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1. DEFINITIONS

1.1 "Covered Products" means wallets, handbags, purses and clutches that are
Manufactured, distributed, sold or offered for sale by Settling Defendant.

1.2 "Effective Date" means the date on which this Consent Judgment is entered by
the Court.

1.3 "Lead Limits" means the maximum concentrations of lead and lead
compounds ("Lead") by weight specified in Section 3.2.

1.4 "Manufactured" and "Manufactures" means to manufacture, produce, or
assemble.

1 1.5 “Paint or other Surface Coatings” means a fluid, semi-fluid, or other material,
2 with or without a suspension of finely divided coloring matter, which changes to a solid film
3 when a thin layer is applied to a metal, wood, stone, paper, leather, cloth, plastic, or other surface.
4 This term does not include printing inks or those materials which actually become a part of the
5 substrate, such as the pigment in a plastic article, or those materials which are actually bonded to
6 the substrate, such as by electroplating or ceramic glazing.

7 1.6 “Vendor” means a person or entity that Manufactures, imports, distributes, or
8 supplies a Covered Product to Settling Defendant.

9 **2. INTRODUCTION**

10 2.1 The parties to this Consent Judgment (“Parties”) are the Center for
11 Environmental Health (“CEH”) and Defendant B.R.E. Industries, Inc. (“Settling Defendant”).

12 2.2 On July 30, 2015, CEH served a 60-Day Notice of Violation under Proposition
13 65 (The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986, California Health & Safety
14 Code §§ 25249.5, *et seq.*) (the “Notice”) to Settling Defendant, the California Attorney General,
15 the District Attorneys of every County in the State of California, and the City Attorneys for every
16 City in the State of California with a population greater than 750,000. The Notice alleges that
17 Settling Defendant violated Proposition 65 by exposing persons to Lead contained in wallets,
18 handbags, purses and clutches without first providing a clear and reasonable Proposition 65
19 warning.

20 2.3 On April 8, 2015, CEH filed the action *Center for Environmental Health v.*
21 *Charming Charlie LLC, et al.*, Case No. RG 15-765590, in the Superior Court of California for
22 Alameda County. On or about October 9, 2015, CEH named Settling Defendant as a defendant in
23 that action pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure § 474.

24 2.4 Settling Defendant manufactures, distributes and/or offers for sale Covered
25 Products in the State of California or has done so in the past.

26 2.5 For purposes of this Consent Judgment only, the Parties stipulate that this
27 Court has jurisdiction over the allegations of violations contained in the operative Complaint
28 applicable to Settling Defendant (the “Complaint”) and personal jurisdiction over Settling

1 Defendant as to the acts alleged in the Complaint, that venue is proper in the County of Alameda,
2 and that this Court has jurisdiction to enter this Consent Judgment.

3 2.6 Nothing in this Consent Judgment is or shall be construed as an admission by
4 the Parties of any fact, conclusion of law, issue of law or violation of law, nor shall compliance
5 with the Consent Judgment constitute or be construed as an admission by the Parties of any fact,
6 conclusion of law, issue of law, or violation of law. Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall
7 prejudice, waive or impair any right, remedy, argument or defense the Parties may have in any
8 other legal proceeding. This Consent Judgment is the product of negotiation and compromise and
9 is accepted by the Parties for purposes of settling, compromising and resolving issues disputed in
10 this action.

11 **3. INJUNCTIVE RELIEF**

12 3.1 **Specification Compliance Date.** To the extent it has not already done so, no
13 more than thirty (30) days after the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall provide the Lead
14 Limits to its Vendors of Covered Products and shall instruct each Vendor to use reasonable
15 efforts to provide Covered Products that comply with the Lead Limits on a nationwide basis.

16 3.2 **Lead Limits.** Commencing on the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall
17 not purchase, import, Manufacture, supply to an unaffiliated third party, or sell or offer for sale
18 any Covered Product that will be sold or offered for sale to California consumers that contains a
19 material or is made of a component that exceeds the following Lead Limits:

20 3.2.1 Paint or other Surface Coatings: 90 parts per million (“ppm”).

21 3.2.2 Polyvinyl chloride (“PVC”): 200 ppm.

22 3.2.3 All other materials or components other than cubic zirconia (sometimes
23 called cubic zirconium, CZ), crystal, glass or rhinestones: 300 ppm.

24 3.3 **Action Regarding Specific Products.**

25 3.3.1 On or before the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall cease selling in
26 California the following products to the extent such products exceed the Lead Limits set
27 forth in section 3.2 above: (i) the Charming Charlie Natalee Crossbody Clutch in Dark
28 Coral, SKU No. 16547300010, UPC No. 410006729988; (ii) the Charming Charlie Belted

1 Purse in Brown, UPC No. 410005989772; (iii) the Imoshion Crossbody Convertible
2 Clutch in Mint, SKU No. 9185990000, Item No. 145057923, Style No. 7923; and (iv)
3 Imoshion Felicity Crossbody Handbag in Cognac, T.J. Maxx SKU No.
4 1000057098494523, T.J. Maxx Style No. 1000057098 (the “Unreformulated Section 3.3
5 Products”). On or before the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall also: (i) cease
6 shipping the Unreformulated Section 3.3 Products to any of its stores and/or customers
7 that resell the Unreformulated Section 3.3 Products in California, and (ii) send instructions
8 to its stores and/or customers that resell the Unreformulated Section 3.3 Products in
9 California instructing them either to: (a) return all of the Unreformulated Section 3.3
10 Products to Settling Defendant for destruction; or (b) directly destroy the Unreformulated
11 Section 3.3 Products.

12 3.3.2 Any destruction of the Unreformulated Section 3.3 Products shall be in
13 compliance with all applicable laws.

14 3.3.3 Within sixty (60) days of the Effective Date, Settling Defendant shall
15 provide CEH with written certification from Settling Defendant confirming compliance
16 with the requirements of this Section 3.3.

17 **4. ENFORCEMENT**

18 4.1 Any Party may, after meeting and conferring, by motion or application for an
19 order to show cause before this Court, enforce the terms and conditions contained in this Consent
20 Judgment. Enforcement of the terms and conditions of Section 3.2 of this Consent Judgment
21 shall be brought exclusively pursuant to Sections 4.2 through 4.3.

22 4.2 **Notice of Violation.** CEH may seek to enforce the requirements of Section
23 3.2 by issuing a Notice of Violation pursuant to this Section 4.2.

24 4.2.1 **Service of Notice.** CEH shall serve the Notice of Violation on Settling
25 Defendant within 45 days of the date the alleged violation(s) was or were observed,
26 provided, however, that: (i) CEH may have up to an additional 45 days to provide Settling
27 Defendant with the test data required by Section 4.2.2(d) below if it has not yet obtained it
28 from its laboratory; and (ii) CEH may serve a Notice of Violation to a supplier of a

1 Covered Product so long as: (a) the identity of the supplier cannot be discerned from the
2 labeling of the Covered Product; and (b) the Notice of Violation to the supplier is served
3 within 45 days of the date the supplier is identified by CEH.

4 **4.2.2 Supporting Documentation.** The Notice of Violation shall, at a
5 minimum, set forth for each Covered Product: (a) the date(s) the alleged violation(s) was
6 observed, (b) the location at which the Covered Product was offered for sale, (c) a
7 description of the Covered Product giving rise to the alleged violation, and of each
8 material or component that is alleged not to comply with the Lead Limits, including a
9 picture of the Covered Product and all identifying information on tags and labels, and (d)
10 all test data obtained by CEH regarding the Covered Product and related supporting
11 documentation, including all laboratory reports, quality assurance reports and quality
12 control reports associated with testing of the Covered Products. Such Notice of Violation
13 shall be based at least in part upon total acid digest testing performed by an independent
14 accredited laboratory. Wipe, swipe, x-ray fluorescence, and swab testing are not by
15 themselves sufficient to support a Notice of Violation, although any such testing may be
16 used as additional support for a Notice. The Parties agree that the type of information
17 attached hereto as Exhibit A is sufficient content to satisfy the requirements of
18 subsections (c) and (d) of this Section 4.2.2.

19 **4.2.3 Additional Documentation.** CEH shall promptly make available for
20 inspection and/or copying upon request by and at the expense of Settling Defendant, all
21 supporting documentation related to the testing of the Covered Products and associated
22 quality control samples, including chain of custody records, all laboratory logbook entries
23 for laboratory receiving, sample preparation, and instrumental analysis, and all printouts
24 from all analytical instruments relating to the testing of Covered Product samples and any
25 and all calibration, quality assurance, and quality control tests performed or relied upon in
26 conjunction with the testing of the Covered Products, obtained by or available to CEH that
27 pertains to the Covered Product's alleged noncompliance with Section 3 and, if available,
28 any exemplars of Covered Products tested.

1 4.2.4 **Multiple Notices.** If Settling Defendant has received more than four
2 Notices of Violation in any 12-month period, at CEH's option, CEH may seek whatever
3 fines, costs, penalties, or remedies are provided by law for failure to comply with the
4 Consent Judgment. For purposes of determining the number of Notices of Violation
5 pursuant to this Section 4.2.4, the following shall be excluded:

6 (a) Multiple notices identifying Covered Products Manufactured for or
7 sold to Settling Defendant from the same Vendor; and

8 (b) A Notice of Violation that meets one or more of the conditions of
9 Section 4.3.3(c).

10 4.3 **Notice of Election.** Within thirty (30) days of receiving a Notice of Violation
11 pursuant to Section 4.2, including the test data required pursuant to 4.2.2(d), Settling Defendant
12 shall provide written notice to CEH stating whether it elects to contest the allegations contained in
13 the Notice of Violation ("Notice of Election"). Failure to provide a Notice of Election shall be
14 deemed an election to contest the Notice of Violation. Any contributions to the Fashion
15 Accessory Testing Fund required under this Section 4.3 shall be made payable to The Center for
16 Environmental Health and included with Settling Defendant's Notice of Election.

17 4.3.1 **Contested Notices.** If the Notice of Violation is contested, the Notice of
18 Election shall include all then-available documentary evidence regarding the alleged
19 violation, including any test data. Within thirty (30) days the parties shall meet and confer
20 to attempt to resolve their dispute. Should such attempts at meeting and conferring fail,
21 CEH may file an enforcement motion or application pursuant to Section 4.1. If Settling
22 Defendant withdraws its Notice of Election to contest the Notice of Violation before any
23 motion concerning the violations alleged in the Notice of Violation is filed pursuant to
24 Section 4.1, Settling Defendant shall make a contribution to the Proposition 65 Fashion
25 Accessory Testing Fund in the amount of \$12,500 and shall comply with all of the non-
26 monetary provisions of Section 4.3.2. If, at any time prior to reaching an agreement or
27 obtaining a decision from the Court, CEH or Settling Defendant acquires additional test or
28 other data regarding the alleged violation, it shall promptly provide all such data or

1 information to the other Party.

2 4.3.2 **Non-Contested Notices.** If the Notice of Violation is not contested,
3 Settling Defendant shall include in its Notice of Election a detailed description of
4 corrective action that it has undertaken or proposes to undertake to address the alleged
5 violation. Any such correction shall, at a minimum, provide reasonable assurance that the
6 Covered Product will no longer be offered by Settling Defendant or its customers for sale
7 in California. If there is a dispute over the sufficiency of the proposed corrective action or
8 its implementation, CEH shall promptly notify Settling Defendant and the Parties shall
9 meet and confer before seeking the intervention of the Court to resolve the dispute. In
10 addition to the corrective action, Settling Defendant shall make a contribution to the
11 Fashion Accessory Testing Fund in the amount of \$10,000, unless one of the provisions of
12 Section 4.3.3 applies.

13 4.3.3 **Limitations in Non-Contested Matters.**

14 (a) If it elects not to contest a Notice of Violation before any motion
15 concerning the violation(s) at issue has been filed, the monetary liability of Settling
16 Defendant shall be limited to the contributions required by Section 4.3.2 and this Section
17 4.3.3, if any.

18 (b) If more than one Settling Defendant has manufactured, sold, offered
19 for sale or distributed a Covered Product identified in a non-contested Notice of Violation,
20 only one required contribution may be assessed against all Settling Defendants as to the
21 noticed Covered Product.

22 (c) The contribution to the Fashion Accessory Testing Fund shall be:

23 (i) One thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$1,750) if Settling
24 Defendant, prior to receiving and accepting for distribution or sale the
25 Covered Product identified in the Notice of Violation, obtained test results
26 demonstrating that all of the materials or components in the Covered
27 Product identified in the Notice of Violation complied with the applicable
28 Lead Limits, and further provided that such test results meet the same

1 quality criteria to support a Notice of Violation as set forth in Section 4.2.2
2 and that the testing was performed within two years prior to the date of the
3 sales transaction on which the Notice of Violation is based. Settling
4 Defendant shall provide copies of such test results and supporting
5 documentation to CEH with its Notice of Election; or

6 (ii) One thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) if Settling
7 Defendant is in violation of Section 3.2 only insofar as that Section deems
8 Settling Defendant to have “offered for sale to California consumers” a
9 product sold at retail by Settling Defendant’s customer, provided however,
10 that no contribution is required or payable if Settling Defendant has already
11 been required to pay a total of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) pursuant to
12 this subsection. This subsection shall apply only to Covered Products that
13 Settling Defendant demonstrates were shipped prior to the Effective Date;
14 or

15 (iii) Not required or payable, if the Notice of Violation identifies
16 the same Covered Product or Covered Products, differing only in size or
17 color, that have been the subject of another Notice of Violation within the
18 preceding 12 months.

19 **5. PAYMENTS**

20 5.1 **Payments by Settling Defendant.** Settling Defendant shall pay the total sum of
21 \$40,000 as a settlement payment. This total payment shall be made in two installments according
22 to the following schedule: (a) on or before March 1, 2016, Defendant shall pay \$20,000 as a
23 settlement payment; and (b) on or before May 1, 2016, Defendant shall pay \$20,000 as a
24 settlement payment. Each of these payments shall be paid in three separate checks delivered to
25 the address set forth in Section 8.1 and shall be made payable and allocated as set forth below.
26 Any failure by Settling Defendant to comply with the payment terms herein shall be subject to a
27 stipulated late payment fee of \$100 per day, which amount shall be recoverable by CEH, together
28 with its reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs, in an enforcement proceeding brought pursuant to

1 Section 4. The total settlement amount for Settling Defendant shall be made payable and
2 allocated as follows:

3 5.1.1 Settling Defendant shall pay the total sum of \$5,250 as a civil penalty
4 pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b), such money to be apportioned by CEH in
5 accordance with Health & Safety Code § 25249.12 (25% to CEH and 75% to the State of
6 California's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment). \$2,625 of this amount shall be
7 included with the first payment due on March 1, 2016 and \$2,625 of this amount shall be included
8 with the second payment due on May 1, 2016. Each penalty check shall be made payable to the
9 Center for Environmental Health.

10 5.1.2 Settling Defendant shall pay the total sum of \$7,900 as a payment in lieu of
11 civil penalty to CEH pursuant to Health & Safety Code § 25249.7(b), and California Code of
12 Regulations, Title 11, § 3203(b). CEH shall use such funds to continue its work educating and
13 protecting people from exposures to toxic chemicals, including heavy metals. In addition, as part
14 of its Community Environmental Action and Justice Fund, CEH will use four percent of such
15 funds to award grants to grassroots environmental justice groups working to educate and protect
16 people from exposures to toxic chemicals. The method of selection of such groups can be found
17 at the CEH web site at www.ceh.org/justicefund. \$3,950 of this amount shall be included with
18 the first payment due on March 1, 2016 and \$3,950 of this amount shall be included with the
19 second payment due on May 1, 2016. Each payment in lieu of penalty check shall be made
20 payable to the Center for Environmental Health.

21 5.1.3 Settling Defendant shall also separately pay the total sum of \$26,850 to the
22 Lexington Law Group as reimbursement of a portion of CEH's reasonable attorneys' fees and
23 costs. \$13,425 of this amount shall be included with the first payment due on March 1, 2016 and
24 \$13,425 of this amount shall be included with the second payment due on May 1, 2016. Each
25 check issued pursuant to this section shall be made payable to the Lexington Law Group.
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1 **6. MODIFICATION**

2 6.1 **Written Consent.** This Consent Judgment may be modified from time to
3 time by express written agreement of the Parties with the approval of the Court, or by an order of
4 this Court upon motion and in accordance with law.

5 6.2 **Meet and Confer.** Any Party seeking to modify this Consent Judgment shall
6 attempt in good faith to meet and confer with all affected Parties prior to filing a motion to
7 modify the Consent Judgment.

8 **7. CLAIMS COVERED AND RELEASED**

9 7.1 This Consent Judgment is a full, final and binding resolution between CEH on
10 behalf of itself and the public interest and Settling Defendant, and its parents, subsidiaries,
11 affiliated entities that are under common ownership, directors, officers, employees, and attorneys
12 (“Defendant Releasees”), and each entity to whom they directly or indirectly distribute or sell
13 Covered Products, including but not limited to distributors, wholesalers, customers, retailers,
14 franchisees, cooperative members, licensors, and licensees, including without limitation TJX
15 Companies, Inc., T.J. Maxx of CA, LLC, Charming Charlie LLC, and The Buckle, Inc.
16 (“Downstream Defendant Releasees”) of any violation of Proposition 65 that was or could have
17 been asserted in the Complaint against Settling Defendant, Defendant Releasees, and
18 Downstream Defendant Releasees, based on failure to warn about alleged exposure to Lead
19 contained in Covered Products that were sold by Settling Defendant prior to the Effective Date.

20 7.2 Compliance with the terms of this Consent Judgment by Settling Defendant
21 constitutes compliance with Proposition 65 with respect to Lead in Covered Products sold by
22 Settling Defendant.

23 7.3 This Consent Judgment resolves all monetary claims CEH has asserted against
24 Settling Defendant and any of its retail customers under Fashion Accessory Testing Fund Notices
25 of Violation issued or to be issued by CEH that are related to the Section 3.3 Products, including
26 but not limited to the August 21, 2015 CEH Notice of Violation served on TJX Companies, Inc.
27 and T.J. Maxx of CA, LLC, which Notice of Violation alleged violations of the consent judgment
28 as to TJX Companies, Inc. and T.J. Maxx of CA, LLC in *Center for Environmental Health v.*

1 *Lulu NYC, LLC, et al*, Lead Case Nol RG 09-459488.

2 **8. NOTICE**

3 8.1 When CEH is entitled to receive any notice under this Consent Judgment, the
4 notice shall be sent by first class and electronic mail to:

23 8.3 Any Party may modify the person and address to whom the notice is to be sent
24 by sending each other Party notice by first class and electronic mail.

25 **9. COURT APPROVAL**

26 9.1 This Consent Judgment shall become effective upon entry by the Court. CEH
27 shall prepare and file a Motion for Approval of this Consent Judgment and Settling Defendant
28 shall support entry of this Consent Judgment.

9.2 If this Consent Judgment is not entered by the Court, it shall be of no force or
effect and shall never be introduced into evidence or otherwise used in any proceeding for any
purpose other than to allow the Court to determine if there was a material breach of Section 9.1.

1 **10. ATTORNEYS' FEES**

2 10.1 Should CEH prevail on any motion, application for an order to show cause or
3 other proceeding to enforce a violation of this Consent Judgment, CEH shall be entitled to its
4 reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred as a result of such motion or application. Should
5 Settling Defendant prevail on any motion application for an order to show cause or other
6 proceeding, Settling Defendant may be awarded its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs as a result
7 of such motion or application upon a finding by the Court that CEH's prosecution of the motion
8 or application lacked substantial justification. For purposes of this Consent Judgment, the term
9 substantial justification shall carry the same meaning as used in the Civil Discovery Act of 1986,
10 Code of Civil Procedure §§ 2016, *et seq.*

11 10.2 Except as otherwise provided in this Consent Judgment, each Party shall bear
12 its own attorneys' fees and costs.

13 10.3 Nothing in this Section 10 shall preclude a Party from seeking an award of
14 sanctions pursuant to law.

15 **11. TERMINATION**

16 11.1 This Consent Judgment shall be terminable by CEH or by Settling Defendant
17 at any time after January 1, 2020, upon the provision of 30 days advanced written notice; such
18 termination shall be effective upon the subsequent filing of a notice of termination with Superior
19 Court of Alameda County.

20 11.2 Should this Consent Judgment be terminated pursuant to this Section, it shall
21 be of no further force or effect as to the terminated parties; provided, however that if CEH is the
22 terminating Party, the provisions of Sections 5 and 7 shall survive any termination and provided
23 further that if Settling Defendant is the terminating Party, the provisions of Sections 5 and 7.1
24 shall survive any termination.

25 **12. OTHER TERMS**

26 12.1 The terms of this Consent Judgment shall be governed by the laws of the State
27 of California.

28 12.2 This Consent Judgment shall apply to and be binding upon CEH and Settling

1 Defendant, and the successors or assigns of any of them.

2 12.3 This Consent Judgment contains the sole and entire agreement and
3 understanding of the Parties with respect to the entire subject matter hereof, and any and all prior
4 discussions, negotiations, commitments, or understandings related thereto, if any, are hereby
5 merged herein and therein. There are no warranties, representations, or other agreements between
6 the Parties except as expressly set forth herein. No representations, oral or otherwise, express or
7 implied, other than those specifically referred to in this Consent Judgment have been made by any
8 Party hereto. No other agreements not specifically contained or referenced herein, oral or
9 otherwise, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the Parties hereto. No supplementation,
10 modification, waiver, or termination of this Consent Judgment shall be binding unless executed in
11 writing by the Party to be bound thereby. No waiver of any of the provisions of this Consent
12 Judgment shall be deemed or shall constitute a waiver of any of the other provisions hereof
13 whether or not similar, nor shall such waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

14 12.4 Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall release, or in any way affect any rights
15 that Settling Defendant might have against any other party, whether or not that party is a Settling
16 Defendant.

17 12.5 This Court shall retain jurisdiction of this matter to implement or modify the
18 Consent Judgment.

19 12.6 The stipulations to this Consent Judgment may be executed in counterparts
20 and by means of facsimile or portable document format (pdf), which taken together shall be
21 deemed to constitute one document.

22 12.7 Each signatory to this Consent Judgment certifies that he or she is fully
23 authorized by the Party he or she represents to stipulate to this Consent Judgment and to enter into
24 and execute the Consent Judgment on behalf of the Party represented and legally to bind that
25 Party.

26 12.8 The Parties, including their counsel, have participated in the preparation of
27 this Consent Judgment and this Consent Judgment is the result of the joint efforts of the Parties.
28 This Consent Judgment was subject to revision and modification by the Parties and has been

1 accepted and approved as to its final form by all Parties and their counsel. Accordingly, any
2 uncertainty or ambiguity existing in this Consent Judgment shall not be interpreted against any
3 Party as a result of the manner of the preparation of this Consent Judgment. Each Party to this
4 Consent Judgment agrees that any statute or rule of construction providing that ambiguities are to
5 be resolved against the drafting Party should not be employed in the interpretation of this Consent
6 Judgment and, in this regard, the Parties hereby waive California Civil Code § 1654.



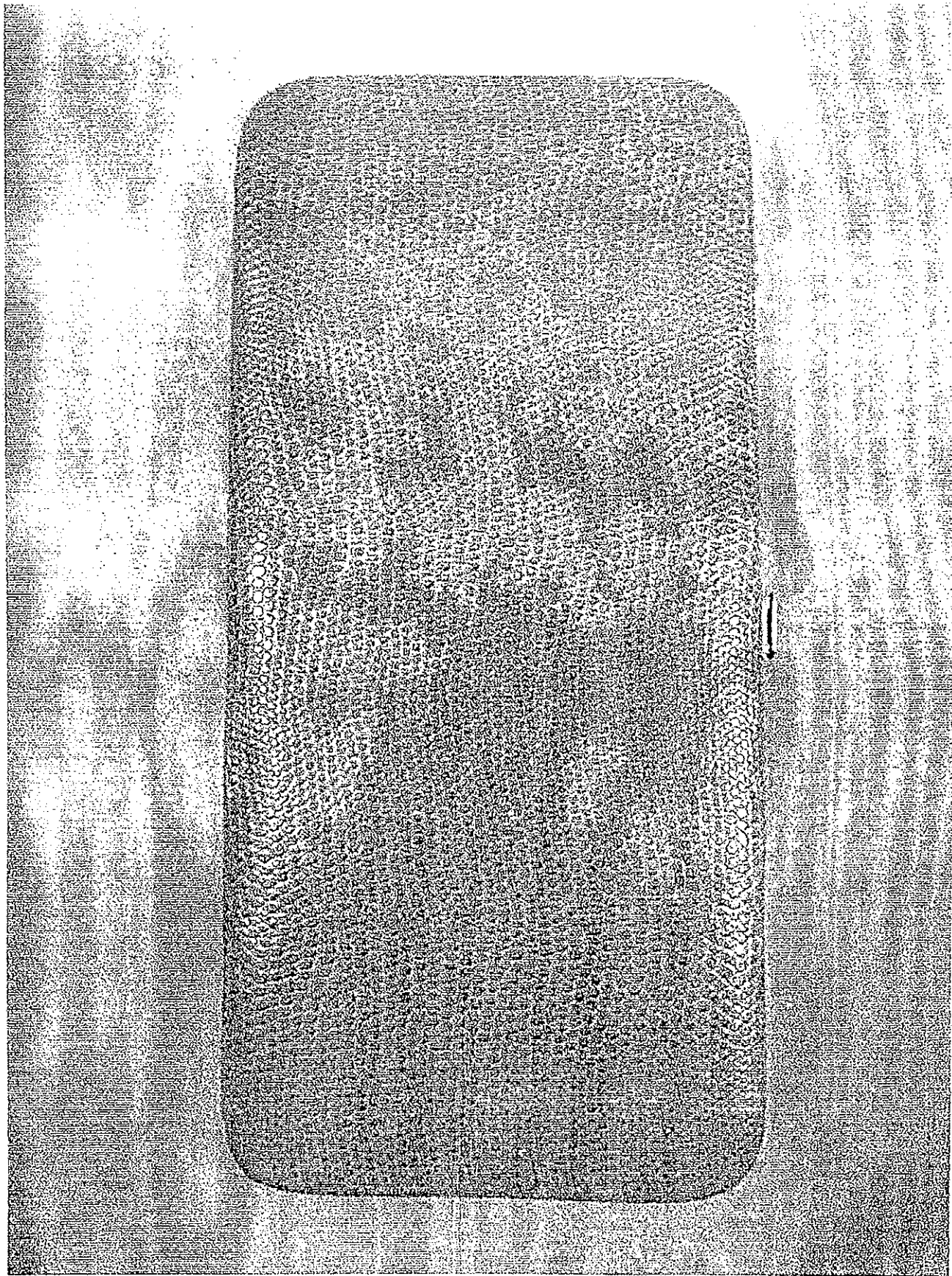
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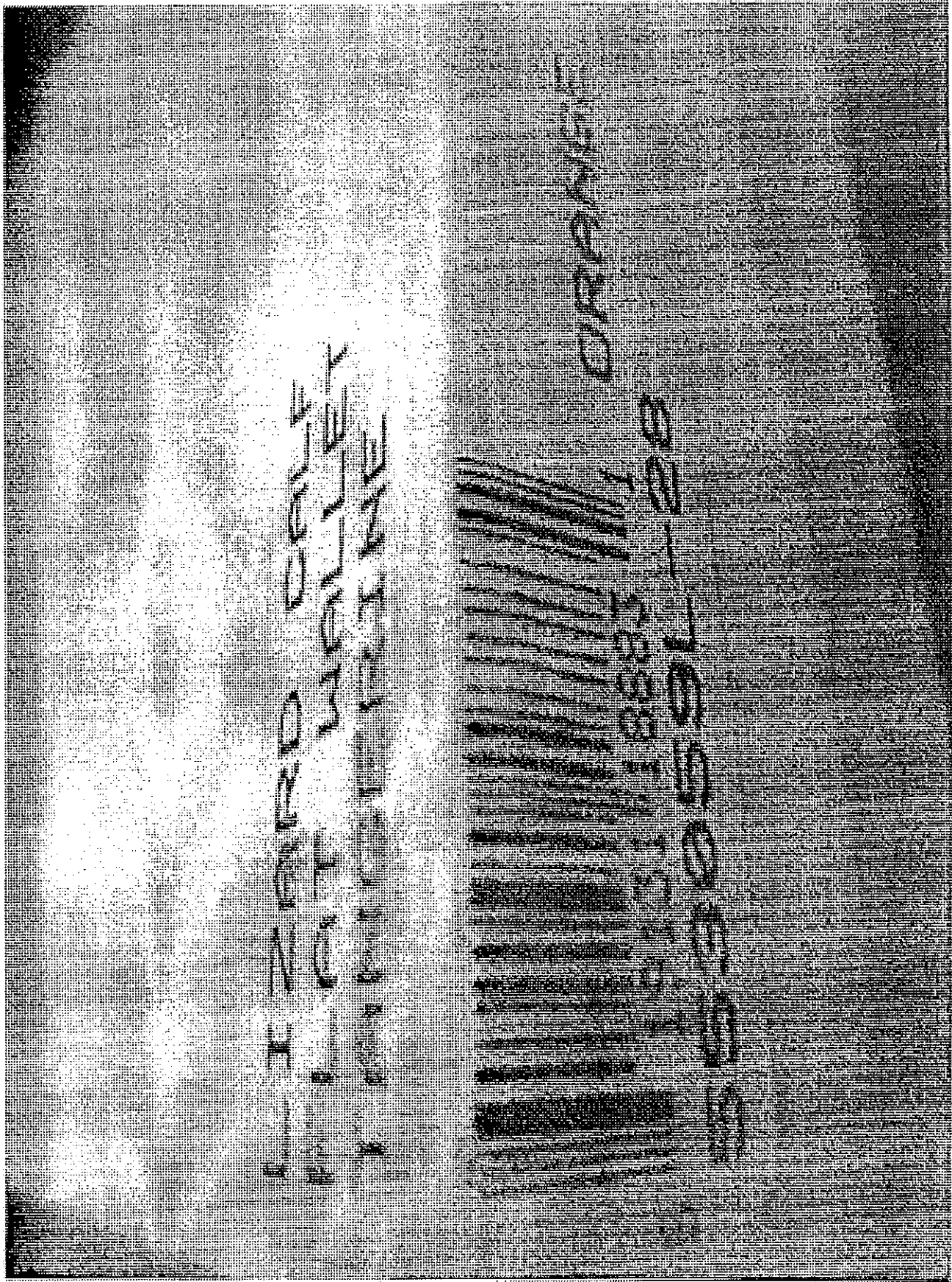
