lead testing of three randomly selected samples of each Covered Product
28 in the form intended for sale to the end-user to be distributed or sold in California. Fit Foods

1 shall continue testing only so long as the Covered Products are sold in California or sold to a
2 third party for retail sale in California. The testing requirements discussed in Section 3.4 are
3 not applicable to any Covered Product for which Fit Foods has provided the warning as
4 specified in Section 3.2. Fit Foods shall retain all test results and documentation for a period of
5 three years from the date of each test.

6 3.4.5 The injunctive relief set forth in Section 3 shall not apply to any of the
7 Covered Products that are put into the stream of commerce prior to the Compliance Date. No
8 later than the Compliance Date, Fit Foods shall provide ERC with the last lot number for each of
9 the Covered Products in the stream of commerce as of the Effective Date.

10 4. **SETTLEMENT PAYMENT**

11 4.1 In full satisfaction of all potential civil penalties, payment in lieu of civil
12 penalties, attorney's fees, and costs, Fit Foods shall make a total payment of \$45,000.00 ("Total
13 Settlement Amount") to ERC within 15 days of the Effective Date. Fit Foods shall make this
14 payment by wire transfer to ERC's escrow account, for which ERC will give Fit Foods the
15 necessary account information.

16 4.2 As a portion of the Total Settlement Amount, \$10,000.00 shall be considered
17 a civil penalty pursuant to California Health and Safety Code §25249.7(b)(1). ERC shall remit
18 75% (\$7,500.00) of the civil penalty to the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment
19 ("OEHHA") for deposit in the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Fund in
20 accordance with California Health and Safety Code §25249.12(c). ERC will retain the
21 remaining 25% (\$2,500.00) of the civil penalty.

22 4.3 As a portion of the Total Settlement Amount, \$1,346.27 shall be distributed
23 to Environmental Research Center as reimbursement to ERC for reasonable costs associated
24 with the enforcement of Proposition 65 and \$5,455.26 shall be distributed to Environmental
25 Research Center in lieu of further civil penalties, for the day-to-day business activities such as
26 (1) continued enforcement of Proposition 65, which includes work, analyzing, researching and
27 testing consumer products that may contain Proposition 65 chemicals, focusing on the same or
28 similar type of ingestible products that are the subject matter of the current action; (2) the

1 continued monitoring of past consent judgments and settlements to ensure companies are in
2 compliance with Proposition 65; and (3) giving a donation of \$165.00 to the Environmental
3 Working Group to address reducing toxic chemical exposures in California.

4 **4.4** \$3,000.00 shall be distributed to Karen Evans as reimbursement of ERC's
5 attorney's fees, \$6,702.50 shall be distributed to Ryan Hoffman as reimbursement of ERC's
6 attorney's fees, \$1,665.00 shall be distributed to Michael Freund as reimbursement of ERC's
7 attorney's fees, and \$16,830.97 shall be distributed to ERC as reimbursement for its in-house
8 legal fees.

9 **5. MODIFICATION OF CONSENT JUDGMENT**

10 **5.1** This Consent Judgment may be modified only (i) by written stipulation of
11 the Parties or pursuant to Section 5.4 and (ii) upon entry by the Court of a modified consent
12 judgment.

13 **5.2** If Fit Foods seeks to modify this Consent Judgment under Section 5.1, then
14 Fit Foods must provide written notice to ERC of its intent ("Notice of Intent"). If ERC seeks to
15 meet and confer regarding the proposed modification in the Notice of Intent, then ERC must
16 provide written notice to Fit Foods within thirty days of receiving the Notice of Intent. If ERC
17 notifies Fit Foods in a timely manner of ERC's intent to meet and confer, then the Parties shall
18 meet and confer in good faith as required in this Section. The Parties shall meet in person or
19 via telephone within thirty (30) days of ERC's notification of its intent to meet and confer.
20 Within thirty days of such meeting, if ERC disputes the proposed modification, ERC shall
21 provide to Fit Foods a written basis for its position. The Parties shall continue to meet and
22 confer for an additional thirty (30) days in an effort to resolve any remaining disputes. Should
23 it become necessary, the Parties may agree in writing to different deadlines for the meet-and-
24 confer period.

25 **5.3** In the event that Fit Foods initiates or otherwise requests a modification
26 under Section 5.1 for its primary benefit, and the meet and confer process leads to a joint
27 motion or application of the Consent Judgment, Fit Foods shall reimburse ERC its costs and
28

1 reasonable attorney's fees for the time spent in the meet-and-confer process and filing and
2 arguing the motion or application, such costs and fees not to exceed \$10,000.

3 5.4 Where the meet-and-confer process does not lead to a joint motion or
4 application in support of a modification of the Consent Judgment, then either Party may seek
5 judicial relief on its own. In such a situation, the prevailing party may seek to recover costs and
6 reasonable attorney's fees. As used in the preceding sentence, the term "prevailing party"
7 means a party who is successful in obtaining relief more favorable to it than the relief that the
8 other party was amenable to providing during the Parties' good faith attempt to resolve the
9 dispute that is the subject of the modification.

10 **6. RETENTION OF JURISDICTION, ENFORCEMENT OF CONSENT**
11 **JUDGMENT**

12 6.1 This Court shall retain jurisdiction of this matter to enforce, modify or
13 terminate this Consent Judgment.

14 6.2 If ERC alleges that any Covered Product fails to qualify as a Reformulated
15 Covered Product (for which ERC alleges that no warning has been provided), then ERC shall
16 inform Fit Foods in a reasonably prompt manner of its test results, including information
17 sufficient to permit Fit Foods to identify the Covered Products at issue. Fit Foods shall, within
18 thirty days following such notice, provide ERC with testing information, from an independent
19 third-party laboratory meeting the requirements of Sections 3.4.1 and 3.4.2, demonstrating Fit
20 Foods' compliance with the Consent Judgment, if warranted. The Parties shall first attempt to
21 resolve the matter prior to ERC taking any further legal action.

22 **7. APPLICATION OF CONSENT JUDGMENT**

23 This Consent Judgment may apply to, be binding upon, and benefit the Parties and their
24 respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, parent companies, subsidiaries,
25 divisions, affiliates, franchisees, licensees, customers (excluding private labelers), distributors,
26 wholesalers, retailers, predecessors, successors, and assigns. This Consent Judgment shall have no
27 application to Covered Products which are distributed or sold exclusively outside the State of
28 California and which are not used by California consumers.

1 **8. BINDING EFFECT, CLAIMS COVERED AND RELEASED**

2 **8.1** This Consent Judgment is a full, final, and binding resolution between ERC,
3 on behalf of itself and in the public interest, and Fit Foods, of any alleged violation of
4 Proposition 65 or its implementing regulations for failure to provide Proposition 65 warnings of
5 exposure to lead from the handling, use, or consumption of the Covered Products and fully
6 resolves all claims that have been or could have been asserted in this action up to and including
7 the Effective Date for failure to provide Proposition 65 warnings for the Covered Products.
8 ERC, on behalf of itself and in the public interest, hereby discharges Fit Foods and its
9 respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, parent companies, subsidiaries,
10 divisions, affiliates, suppliers, franchisees, licensees, customers (not including private label
11 customers of Fit Foods), distributors, wholesalers, retailers, and all other upstream and
12 downstream entities in the distribution chain of any Covered Product, and the predecessors,
13 successors and assigns of any of them (collectively, "Released Parties"), from any and all
14 claims, actions, causes of action, suits, demands, liabilities, damages, penalties, fees, costs and
15 expenses asserted, or that could have been asserted, as to any alleged violation of Proposition
16 65 arising from the failure to provide Proposition 65 warnings on the Covered Products
17 regarding lead.

18 **8.2** ERC on the one hand and Fit Foods on the other, further waive and release
19 any and all claims they may have against each other for all actions or statements made or
20 undertaken in the course of seeking or opposing enforcement of Proposition 65 in connection
21 with the Notice or Complaint up through and including the Effective Date, provided, however,
22 that nothing in Section 8 shall affect or limit any Party's right to seek to enforce the terms of
23 this Consent Judgment.

24 **8.3** It is possible that other claims not known to ERC and Fit Foods arising out
25 of the facts alleged in the Notice or the Complaint and relating to the Covered Products will
26 develop or be discovered. ERC and Fit Foods acknowledge that this Consent Judgment is
27 expressly intended to cover and include all such claims up through the Effective Date,
28 including all rights of action therefore. ERC and Fit Foods acknowledge that the claims

1 released in Sections 8.1 and 8.2 above may include unknown claims, and nevertheless waive
2 California Civil Code section 1542 as to any such unknown claims. California Civil Code
3 section 1542 reads as follows:

4 A GENERAL RELEASE DOES NOT EXTEND TO CLAIMS WHICH THE
5 CREDITOR DOES NOT KNOW OR SUSPECT TO EXIST IN HIS OR HER
6 FAVOR AT THE TIME OF EXECUTING THE RELEASE, WHICH IF
7 KNOWN BY HIM OR HER MUST HAVE MATERIALLY AFFECTED HIS
8 OR HER SETTLEMENT WITH THE DEBTOR.

9 ERC and Fit Foods acknowledge and understand the significance and consequences of this
10 specific waiver of California Civil Code section 1542.

11 **8.4** Compliance with the terms of this Consent Judgment shall be deemed to
12 constitute compliance with Proposition 65 by any releasee regarding alleged exposures to lead
13 as set forth in the Notice and Complaint.

14 **8.5** Nothing in this Consent Judgment is intended to apply to any occupational
15 or environmental exposures arising under Proposition 65, nor shall it apply to any of Fit Foods'
16 products other than the Covered Products.

17 **9. SEVERABILITY OF UNENFORCEABLE PROVISIONS**

18 In the event that any of the provisions of this Consent Judgment are held by a court to be
19 unenforceable, the validity of the remaining enforceable provisions shall not be adversely affected.

20 **10. GOVERNING LAW**

21 The terms and conditions of this Consent Judgment shall be governed by and construed in
22 accordance with the laws of the State of California.

23 **11. PROVISION OF NOTICE**

24 All notices required to be given to either Party to this Consent Judgment by the other shall
25 be in writing and sent to the following agents listed below by: (a) first-class, registered, or certified
26 mail; (b) overnight courier; or (c) personal delivery. Courtesy copies via email may also be sent.

19 **12. COURT APPROVAL**

20 **12.1** Upon execution of this Consent Judgment by the Parties, ERC shall notice a
21 Motion for Court Approval. The Parties shall use their best efforts to support entry of this
22 Consent Judgment.

23 **12.2** If the California Attorney General objects to any term in this Consent
24 Judgment, the Parties shall use their best efforts to resolve the concern in a timely manner, and
25 if possible prior to the hearing on the motion.

26 **12.3** If this Stipulated Consent Judgment is not approved by the Court, it shall be
27 void and have no force or effect.

1 **13. EXECUTION AND COUNTERPARTS**

2 This Consent Judgment may be executed in counterparts, which taken together shall be
3 deemed to constitute one document. A facsimile or .pdf signature shall be construed as valid as
4 the original signature.

5 **14. DRAFTING**

6 The terms of this Consent Judgment have been reviewed by the respective counsel for each
7 Party prior to its signing, and each Party has had an opportunity to fully discuss the terms with
8 counsel. The Parties agree that, in any subsequent interpretation and construction of this Consent
9 Judgment entered thereon, the terms and provisions shall not be construed against any Party.

10 **15. GOOD FAITH ATTEMPT TO RESOLVE DISPUTES**

11 If a dispute arises with respect to either Party's compliance with the terms of this Consent
12 Judgment entered by the Court, the Parties shall meet in person or by telephone and endeavor to
13 resolve the dispute in an amicable manner. No action or motion may be filed in the absence of
14 such a good faith attempt to resolve the dispute beforehand. In the event an action or motion is
15 filed, however, the prevailing party may seek to recover costs and reasonable attorney's fees. As
16 used in the preceding sentence, the term "prevailing party" means a party who is successful in
17 obtaining relief more favorable to it than the relief that the other party was amenable to providing
18 during the Parties' good faith attempt to resolve the dispute that is the subject of such enforcement
19 action.

20 **16. ENTIRE AGREEMENT, AUTHORIZATION**

21 16.1 This Consent Judgment contains the sole and entire agreement and
22 understanding of the Parties with respect to the entire subject matter herein, and any and all
23 prior discussions, negotiations, commitments and understandings related hereto. No
24 representations, oral or otherwise, express or implied, other than those contained herein have
25 been made by any Party. No other agreements, oral or otherwise, unless specifically referred to
26 herein, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any Party.

1 16.2 Each signatory to this Consent Judgment certifies that he or she is fully
2 authorized by the Party he or she represents to stipulate to this Consent Judgment. Except as
3 explicitly provided herein, each Party shall bear its own fees and costs.

4 **17. REQUEST FOR FINDINGS, APPROVAL OF SETTLEMENT AND ENTRY OF**
5 **CONSENT JUDGMENT**

6 This Consent Judgment has come before the Court upon the request of the Parties. The
7 Parties request the Court to fully review this Consent Judgment and, being fully informed
8 regarding the matters which are the subject of this action, to:

**NOTICE OF VIOLATION OF
CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTION 25249.5 ET SEQ.
(PROPOSITION 65)**

Dear Alleged Violator and the Appropriate Public Enforcement Agencies:

I represent Environmental Research Center ("ERC"), 3111 Camino Del Rio North, Suite 400, San Diego, CA 92108; Tel. (619) 500-3090. ERC's Executive Director is Chris Heptinstall. ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes, helping safeguard the public from health hazards by bringing about a reduction in the use and misuse of hazardous and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees, and encouraging corporate responsibility.

ERC has identified violations of California's Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 ("Proposition 65"), which is codified at California Health & Safety Code §25249.5 *et seq.*, with respect to the products identified below. These violations have occurred and continue to occur because the alleged Violator identified below failed to provide required clear and reasonable warnings with these products. This letter serves as a notice of these violations to the alleged Violator and the appropriate public enforcement agencies. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 25249.7(d), ERC intends to file a private enforcement action in the public interest 60 days after effective service of this notice unless the public enforcement agencies have commenced and are diligently prosecuting an action to rectify these violations.

General Information about Proposition 65. A copy of a summary of Proposition 65, prepared by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, is enclosed with this letter served to the alleged Violator identified below.

Alleged Violator. The name of the company covered by this notice that violated Proposition 65 (hereinafter the "Violator") is:

Fit Foods Ltd. dba Mutant Mass

Consumer Products and Listed Chemicals. The products that are the subject of this notice and the chemical in those products identified as exceeding allowable levels are:

Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Pump – Lead

Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Whey Vanilla Infusion Flavor – Lead

Fit Foods Distribution Inc. Mutant Whey Triple Chocolate Eruption Flavor – Lead

On February 27, 1987, the State of California officially listed lead as a chemical known to cause developmental toxicity, and male and female reproductive toxicity. On October 1, 1992, the State of California officially listed lead and lead compounds as chemicals known to cause cancer.

It should be noted that ERC may continue to investigate other products that may reveal further violations and result in subsequent Notices of Violation.

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
Route of Exposure. The consumer exposures that are the subject of this notice result from the purchase, acquisition, handling and recommended use of these products. Consequently, the primary route of exposure to these chemicals has been and continues to be through ingestion, but may have also occurred and may continue to occur through inhalation and/or dermal contact.

Approximate Time Period of Violation. Ongoing violations have occurred every day since at least September 13, 2010, as well as every day since the products were introduced into the California marketplace, and will continue every day until clear and reasonable warnings are provided to product purchasers and users or until these known toxic chemicals are either removed from or reduced to allowable levels in the products. Proposition 65 requires that a clear and reasonable warning be provided prior to exposure to the identified chemicals. The method of warning should be a warning that appears on the product label. The Violator violated Proposition 65 because it failed to provide persons handling and/or using these products with appropriate warnings that they are being exposed to these chemicals.

Consistent with the public interest goals of Proposition 65 and a desire to have these ongoing violations of California law quickly rectified, ERC is interested in seeking a constructive resolution of this matter that includes an enforceable written agreement by the Violator to: (1) reformulate the identified products so as to eliminate further exposures to the identified chemicals, or provide appropriate warnings on the labels of these products; and (2) pay an appropriate civil penalty. Such a resolution will prevent further unwarned consumer exposures to the identified chemicals, as well as an expensive and time consuming litigation.

OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH HAZARD ASSESSMENT CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT OF 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and OEHHA's implementing regulations (see citations below) for further information.

FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BASIS FOR THE ALLEGATIONS IN THE NOTICE RELATED TO YOUR BUSINESS, CONTACT THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE NOTICE.

Proposition 65 appears in California law as Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13. The statute is available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65law72003.html>. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 27 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 25102 through 27001.¹ These implementing regulations are available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65Regs.html>.

WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?

The "Governor's List." Proposition 65 requires the Governor to publish a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. This means that chemicals are placed on the Proposition 65 list if they are known to cause cancer and/or birth defects or other reproductive harm, such as

damage to female or male reproductive systems or to the developing fetus. This list must be updated at least once a year. The current Proposition 65 list of chemicals is available on the OEHHA website at:

http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/Newlist.html.

Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under this law. Businesses that produce, use, release or otherwise engage in activities involving listed chemicals must comply with the following:

Clear and reasonable warnings. A business is required to warn a person before "knowingly and intentionally" exposing that person to a listed chemical unless an exemption applies; for example, when exposures are sufficiently low (see below). The warning given must be "clear and reasonable." This means that the warning must: (1) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed. Some exposures are exempt from the warning requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

Prohibition from discharges into drinking water. A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Some discharges are exempt from this requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?

Yes. You should consult the current version of the statute and regulations (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/index.html>) to determine all applicable exemptions, the most common of which are the following:

Grace Period. Proposition 65 warning requirements do not apply until 12 months after the chemical has been listed. The Proposition 65 discharge prohibition does not apply to a discharge or release of a chemical that takes place less than 20 months after the listing of the chemical.

Governmental agencies and public water utilities. All agencies of the federal, state or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

Businesses with nine or fewer employees. Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees. This includes all employees, not just those present in California.

Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer. For chemicals that are listed as known to the State to cause cancer ("carcinogens"), a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses "no significant risk." This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific "No Significant Risk Levels" (NSRLs) for many listed carcinogens. Exposures below these levels are exempt from the warning requirement. See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of NSRLs, and Section 25701 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question. For chemicals known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity, a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the "no observable effect level" divided by a 1,000. This number is known as the Maximum Allowable Dose Level (MADL). See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of MADLs, and Section 25801 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

Exposures to Naturally Occurring Chemicals in a Food. Certain exposures to chemicals that occur in foods naturally (i.e., that do not result from any known human activity, including activity by someone other than the person causing the exposure) are exempt from the warning requirements of the law. If the chemical is a contaminant² it must be reduced to the lowest level feasible. Regulations explaining this exemption can be found in Section 25501.

Discharges that do not result in a "significant amount" of the listed chemical entering into any source of drinking water. The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply if the discharger is able to demonstrate that a "significant amount" of the listed chemical has not, does not, or will not pass into or probably pass into a source of drinking water, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A "significant amount" means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the "no significant risk" level for chemicals that cause cancer or that is 1,000 times below the "no observable effect" level for chemicals that cause reproductive toxicity, if an individual were exposed to that amount in drinking water.

HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys. Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. The notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in Section 25903 of the regulations and in Title 11, sections 3100-3103. A private party may not pursue an independent enforcement action under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an action within sixty days of the notice.

A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court to stop committing the violation.
