1. DEFINITIONS

1.1 "Covered Products" means Fashion Accessories that are (a) Manufactured by a Settling Defendant, or (b) distributed for resale or sold for resale by a Settling Defendant, or (c) sold or offered for retail sale as a Private Label Covered Product by a Settling Defendant that is (i) the Private Labeler or (ii) a sister, parent, subsidiary, or affiliated entity that is under common ownership of the Private Labeler of such product.

1.2 "Effective Date" means the date on which this Consent Judgment is entered by the Court.

1.3 "Fashion Accessories" means wallets, handbags, purses, and clutches.

1 1.4 “Lead Limits” means the maximum concentrations of lead and lead
2 compounds (“Lead”) by weight specified in Section 3.2.

3 1.5 “Manufactured” and “Manufactures” means to manufacture, produce, or
4 assemble.

5 1.6 “Private Label Covered Product” means a Fashion Accessory that bears a
6 private label where (i) the product (or its container) is labeled with the brand or trademark of a
7 person other than a manufacturer of the product, (ii) the person with whose brand or trademark
8 the product (or container) is labeled has authorized or caused the product to be so labeled, and
9 (iii) the brand or trademark of a manufacturer of such product does not appear on such label.

10 1.7 “Private Labeler” means an owner or licensee of a brand or trademark on the
11 label of a consumer product which bears a private label; provided, however, that Settling
12 Defendant is not a Private Labeler due solely to the fact that its name, brand or trademark is
13 visible on a sign or on the price tag of a Fashion Accessory that is not labeled with a third party’s
14 brand or trademark.

15 1.8 “Paint or other Surface Coatings” means a fluid, semi-fluid, or other material,
16 with or without a suspension of finely divided coloring matter, which changes to a solid film
17 when a thin layer is applied to a metal, wood, stone, paper, leather, cloth, plastic, or other surface.
18 This term does not include printing inks or those materials which actually become a part of the
19 substrate, such as the pigment in a plastic article, or those materials which are actually bonded to
20 the substrate, such as by electroplating or ceramic glazing.

21 1.9 “Vendor” means a person or entity that Manufactures, imports, distributes, or
22 supplies a Fashion Accessory to Settling Defendant.

23 **2. INTRODUCTION**

24 2.1 The parties to this Consent Judgment (“Parties”) are the Center for
25 Environmental Health (“CEH”) and defendant Shopko Stores Operating Co., LLC (“Settling
26 Defendant”).

27 2.2 On March 18, 2014, CEH served a 60-Day Notice of Violation under
28 Proposition 65 (The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, California Health

1 & Safety Code §§ 25249.5, et seq.) (the “Notice”) to Settling Defendant, the California Attorney
2 General, the District Attorneys of every County in the State of California, and the City Attorneys
3 for every City in the State of California with a population greater than 750,000. The Notice
4 alleges that Settling Defendant violated Proposition 65 by exposing persons to Lead contained in
5 wallets, handbags, purses, and clutches, without first providing a clear and reasonable Proposition
6 65 warning.

7 2.3 On April 24, 2014, CEH filed the action *CEH v. Miz Mooz, Inc., et al.*, Case
8 No. RG 14-722783, in the Superior Court of California for Alameda County. On May 29, 2014,
9 CEH amended the operative *Miz Mooz* complaint to name Settling Defendant as Doe 1.

10 2.4 Settling Defendant manufactures, distributes or offers Fashion Accessories for
11 sale in the State of California or has done so in the past.

12 2.5 For purposes of this Consent Judgment only, the Parties stipulate that this
13 Court has jurisdiction over the allegations of violations contained in the operative Complaint
14 applicable to Settling Defendant (the “Complaint”) and personal jurisdiction over Settling
15 Defendant as to the acts alleged in the Complaint, that venue is proper in the County of Alameda,
16 and that this Court has jurisdiction to enter this Consent Judgment.

17 2.6 Nothing in this Consent Judgment is or shall be construed as an admission by
18 the Parties of any fact, conclusion of law, issue of law or violation of law, nor shall compliance
19 with the Consent Judgment constitute or be construed as an admission by the Parties of any fact,
20 conclusion of law, issue of law, or violation of law. Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall
21 prejudice, waive or impair any right, remedy, argument or defense the Parties may have in any
22 other legal proceeding. This Consent Judgment is the product of negotiation and compromise and
23 is accepted by the Parties for purposes of settling, compromising and resolving issues disputed in
24 this action.

25 **3. INJUNCTIVE RELIEF**

26 3.1 **Specification Compliance Date.** To the extent it has not already done so, no
27 more than 30 days after the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall provide the Lead Limits to its
28 Vendors of Fashion Accessories and shall instruct each Vendor to use reasonable efforts to

1 provide Fashion Accessories that comply with the Lead Limits on a nationwide basis.

2 **3.2 Lead Limits.** Commencing on the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall not
3 purchase, import, Manufacture, or supply to an unaffiliated third party, or sell or offer for sale any
4 Covered Product that will be sold or offered for sale to California consumers that contains a
5 material or is made of a component that exceeds the following Lead Limits:

6 3.2.1 Paint or other Surface Coatings: 90 parts per million (“ppm”).

7 3.2.2 Polyvinyl chloride (“PVC”): 200 ppm.

8 3.2.3 For all other materials or components other than cubic zirconia (sometimes
9 called cubic zirconium, CZ), crystal, glass or rhinestones: 300 ppm.

10 **3.3 Action Regarding Specific Products.**

11 3.3.1 On or before the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall cease selling in
12 California the Braciano Large Tote Handbag in Red, SKU No. 6-17776-06994-2, Item
13 No. 73371, Style No. U8562S-RD (the “Section 3.3 Products”). On or before the
14 Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall also: (i) cease shipping the Section 3.3 Products
15 to any of its customers that resell the Section 3.3 Products in California, and (ii) send
16 instructions to its customers that resell the Section 3.3 Products in California instructing
17 them to cease offering such Section 3.3 Products for sale in California.

18 3.3.2 Any destruction of Section 3.3 Products shall be in compliance with all
19 applicable laws.

20 3.3.3 Within sixty days of the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall provide
21 CEH with written certification from Settling Defendant confirming compliance with the
22 requirements of this Section 3.3.

23 **4. ENFORCEMENT**

24 4.1 Any Party may, after meeting and conferring, by motion or application for an
25 order to show cause before this Court, enforce the terms and conditions contained in this Consent
26 Judgment. Enforcement of the terms and conditions of Section 3.2 of this Consent Judgment
27 shall be brought exclusively pursuant to Sections 4.2 through 4.3.

28

1 4.2 **Notice of Violation.** CEH may seek to enforce the requirements of Section
2 3.2 by issuing a Notice of Violation pursuant to this Section 4.2.

3 4.2.1 **Service of Notice.** CEH shall serve the Notice of Violation on Settling
4 Defendant within 45 days of the date the alleged violation(s) was or were observed,
5 provided, however, that: (i) CEH may have up to an additional 45 days to provide Settling
6 Defendant with the test data required by Section 4.2.2(d) below if it has not yet obtained it
7 from its laboratory; and (ii) CEH may serve a Notice of Violation to a supplier of a
8 Covered Product so long as: (a) the identity of the supplier cannot be discerned from the
9 labeling of the Covered Product; and (b) the Notice of Violation to the supplier is served
10 within 45 days of the date the supplier is identified by CEH.

11 4.2.2 **Supporting Documentation.** The Notice of Violation shall, at a minimum,
12 set forth for each Covered Product: (a) the date(s) the alleged violation(s) was observed,
13 (b) the location at which the Covered Product was offered for sale, (c) a description of the
14 Covered Product giving rise to the alleged violation, and of each material or component
15 that is alleged not to comply with the Lead Limits, including a picture of the Covered
16 Product and all identifying information on tags and labels, and (d) all test data obtained by
17 CEH regarding the Covered Product and related supporting documentation, including all
18 laboratory reports, quality assurance reports and quality control reports associated with
19 testing of the Covered Products. Such Notice of Violation shall be based at least in part
20 upon total acid digest testing performed by an independent accredited laboratory. Wipe,
21 swipe, x-ray fluorescence, and swab testing are not by themselves sufficient to support a
22 Notice of Violation, although any such testing may be used as additional support for a
23 Notice. The Parties agree that the sample Notice of Violation attached hereto as Exhibit A
24 is sufficient in form to satisfy the requirements of subsections (c) and (d) of this Section
25 4.2.2.

26 4.2.3 **Additional Documentation.** CEH shall promptly make available for
27 inspection and/or copying upon request by and at the expense of Settling Defendant, all
28 supporting documentation related to the testing of the Covered Products and associated

1 quality control samples, including chain of custody records, all laboratory logbook entries
2 for laboratory receiving, sample preparation, and instrumental analysis, and all printouts
3 from all analytical instruments relating to the testing of Covered Product samples and any
4 and all calibration, quality assurance, and quality control tests performed or relied upon in
5 conjunction with the testing of the Covered Products, obtained by or available to CEH that
6 pertains to the Covered Product's alleged noncompliance with Section 3 and, if available,
7 any exemplars of Covered Products tested.

8 **4.2.4 Multiple Notices.** If Settling Defendant has received more than four
9 Notices of Violation in any 12-month period, at CEH's option, CEH may seek whatever
10 fines, costs, penalties, or remedies are provided by law for failure to comply with the
11 Consent Judgment. For purposes of determining the number of Notices of Violation
12 pursuant to this Section 4.2.4, the following shall be excluded:

13 (a) Multiple notices identifying Covered Products Manufactured for or
14 sold to Settling Defendant from the same Vendor; and

15 (b) A Notice of Violation that meets one or more of the conditions of
16 Section 4.3.3(c).

17 **4.3 Notice of Election.** Within 30 days of receiving a Notice of Violation
18 pursuant to Section 4.2, including the test data required pursuant to 4.2.2(d), Settling Defendant
19 shall provide written notice to CEH stating whether it elects to contest the allegations contained in
20 the Notice of Violation ("Notice of Election"). Failure to provide a Notice of Election shall be
21 deemed an election to contest the Notice of Violation. Any contributions to the Fashion
22 Accessory Testing Fund required under this Section 4.3 shall be made payable to The Center for
23 Environmental Health and included with Settling Defendant's Notice of Election.

24 **4.3.1 Contested Notices.** If the Notice of Violation is contested, the Notice of
25 Election shall include all then-available documentary evidence regarding the alleged
26 violation, including any test data. Within 30 days the parties shall meet and confer to
27 attempt to resolve their dispute. Should such attempts at meeting and conferring fail,
28 CEH may file an enforcement motion or application pursuant to Section 4.1. If Settling

1 Defendant withdraws its Notice of Election to contest the Notice of Violation before any
2 motion concerning the violations alleged in the Notice of Violation is filed pursuant to
3 Section 4.1, Settling Defendant shall make a contribution to the Proposition 65 Fashion
4 Accessory Testing Fund in the amount of \$12,500 and shall comply with all of the non-
5 monetary provisions of Section 4.3.2. If, at any time prior to reaching an agreement or
6 obtaining a decision from the Court, CEH or Settling Defendant acquires additional test or
7 other data regarding the alleged violation, it shall promptly provide all such data or
8 information to the other Party.

9 4.3.2 **Non-Contested Notices.** If the Notice of Violation is not contested,
10 Settling Defendant shall include in its Notice of Election a detailed description of
11 corrective action that it has undertaken or proposes to undertake to address the alleged
12 violation. Any such correction shall, at a minimum, provide reasonable assurance that the
13 Covered Product will no longer be offered by Settling Defendant or its customers for sale
14 in California. If there is a dispute over the sufficiency of the proposed corrective action or
15 its implementation, CEH shall promptly notify Settling Defendant and the Parties shall
16 meet and confer before seeking the intervention of the Court to resolve the dispute. In
17 addition to the corrective action, Settling Defendant shall make a contribution to the
18 Fashion Accessory Testing Fund in the amount of \$10,000, unless one of the provisions of
19 Section 4.3.3 applies.

20 4.3.3 **Limitations in Non-Contested Matters.**

21 (a) If it elects not to contest a Notice of Violation before any motion
22 concerning the violation(s) at issue has been filed, the monetary liability of Settling
23 Defendant shall be limited to the contributions required by Section 4.3.2 and this Section
24 4.3.3, if any.

25 (b) If more than one Settling Defendant has manufactured, sold, offered
26 for sale or distributed a Covered Product identified in a non-contested Notice of Violation,
27 only one required contribution may be assessed against all Settling Defendants as to the
28 noticed Covered Product.

1 (c) The contribution to the Fashion Accessory Testing Fund shall be:

2 (i) One thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$1,750) if Settling
3 Defendant, prior to receiving and accepting for distribution or sale the
4 Covered Product identified in the Notice of Violation, obtained test results
5 demonstrating that the materials or components in the Covered Product
6 identified in the Notice of Violation complied with the applicable Lead
7 Limits, and further provided that such test results would be sufficient to
8 support a Notice of Violation and that the testing was performed within
9 two years prior to the date of the sales transaction on which the Notice of
10 Violation is based. Settling Defendant shall provide copies of such test
11 results and supporting documentation to CEH with its Notice of Election;
12 or

13 (ii) Not required or payable, if the Notice of Violation identifies
14 the same Covered Product or Covered Products, differing only in size or
15 color, that have been the subject of another Notice of Violation within the
16 preceding 12 months.

17 **4.4 Additional Enforcement for Noncompliant Non-Covered Products.** If
18 CEH alleges that Settling Defendant sold or offered for retail sale to California consumers a
19 Fashion Accessory that is not a Covered Product, and that contains Lead in an amount that
20 exceeds any of the applicable Lead Limits (“Noncompliant Non-Covered Product”), then prior to
21 CEH serving a 60-Day Notice under Proposition 65 on Settling Defendant, CEH shall provide
22 notice to Settling Defendant pursuant to this Section 4.4.

23 4.4.1 The notice shall contain the information required for a Notice of Violation
24 in Section 4.2. If the information is insufficient to allow Settling Defendant to identify the
25 Noncompliant Non-Covered Product and/or Vendor, it may request that CEH provide any
26 further identifying information for the Noncompliant Non-Covered Product that is
27 reasonably available to it.
28

1 4.4.2 Within 30 days of receiving a notice pursuant to Section 4.4, or of any
2 requested further information sufficient to identify the Noncompliant Non-Covered
3 Product, whichever is later, Settling Defendant shall serve a Notice of Election on CEH.
4 The Notice of Election shall:

5 (a) Identify to CEH (by proper name, address of principal place of
6 business and telephone number) the person or entity that sold the Noncompliant Non-
7 Covered Product to Settling Defendant;

8 (b) Identify the manufacturer and other distributors in the chain of
9 distribution of the Noncompliant Non-Covered Product, provided that such information is
10 reasonably available; and

11 (c) Include either: (i) a statement that Settling Defendant elects not to
12 proceed under this Section 4.4, in which case CEH may take further action including
13 issuance of a 60-Day Notice under Proposition 65; (ii) a statement that Settling Defendant
14 elects to proceed under this Section 4.4, with a description of corrective action that meets
15 the conditions of Section 4.3.2., and a contribution to the Fashion Accessory Testing Fund
16 in the amount required under Section 4.4.6, or (iii) a statement that Settling Defendant
17 contends that the Noncompliant Non-Covered Product is released from liability by a
18 Qualified Settlement under Section 4.4.4 along with a copy of such Qualified Settlement.

19 4.4.3 A party's disclosure pursuant to this Section 4.4 of any (i) test reports, (ii)
20 confidential business information, or (iii) other information that may be subject to a claim
21 of privilege or confidentiality, shall not constitute a waiver of any such claim of privilege
22 or confidentiality, provided that the Party disclosing such information shall clearly
23 designate it as confidential. Any Party receiving information designated as confidential
24 pursuant to this Section 4.4.3 shall not disclose such information to any unrelated person
25 or entity, and shall use such information solely for purposes of resolving any disputes
26 under this Consent Judgment.

27 4.4.4 No further action is required of Settling Defendant under this Consent
28 Judgment if the Noncompliant Non-Covered Product is otherwise released from liability

1 for alleged violations of Proposition 65 with respect to Lead in the Noncompliant Non-
2 Covered Product by the terms of a separate settlement agreement or consent judgment
3 entered into by CEH under Health & Safety Code § 25249.7 (“Qualified Settlement”).

4 4.4.5 If Settling Defendant elects not to proceed under Section 4.4, then neither
5 Settling Defendant nor CEH has any further duty under this Section 4.4 and either may
6 pursue any available remedies under Proposition 65 or otherwise. If Settling Defendant
7 elects to proceed under Section 4.4.2(c)(ii), then compliance with that Section shall
8 constitute compliance with Proposition 65 as to that Noncompliant Non-Covered Product.

9 4.4.6 If Settling Defendant elects to proceed under this Section 4.4 and is not
10 relieved of liability under Section 4.4.4, Settling Defendant shall make a contribution to
11 the Fashion Accessory Testing Fund in the amounts that follow unless one of the
12 provisions of Section 4.3.3(c) applies, in which case the applicable amount specified in
13 Section 4.3.3(c) if any, shall instead apply. The contribution shall be \$5,000 if at least one
14 of the person(s) identified by Settling Defendant pursuant to Section 4.4.2 (i) is a person
15 in the course of doing business as defined in Health & Safety Code § 25249.11(b) and (ii)
16 has a principal place of business located within the United States, and \$10,000 for all
17 other notices.

18 4.4.7 If Settling Defendant makes a contribution pursuant to this Section and at a
19 later date CEH resolves the alleged violation with the direct or indirect Vendor of the
20 Noncompliant Non-Covered Product, CEH shall notify Settling Defendant and Settling
21 Defendant shall be entitled to a refund of the lesser amount of its contribution or the
22 settlement amount paid by such Vendor. If the settlement or consent judgment between
23 CEH and the direct or indirect Vendor of the Noncompliant Non-Covered Product does
24 not provide for the refund to be paid directly by the Vendor to Settling Defendant, then
25 CEH shall pay the refund to Settling Defendant within 15 days of receiving the Vendor’s
26 settlement payment.

27 4.4.8 Any notice served by CEH pursuant to this Section 4.4 shall not be
28 considered a Notice of Violation for purposes of Section 4.2. Nothing in this Section 4.4

1 affects CEH's right to issue a 60-Day Notice under Proposition 65 against any entity other
2 than Settling Defendant.

3 **5. PAYMENTS**

4 **5.1 Payments by Settling Defendant.** Within five (5) days of entry of this Consent
5 Judgment, Settling Defendant shall pay the total sum of \$41,250 as a settlement payment. The
6 total settlement amount for Settling Defendant shall be paid in three separate checks delivered to
7 the offices of the Lexington Law Group (Attn: Eric Somers), 503 Divisadero Street, San
8 Francisco, California 94117, and made payable and allocated as follows:

9 5.1.1 Settling Defendant shall pay the sum of \$5,430 as a civil penalty pursuant
10 to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b), such money to be apportioned by CEH in accordance with
11 Health & Safety Code § 25249.12 (25% to CEH and 75% to the State of California's Office of
12 Environmental Health Hazard Assessment). The civil penalty check shall be made payable to the
13 Center For Environmental Health.

14 5.1.2 Settling Defendant shall pay the sum of \$8,150 as a payment in lieu of civil
15 penalty to CEH pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b), and California Code of
16 Regulations, Title 11, § 3203(b). CEH shall use such funds to continue its work educating and
17 protecting people from exposures to toxic chemicals, including heavy metals. In addition, as part
18 of its Community Environmental Action and Justice Fund, CEH will use four percent of such
19 funds to award grants to grassroots environmental justice groups working to educate and protect
20 people from exposures to toxic chemicals. The method of selection of such groups can be found
21 at the CEH web site at www.ceh.org/justicefund. The payment pursuant to this Section shall be
22 made payable to the Center For Environmental Health.

23 5.1.3 Settling Defendant shall also separately pay the sum of \$27,670 to the
24 Lexington Law Group as reimbursement of a portion of CEH's reasonable attorneys' fees and
25 costs. The attorneys' fees and cost reimbursement check shall be made payable to the Lexington
26 Law Group.

27 **6. MODIFICATION**

28 **6.1 Written Consent.** This Consent Judgment may be modified from time to

1 time by express written agreement of the Parties with the approval of the Court, or by an order of
2 this Court upon motion and in accordance with law.

3 6.2 **Meet and Confer.** Any Party seeking to modify this Consent Judgment shall
4 attempt in good faith to meet and confer with all affected Parties prior to filing a motion to
5 modify the Consent Judgment.

6 **7. CLAIMS COVERED AND RELEASED**

7 7.1 This Consent Judgment is a full, final and binding resolution between CEH on
8 behalf of itself and the public interest and Settling Defendant, and its parents, subsidiaries,
9 affiliated entities that are under common ownership, directors, officers, employees, and attorneys
10 (“Defendant Releasees”), and each entity to whom they directly or indirectly distribute or sell
11 Covered Products, including but not limited to distributors, wholesalers, customers, retailers,
12 franchisees, cooperative members, licensors, and licensees (“Downstream Defendant Releasees”)
13 of any violation of Proposition 65 that was or could have been asserted in the Complaint against
14 Settling Defendant, Defendant Releasees, and Downstream Defendant Releasees, based on failure
15 to warn about alleged exposure to Lead contained in Covered Products that were sold by Settling
16 Defendant prior to the Effective Date.

17 7.2 Compliance with the terms of this Consent Judgment by Settling Defendant
18 constitutes compliance with Proposition 65 with respect to Lead in Covered Products sold by
19 Settling Defendant.

20 7.3 Nothing in this Section 7 affects CEH’s right to commence or prosecute an
21 action under Proposition 65 against any person other than Settling Defendant, Defendant
22 Releasees, or Downstream Defendant Releasees.

23 **8. NOTICE**

24 8.1 When CEH is entitled to receive any notice under this Consent Judgment, the
25 notice shall be sent by first class and electronic mail to:

8.3 Any Party may modify the person and address to whom the notice is to be sent by sending each other Party notice by first class and electronic mail.

9. COURT APPROVAL

9.1 This Consent Judgment shall become effective upon entry by the Court. CEH shall prepare and file a Motion for Approval of this Consent Judgment and Settling Defendant shall support entry of this Consent Judgment.

9.2 If this Consent Judgment is not entered by the Court, it shall be of no force or effect and shall never be introduced into evidence or otherwise used in any proceeding for any purpose other than to allow the Court to determine if there was a material breach of Section 9.1.

10. ATTORNEYS' FEES

10.1 Should CEH prevail on any motion, application for an order to show cause or other proceeding to enforce a violation of this Consent Judgment, CEH shall be entitled to its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred as a result of such motion or application. Should

1 Settling Defendant prevail on any motion application for an order to show cause or other
2 proceeding, Settling Defendant may be awarded its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs as a result
3 of such motion or application upon a finding by the Court that CEH's prosecution of the motion
4 or application lacked substantial justification. For purposes of this Consent Judgment, the term
5 substantial justification shall carry the same meaning as used in the Civil Discovery Act of 1986,
6 Code of Civil Procedure §§ 2016, *et seq.*

7 10.2 Except as otherwise provided in this Consent Judgment, each Party shall bear
8 its own attorneys' fees and costs.

9 10.3 Nothing in this Section 10 shall preclude a Party from seeking an award of
10 sanctions pursuant to law.

11 **11. TERMINATION**

12 11.1 This Consent Judgment shall be terminable by CEH or Settling Defendant at
13 any time after January 1, 2019, upon the provision of 30 days advanced written notice; such
14 termination shall be effective upon the subsequent filing of a notice of termination with Superior
15 Court of Alameda County.

16 11.2 Should this Consent Judgment be terminated pursuant to this Section, it shall
17 be of no further force or effect as to the terminated parties; provided, however that if CEH is the
18 terminating Party, the provisions of Sections 5, 7, and 12.1 shall survive any termination and
19 provided further that if Settling Defendant is the terminating Party, the provisions of Sections 5,
20 7.1 and 12.1 shall survive any termination.

21 **12. OTHER TERMS**

22 12.1 The terms of this Consent Judgment shall be governed by the laws of the State
23 of California.

24 12.2 This Consent Judgment shall apply to and be binding upon CEH and Settling
25 Defendant, and their respective divisions, subdivisions, and subsidiaries, and the successors or
26 assigns of any of them.

27 12.3 This Consent Judgment contains the sole and entire agreement and
28 understanding of the Parties with respect to the entire subject matter hereof, and any and all prior

1 discussions, negotiations, commitments, or understandings related thereto, if any, are hereby
2 merged herein and therein. There are no warranties, representations, or other agreements between
3 the Parties except as expressly set forth herein. No representations, oral or otherwise, express or
4 implied, other than those specifically referred to in this Consent Judgment have been made by any
5 Party hereto. No other agreements not specifically contained or referenced herein, oral or
6 otherwise, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the Parties hereto. No supplementation,
7 modification, waiver, or termination of this Consent Judgment shall be binding unless executed in
8 writing by the Party to be bound thereby. No waiver of any of the provisions of this Consent
9 Judgment shall be deemed or shall constitute a waiver of any of the other provisions hereof
10 whether or not similar, nor shall such waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

11 12.4 Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall release, or in any way affect any rights
12 that Settling Defendant might have against any other party, whether or not that party is a Settling
13 Defendant.

14 12.5 This Court shall retain jurisdiction of this matter to implement or modify the
15 Consent Judgment.

16 12.6 The stipulations to this Consent Judgment may be executed in counterparts
17 and by means of facsimile or portable document format (pdf), which taken together shall be
18 deemed to constitute one document.

19 12.7 Each signatory to this Consent Judgment certifies that he or she is fully
20 authorized by the Party he or she represents to stipulate to this Consent Judgment and to enter into
21 and execute the Consent Judgment on behalf of the Party represented and legally to bind that
22 Party.

23 12.8 The Parties, including their counsel, have participated in the preparation of
24 this Consent Judgment and this Consent Judgment is the result of the joint efforts of the Parties.
25 This Consent Judgment was subject to revision and modification by the Parties and has been
26 accepted and approved as to its final form by all Parties and their counsel. Accordingly, any
27 uncertainty or ambiguity existing in this Consent Judgment shall not be interpreted against any
28 Party as a result of the manner of the preparation of this Consent Judgment. Each Party to this


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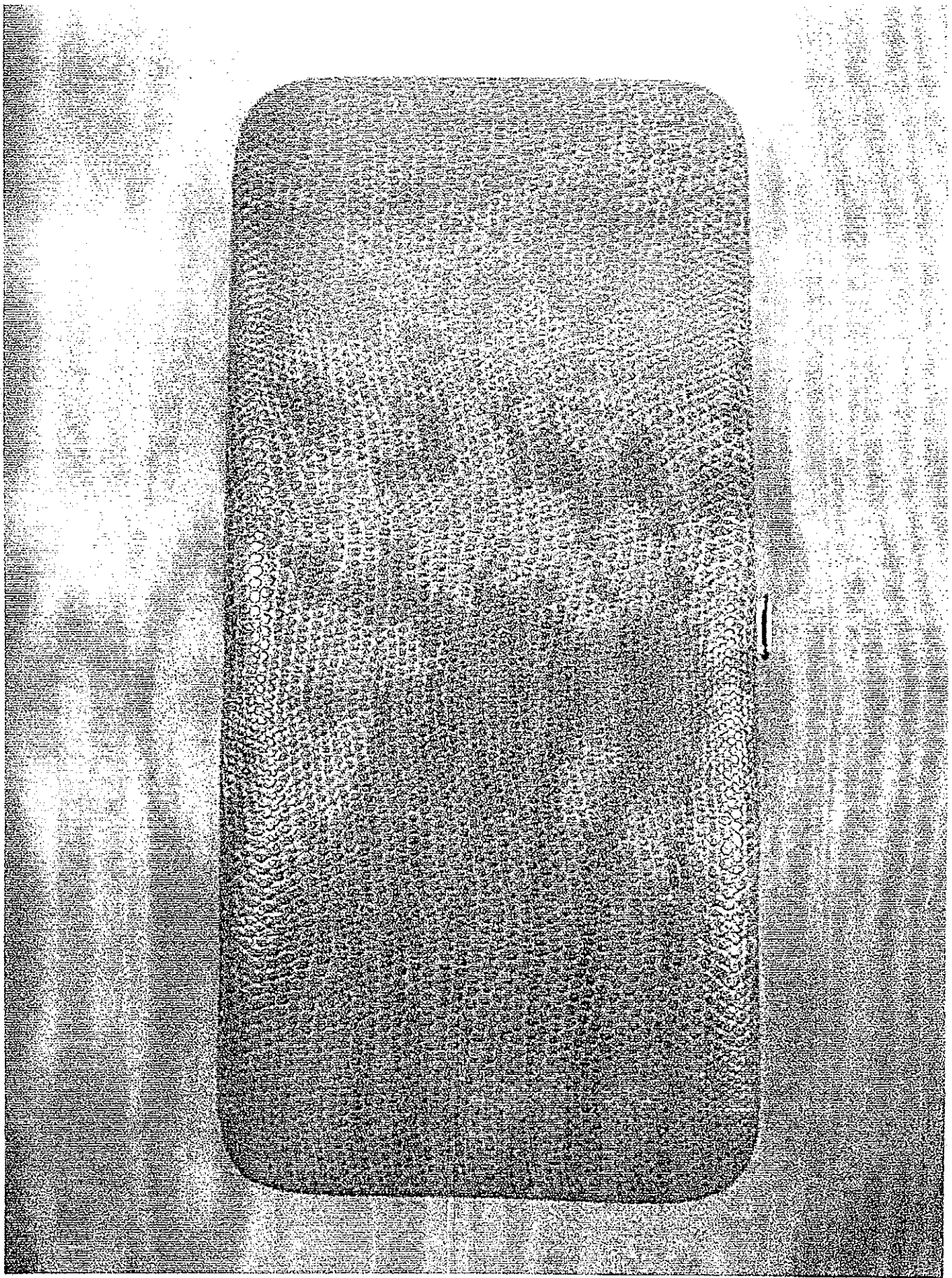
