1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 On July 12, 2021, Plaintiff Environmental Research Center, Inc. ("ERC"), a non-profit corporation, as a private enforcer and in the public interest, initiated this action by filing a Complaint for Injunctive and Declaratory Relief and Civil Penalties (the "Complaint")

1 pursuant to the provisions of California Health and Safety Code section 25249.5 *et seq.*  
2 (“Proposition 65”), against Preventics, Inc., individually and dba Legere Pharmaceuticals  
3 (“Preventics”) and Does 1-100. In this action, ERC alleges that a number of products  
4 manufactured, distributed, or sold by Preventics contain lead, a chemical listed under  
5 Proposition 65 as a carcinogen and reproductive toxin, and expose consumers to this chemical  
6 at a level requiring a Proposition 65 warning. These products (referred to hereinafter  
7 individually as a “Covered Product” or collectively as “Covered Products”) are: Bio-Citrin  
8 Garcinia Cambogia (also identified on private labeled products as Product No. 7983) and Super  
9 Energy (also identified on private labeled products as Product No. 7100) sold under Legere  
10 Pharmaceuticals and private label.

11 1.2 ERC and Preventics are hereinafter referred to individually as a “Party” or  
12 collectively as the “Parties.”

13 1.3 ERC is a 501 (c)(3) California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other  
14 causes, helping safeguard the public from health hazards by reducing the use and misuse of  
15 hazardous and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees,  
16 and encouraging corporate responsibility.

17 1.4 For purposes of this Consent Judgment, the Parties agree that Preventics is a  
18 business entity that has employed ten or more persons at all times relevant to this action, and  
19 qualifies as a “person in the course of doing business” within the meaning of Proposition 65.  
20 Preventics manufactures, distributes, and/or sells the Covered Products.

21 1.5 The Complaint is based on allegations contained in ERC’s Notices of Violation  
22 dated April 8, 2021 and April 22, 2021 that were served on the California Attorney General,  
23 other public enforcers, and Preventics (“Notices”). True and correct copies of the 60-Day  
24 Notices dated April 8, 2021 and April 22, 2021 are attached hereto as *Exhibits A* and *B* and  
25 incorporated herein by reference. More than 60 days have passed since the Notices were served  
26 on the Attorney General, public enforcers, and Preventics and no designated governmental  
27 entity has filed a Complaint against Preventics with regard to the Covered Products or the  
28 alleged violations.

1           1.6     ERC's Notices and Complaint allege that use of the Covered Products by  
2 California consumers exposes them to lead without first receiving clear and reasonable  
3 warnings from Preventics, which is in violation of California Health and Safety Code section  
4 25249.6. Preventics denies all material allegations contained in the Notices and Complaint and  
5 maintains that all of the products that it has sold or distributed for sale in California, including  
6 the Covered Products, have been, and are, in compliance with Proposition 65.

7           1.7     The Parties have entered into this Consent Judgment in order to settle,  
8 compromise, and resolve disputed claims and thus avoid prolonged and costly litigation.  
9 Nothing in this Consent Judgment nor compliance with this Consent Judgment shall constitute  
10 or be construed as an admission by any of the Parties or by any of their respective officers,  
11 directors, shareholders, employees, agents, parent companies, subsidiaries, divisions,  
12 franchisees, licensees, customers, suppliers, distributors, wholesalers, or retailers of any fact,  
13 issue of law, or violation of law.

14           1.8     Except as expressly set forth herein, nothing in this Consent Judgment shall  
15 prejudice, waive, or impair any right, remedy, argument, or defense the Parties may have in  
16 any current or future legal proceeding unrelated to these proceedings.

17           1.9     The Effective Date of this Consent Judgment is the date on which it is entered  
18 as a Judgment by this Court.

## 19     2.     **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

20           For purposes of this Consent Judgment and any further court action that may become  
21 necessary to enforce this Consent Judgment, the Parties stipulate that this Court has subject matter  
22 jurisdiction over the allegations of violations contained in the Complaint and personal jurisdiction  
23 over Preventics as to the acts alleged in the Complaint, that venue is proper in Alameda County,  
24 and that this Court has jurisdiction to enter this Consent Judgment as a full and final resolution of  
25 all claims up through and including the Effective Date that were or could have been asserted in  
26 this action based on the facts alleged in the Notices and Complaint.

## 27     3.     **INJUNCTIVE RELIEF, REFORMULATION, TESTING AND WARNINGS**

28           3.1     Beginning on the Effective Date, Preventics shall be permanently enjoined from

1 manufacturing for sale in the State of California, "Distributing into the State of California," or  
2 directly selling in the State of California, any Covered Product that exposes a person to a  
3 "Daily Lead Exposure Level" of more than 0.5 micrograms of lead per day unless it meets the  
4 warning requirements under Section 3.2.

5           3.1.1 As used in this Consent Judgment, the term "Distributing into the State  
6 of California" shall mean to directly ship a Covered Product into California for sale in  
7 California or to sell a Covered Product to a distributor that Preventics knows or has reason to  
8 know will sell the Covered Product in California.

9           3.1.2 For purposes of this Consent Judgment, the "Daily Lead Exposure  
10 Level" shall be measured in micrograms, and shall be calculated using the following formula:  
11 micrograms of lead per gram of product, multiplied by grams of product per serving of the  
12 product (using the largest serving size appearing on the product label), multiplied by servings  
13 of the product per day (using the largest number of recommended daily servings appearing on  
14 the label), which equals micrograms of lead exposure per day. If the label contains no  
15 recommended daily servings, then the number of recommended daily servings shall be one.

### 16           3.2 Clear and Reasonable Warnings

17           If Preventics is required to provide a warning pursuant to Section 3.1, the following  
18 warning must be utilized ("Warning"):

19           **WARNING:** Consuming this product can expose you to chemicals including [lead] which  
20 is [are] known to the State of California to cause [cancer and] birth defects or other  
reproductive harm. For more information go to [www.P65Warnings.ca.gov/food](http://www.P65Warnings.ca.gov/food).

21           Preventics shall use the phrase "cancer and" in the Warning if Preventics has reason to  
22 believe that the "Daily Lead Exposure Level" is greater than 15 micrograms of lead as determined  
23 pursuant to the quality control methodology set forth in Section 3.4 or if Preventics has reason to  
24 believe that another Proposition 65 chemical is present which may require a cancer warning.

25           The Warning shall be securely affixed to or printed upon the label of each Covered  
26 Product and it must be set off from other surrounding information and enclosed in a box. In  
27 addition, for any Covered Product sold by Preventics over the internet, the Warning shall  
28 appear on the Covered Product's primary display page or on the checkout page when a

1 California delivery address is indicated for any purchase of any Covered Product. The  
2 complete Warning must be given on the Covered Product's primary display page or by  
3 displaying a clearly marked hyperlink on the primary display page using the word  
4 "WARNING" in all capital and bold letters where clicking on the hyperlink will go directly to  
5 a page or popup prominently displaying the Warning without content that detracts from the  
6 Warning. Where the warning is given at checkout, an asterisk or other identifying method  
7 must be utilized to identify which products on the checkout page are subject to the Warning.

8 The Warning shall be at least the same size as the largest of any other health or safety  
9 warnings also appearing on the website or on the label and the word "WARNING" shall be in all  
10 capital letters and in bold print. No statements intended to or likely to have the effect of  
11 diminishing the impact of the Warning on the average lay person shall accompany the Warning.  
12 Further, no statements may accompany the Warning that state or imply that the source of the listed  
13 chemical has an impact on or results in a less harmful effect of the listed chemical.

14 Preventics must display the above Warning with such conspicuousness, as compared with  
15 other words, statements or designs on the label, or on its website, if applicable, to render the  
16 Warning likely to be read and understood by an ordinary individual under customary conditions  
17 of purchase or use of the product.

18 For purposes of this Consent Judgment, the term "label" means a display of written,  
19 printed or graphic material that is printed on or affixed to a Covered Product or its immediate  
20 container or wrapper.

21 If subsequently enacted changes to Proposition 65 or its implementing regulations require  
22 the use of additional or different information on any warning specifically applicable to the  
23 Covered Products (the "New Safe Harbor Warning"), the Parties agree that the New Safe Harbor  
24 Warning may be utilized in place of or in addition to, as applicable, the Warning set forth in this  
25 Section.

### 26 3.3 Conforming Covered Products

27 A Conforming Covered Product is a Covered Product for which the "Daily Lead Exposure  
28 Level" is no greater than 0.5 micrograms of lead per day as determined by the the exposure

1 methodology set forth in Section 3.1.2 and the quality control methodology described in Section  
2 3.4, and that is not known by Preventics to contain other chemicals that violate Proposition 65's  
3 safe harbor thresholds.

#### 4 3.4 Testing and Quality Control Methodology

5 3.4.1 Except as provided in Section 3.4.7 below, beginning within one year of  
6 the Effective Date, Preventics shall arrange for, or have its supplier arrange for, lead testing of  
7 the Covered Products at least once a year for a minimum of five consecutive years by  
8 arranging for testing of three (3) randomly selected samples of each of the Covered Products,  
9 in the form intended for sale to the end-user, which Preventics intends to sell or is  
10 manufacturing for sale in California, directly selling to a consumer in California or  
11 "Distributing into the State of California." If tests conducted pursuant to this Section  
12 demonstrate that no Warning is required for a Covered Product during each of five consecutive  
13 years, then the testing requirements of this Section will no longer be required as to that  
14 Covered Product. However, if during or after the five-year testing period, Preventics changes  
15 ingredient suppliers for any of the Covered Products and/or reformulates any of the Covered  
16 Products, Preventics shall test, or have its supplier test, that Covered Product annually for at  
17 least four (4) consecutive years after such change is made.

18 3.4.2 For purposes of measuring the "Daily Lead Exposure Level," the highest  
19 lead detection result of the three (3) randomly selected samples of the Covered Products will  
20 be controlling. In the event only one of the three (3) randomly selected samples results in a  
21 Daily Lead Exposure Level of greater than 0.5 micrograms of lead per day, Preventics may  
22 submit, or may have its supplier submit, the one sample for retesting with the retest result  
23 controlling.

24 3.4.3 All testing pursuant to this Consent Judgment shall be performed using a  
25 laboratory method that complies with the performance and quality control factors appropriate  
26 for the method used, including limit of detection and limit of quantification, sensitivity,  
27 accuracy and precision that meets the following criteria: Inductively Coupled Plasma-Mass  
28 Spectrometry ("ICP-MS") achieving a limit of quantification of less than or equal to 0.005

1 mg/kg.

2           3.4.4 All testing pursuant to this Consent Judgment shall be performed by an  
3 independent third party laboratory certified by the California Environmental Laboratory  
4 Accreditation Program or an independent third-party laboratory that is registered with the  
5 United States Food & Drug Administration.

6           3.4.5 Nothing in this Consent Judgment shall limit Preventics' ability to  
7 conduct, or require that others conduct, additional testing of the Covered Products, including  
8 the raw materials used in their manufacture.

9           3.4.6 Within thirty (30) days of ERC's written request, Preventics shall  
10 deliver lab reports obtained pursuant to Section 3.4 to ERC. Preventics shall retain all test  
11 results and documentation for a period of five years from the date of each test.

12           3.4.7 The testing and reporting requirements of Section 3.4 do not apply to  
13 any Covered Product for which Preventics is providing a Warning, continuously and without  
14 interruption from the Effective Date, pursuant to Section 3.2 of this Consent Judgment. In the  
15 event a Warning is provided after the Effective Date but Preventics thereafter ceases to provide  
16 the Warning required by Section 3.2, the testing and reporting requirements of Section 3.4 of  
17 this Consent Judgment shall apply beginning within one year after the date the Warning ceases  
18 to be provided, unless Preventics can show to the satisfaction of ERC that the cessation in  
19 providing the Warning was a temporary error that was resolved when discovered.

#### 20 4. SETTLEMENT PAYMENT

21           4.1 In full satisfaction of all potential civil penalties, additional settlement  
22 payments, attorney's fees, and costs, Preventics shall make a total payment of \$35,000.00  
23 ("Total Settlement Amount") to ERC within five (5) days of the Effective Date ("Due Date")  
24 and receipt of ERC's completed Form W-9. Preventics shall make this payment by wire  
25 transfer to ERC's account, for which ERC will give Preventics the necessary account  
26 information. The Total Settlement Amount shall be apportioned by ERC as follows:

27           4.2 \$16,150.00 shall be considered a civil penalty pursuant to California Health and  
28 Safety Code section 25249.7(b)(1). ERC shall remit 75% (\$12,112.50) of the civil penalty to

1 the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (“OEHHA”) for deposit in the Safe  
2 Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Fund in accordance with California Health and Safety  
3 Code section 25249.12(c). ERC will retain the remaining 25% (\$4,037.50) of the civil penalty.

4 4.3 \$1,459.75 shall be distributed to ERC as reimbursement to ERC for reasonable  
5 costs incurred in bringing this action.

6 4.4 \$12,076.13 shall be distributed to ERC as an Additional Settlement Payment  
7 (“ASP”), pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 11, sections 3203, subdivision (d)  
8 and 3204. ERC will utilize the ASP for activities that address the same public harm as  
9 allegedly caused by Defendant in this matter. These activities are detailed  
10 below and support ERC’s overarching goal of reducing and/or eliminating hazardous and toxic  
11 chemicals in dietary supplement products in California. ERC’s activities have had, and will  
12 continue to have, a direct and primary effect within the State of California because California  
13 consumers will be benefitted by the reduction and/or elimination of exposure to lead in dietary  
14 supplements and/or by providing clear and reasonable warnings to California consumers prior  
15 to ingestion of the products.

16 Based on a review of past years’ actual budgets, ERC is providing the following list of  
17 activities ERC engages in to protect California consumers through Proposition 65 citizen  
18 enforcement, along with a breakdown of how ASP funds will be utilized to facilitate those  
19 activities: (1) ENFORCEMENT (65-80%): obtaining, shipping, analyzing, and testing dietary  
20 supplement products that may contain lead and are sold to California consumers. This work  
21 includes continued monitoring and enforcement of past consent judgments and settlements to  
22 ensure companies are in compliance with their obligations thereunder, with a specific focus on  
23 those judgments and settlements concerning lead. This work also includes investigation of new  
24 companies that ERC does not obtain any recovery through settlement or judgment; (2)  
25 VOLUNTARY COMPLIANCE PROGRAM (10-20%): maintaining ERC’s Voluntary  
26 Compliance Program by acquiring products from companies, developing and maintaining a  
27 case file, testing products from these companies, providing the test results and supporting  
28 documentation to the companies, and offering guidance in warning or implementing a self-



1 testing program for lead in dietary supplement products; and (3) "GOT LEAD" PROGRAM  
2 (up to 5%): maintaining ERC's "Got Lead?" Program which reduces the numbers of  
3 contaminated products that reach California consumers by providing access to free testing for  
4 lead in dietary supplement products (Products submitted to the program are screened for  
5 ingredients which are suspected to be contaminated, and then may be purchased by ERC,  
6 catalogued, sent to a qualified laboratory for testing, and the results shared with the consumer  
7 that submitted the product).

8 ERC shall be fully accountable in that it will maintain adequate records to document  
9 and will be able to demonstrate how the ASP funds will be spent and can assure that the funds  
10 are being spent only for the proper, designated purposes described in this Consent Judgment.  
11 ERC shall provide the Attorney General, within thirty days of any request, copies of  
12 documentation demonstrating how such funds have been spent.

13 4.5 \$5,314.12 shall be distributed to ERC for its in-house legal fees. Except as  
14 explicitly provided herein, each Party shall bear its own fees and costs.

15 4.6 In the event that Preventics fails to remit the Total Settlement Amount owed  
16 under Section 4 of this Consent Judgment on or before the Due Date, Preventics shall be  
17 deemed to be in material breach of its obligations under this Consent Judgment. ERC shall  
18 provide written notice of the delinquency to Preventics via electronic mail. If Preventics fails  
19 to deliver the Total Settlement Amount within five (5) days from the written notice, the Total  
20 Settlement Amount shall accrue interest at the statutory judgment interest rate provided in the  
21 California Code of Civil Procedure section 685.010. Additionally, Preventics agrees to pay  
22 ERC's reasonable attorney's fees and costs for any efforts to collect the payment due under  
23 this Consent Judgment.

## 24 5. MODIFICATION OF CONSENT JUDGMENT

25 5.1 This Consent Judgment may be modified only as to injunctive terms (i) by  
26 written stipulation of the Parties and upon entry by the Court of a modified consent judgment  
27 or (ii) by motion of either Party pursuant to Section 5.3 and upon entry by the Court of a  
28 modified consent judgment.

1           5.2     If Preventics seeks to modify this Consent Judgment under Section 5.1, then  
2 Preventics must provide written notice to ERC of its intent ("Notice of Intent"). If ERC seeks  
3 to meet and confer regarding the proposed modification in the Notice of Intent, then ERC must  
4 provide written notice to Preventics within thirty (30) days of receiving the Notice of Intent. If  
5 ERC notifies Preventics in a timely manner of ERC's intent to meet and confer, then the Parties  
6 shall meet and confer in good faith as required in this Section. The Parties shall meet in person  
7 or via telephone within thirty (30) days of ERC's notification of its intent to meet and confer.  
8 Within thirty (30) days of such meeting, if ERC disputes the proposed modification, ERC shall  
9 provide to Preventics a written basis for its position. The Parties shall continue to meet and  
10 confer for an additional thirty (30) days in an effort to resolve any remaining disputes. Should  
11 it become necessary, the Parties may agree in writing to different deadlines for the meet-and-  
12 confer period.

13           5.3     In the event that Preventics initiates or otherwise requests a modification under  
14 Section 5.1, and the meet and confer process leads to a joint motion or application for a  
15 modification of the Consent Judgment, Preventics shall reimburse ERC its costs and reasonable  
16 attorney's fees as supported by documentation for the time spent in the meet-and-confer  
17 process and filing and arguing the motion or application.

18         **6.     RETENTION OF JURISDICTION, ENFORCEMENT OF CONSENT**  
19           **JUDGMENT**

20           6.1     This Court shall retain jurisdiction of this matter to enforce, modify, or  
21 terminate this Consent Judgment.

22           6.2     If ERC alleges that any Covered Product fails to qualify as a Conforming  
23 Covered Product (for which ERC alleges that no Warning has been provided), then ERC shall  
24 inform Preventics in a reasonably prompt manner of its test results, including information  
25 sufficient to permit Preventics to identify the Covered Products at issue. Preventics shall, within  
26 thirty (30) days following such notice, provide ERC with testing information, from an  
27 independent third-party laboratory meeting the requirements of Sections 3.4.3 and 3.4.4,  
28 demonstrating Preventics' compliance with the Consent Judgment. In the event Preventics

1 demonstrates compliance with Section 3.4, ERC will not take any further legal action.

2           6.3     In the event that, as related to the Covered Products, Proposition 65 is repealed,  
3 preempted, or is otherwise rendered completely inapplicable by reason of law, then Preventics  
4 may provide ERC with written notice of any asserted change in the law and shall have no  
5 further injunctive obligations pursuant to this Consent Judgment, with respect to the Covered  
6 Products and to the extent that the Covered Products are so affected. However, if ERC  
7 disputes Preventics' interpretation of the change in the law and believes that Preventics is not  
8 relieved of its injunctive obligations, the Parties shall meet and confer, and ERC shall retain the  
9 right to seek enforcement of the Consent Judgment in the event the Parties do not reach an  
10 agreement.

## 11     7.     **APPLICATION OF CONSENT JUDGMENT**

12           This Consent Judgment may apply to, be binding upon, and benefit the Parties and their  
13 respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, parent companies, subsidiaries,  
14 divisions, franchisees, licensees, customers (including private label customers of Preventics  
15 whose labels include the product numbers as indicated in paragraph 1.1), distributors, wholesalers,  
16 retailers, predecessors, successors, and assigns. This Consent Judgment shall have no  
17 application to any Covered Product that is distributed or sold exclusively outside the State of  
18 California and that is not used by California consumers.

## 19     8.     **BINDING EFFECT, CLAIMS COVERED AND RELEASED**

20           8.1           This Consent Judgment is a full, final, and binding resolution between ERC,  
21 on behalf of itself and its respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees and agents,  
22 and in the public interest, and Preventics and its respective officers, directors, shareholders,  
23 employees, agents, parent companies, subsidiaries, divisions, suppliers, franchisees, licensees,  
24 customers (including private label customers of Preventics whose labels include the product  
25 numbers as indicated in paragraph 1.1), distributors, wholesalers, retailers, and all other  
26 upstream and downstream entities in the distribution chain of any Covered Product, and the  
27 predecessors, successors, and assigns of any of them (collectively, "Released Parties"). ERC,  
28 on behalf of itself and its respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees and agents,

1 and in the public interest, hereby fully releases and discharges the Released Parties from any  
2 and all claims, actions, causes of action, suits, demands, liabilities, damages, penalties, fees,  
3 costs, and expenses asserted, or that could have been asserted from the handling, use, or  
4 consumption of the Covered Products, as to any alleged violation of Proposition 65 or its  
5 implementing regulations arising from the failure to provide Proposition 65 warnings on the  
6 Covered Products regarding lead up to and including the Effective Date.

7           8.2           ERC on its own behalf only, and Preventics on its own behalf only, further  
8 waive and release any and all claims they may have against each other for all actions or  
9 statements made or undertaken in the course of seeking or opposing enforcement of  
10 Proposition 65 in connection with the Notices and Complaint up through and including the  
11 Effective Date, provided, however, that nothing in Section 8 shall affect or limit any Party's  
12 right to seek to enforce the terms of this Consent Judgment.

13           8.3           It is possible that other claims not known to the Parties, arising out of the facts  
14 alleged in the Notices and Complaint, and relating to the Covered Products, will develop or be  
15 discovered. ERC on behalf of itself only, and Preventics on behalf of itself only, acknowledge  
16 that this Consent Judgment is expressly intended to cover and include all such claims up  
17 through and including the Effective Date, including all rights of action therefore. ERC and  
18 Preventics acknowledge that the claims released in Sections 8.1 and 8.2 above may include  
19 unknown claims, and nevertheless waive California Civil Code section 1542 as to any such  
20 unknown claims. California Civil Code section 1542 reads as follows:

21           A GENERAL RELEASE DOES NOT EXTEND TO CLAIMS THAT THE  
22           CREDITOR OR RELEASING PARTY DOES NOT KNOW OR SUSPECT TO  
23           EXIST IN HIS OR HER FAVOR AT THE TIME OF EXECUTING THE RELEASE  
24           AND THAT, IF KNOWN BY HIM OR HER, WOULD HAVE MATERIALLY  
25           AFFECTED HIS OR HER SETTLEMENT WITH THE DEBTOR OR RELEASED  
26           PARTY.

25 ERC on behalf of itself only, and Preventics on behalf of itself only, acknowledge and  
26 understand the significance and consequences of this specific waiver of California Civil Code  
27 section 1542.

28           8.4           Compliance with the terms of this Consent Judgment shall be deemed to

1 constitute compliance with Proposition 65 by any of the Released Parties regarding alleged  
2 exposures to lead in the Covered Products as set forth in the Notices and Complaint.

3 8.5 Nothing in this Consent Judgment is intended to apply to any occupational or  
4 environmental exposures arising under Proposition 65, nor shall it apply to any of Preventics'  
5 products other than the Covered Products.

6 **9. SEVERABILITY OF UNENFORCEABLE PROVISIONS**

7 In the event that any of the provisions of this Consent Judgment are held by a court to be  
8 unenforceable, the validity of the remaining enforceable provisions shall not be adversely  
9 affected.

10 **10. GOVERNING LAW**

11 The terms and conditions of this Consent Judgment shall be governed by and construed in  
12 accordance with the laws of the State of California.

13 **11. PROVISION OF NOTICE**

14 All notices required to be given to either Party to this Consent Judgment by the other shall

### NOTICE OF VIOLATIONS OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTION 25249.5 *ET SEQ.* (PROPOSITION 65)

Dear Alleged Violator and the Appropriate Public Enforcement Agencies:

I am the Executive Director of Environmental Research Center, Inc. (“ERC”). ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes, helping safeguard the public from health hazards by bringing about a reduction in the use and misuse of hazardous and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees, and encouraging corporate responsibility.

ERC has identified violations of California’s Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (“Proposition 65”), which is codified at California Health & Safety Code §25249.5 *et seq.*, with respect to the product identified below. These violations have occurred and continue to occur because the alleged Violator identified below failed to provide required clear and reasonable warnings with this product. This letter serves as a notice of these violations to the alleged Violator and the appropriate public enforcement agencies. Pursuant to Section 25249.7(d) of the statute, ERC intends to file a private enforcement action in the public interest 60 days after effective service of this notice unless the public enforcement agencies have commenced and are diligently prosecuting an action to rectify these violations.

**General Information about Proposition 65.** A copy of a summary of Proposition 65, prepared by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, is attached with the copy of this letter served to the alleged Violator identified below.

**Alleged Violator.** The name of the company covered by this notice that violated Proposition 65 (hereinafter the “Violator”) is:

**Preventics, Inc., individually and dba Legere Pharmaceuticals**

**Consumer Product and Listed Chemical.** The product that is the subject of this notice and the chemical in that product identified as exceeding allowable levels is:

**Legere Pharmaceuticals Bio-Citrin Garcinia Cambogia – Lead**

On February 27, 1987, the State of California officially listed lead as a chemical known to cause developmental toxicity, and male and female reproductive toxicity. On October 1, 1992, the State of California officially listed lead and lead compounds as chemicals known to cause cancer.

It should be noted that ERC may continue to investigate other products that may reveal further violations and result in subsequent notices of violations.


**Route of Exposure.** The consumer exposures that are the subject of this notice result from the recommended use of this product. Consequently, the route of exposure to this chemical has been and continues to be through ingestion.

**Approximate Time Period of Violations.** Ongoing violations have occurred every day since at least April 8, 2018, as well as every day since the product was introduced into the California marketplace, and will continue every day until clear and reasonable warnings are provided to product purchasers and users or until this known toxic chemical is either removed from or reduced to allowable levels in the product. Proposition 65 requires that a clear and reasonable warning be provided prior to exposure to the identified chemical. The method of warning should be a warning that appears on the product label. The Violator violated Proposition 65 because it failed to provide persons ingesting this product with appropriate warnings that they are being exposed to this chemical.

Consistent with the public interest goals of Proposition 65 and a desire to have these ongoing violations of California law quickly rectified, ERC is interested in seeking a constructive resolution of this matter that includes an enforceable written agreement by the Violator to: (1) reformulate the identified product so as to eliminate further exposures to the identified chemical, or provide appropriate warnings on the labels of this product; (2) pay an appropriate civil penalty; and (3) provide clear and reasonable warnings compliant with Proposition 65 to all persons located in California who purchased the above product in the last three years. Such a resolution will prevent further unwarned consumer exposures to the identified chemical, as well as an expensive and time-consuming litigation.



#### THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT OF 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and OEHHA implementing regulations (see citations below) for further information.

FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BASIS FOR THE ALLEGATIONS IN THE NOTICE RELATED TO YOUR BUSINESS, CONTACT THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE NOTICE.

The text of Proposition 65 (Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13) is available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65law72003.html>. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 27 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 25102 through 27001.<sup>1</sup> These implementing regulations are available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65Regs.html>.

#### *WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?*

***The "Proposition 65 List."*** Under Proposition 65, the lead agency (OEHHA) publishes a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. Chemicals are placed on the Proposition 65 list if they are known to cause cancer and/or birth defects or other reproductive harm, such as damage to

female or male reproductive systems or to the developing fetus. This list must be updated at least once a year. The current Proposition 65 list of chemicals is available on the OEHHA website at: [http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65\\_list/Newlist.html](http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/Newlist.html).

Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under Proposition 65. Businesses that produce, use, release or otherwise engage in activities involving listed chemicals must comply with the following:

***Clear and reasonable warnings.*** A business is required to warn a person before “knowingly and intentionally” exposing that person to a listed chemical unless an exemption applies. The warning given must be “clear and reasonable.” This means that the warning must: (1) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm; and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed to that chemical. Some exposures are exempt from the warning requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

***Prohibition from discharges into drinking water.*** A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Some discharges are exempt from this requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

#### ***DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?***

Yes. You should consult the current version of the statute and regulations (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/index.html>) to determine all applicable exemptions, the most common of which are the following:

***Grace Period.*** Proposition 65 warning requirements do not apply until 12 months after the chemical has been listed. The Proposition 65 discharge prohibition does not apply to a discharge or release of a chemical that takes place less than 20 months after the listing of the chemical.

***Governmental agencies and public water utilities.*** All agencies of the federal, state or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

***Businesses with nine or fewer employees.*** Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees. This includes all employees, not just those present in California.

***Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer.*** For chemicals that are listed under Proposition 65 as known to the State to cause cancer, a warning is not required if the business causing the exposure can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses “no significant risk.” This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific “No Significant Risk Levels” (NSRLs) for many listed carcinogens. Exposures below these levels are exempt from the warning requirement. See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of NSRLs, and Section 25701 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

***Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question.*** For chemicals known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity, a warning is not required if the business causing the exposure can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the “no observable effect level” divided by 1,000. This number is known as the Maximum Allowable Dose Level (MADL). See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of MADLs, and Section 25801 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

***Exposures to Naturally Occurring Chemicals in Food.*** Certain exposures to chemicals that naturally occur in foods (i.e., that do not result from any known human activity, including activity by someone other than the person causing the exposure) are exempt from the warning requirements of the law. If the chemical is a contaminant<sup>2</sup> it must be reduced to the lowest level feasible. Regulations explaining this exemption can be found in Section 25501.

***Discharges that do not result in a “significant amount” of the listed chemical entering any source of drinking water.*** The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply if the discharger is able to demonstrate that a “significant amount” of the listed chemical has not, does not, or will not pass into or probably pass into a source of drinking water, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A “significant amount” means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the “no significant risk” level for chemicals that cause cancer or that is 1,000 times below the “no observable effect” level for chemicals that cause reproductive toxicity, if an individual were exposed to that amount in drinking water.

## *HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?*

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys. Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. The notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in Section 25903 of Title 27 and sections 3100-3103 of Title 11. A private party may not pursue an independent enforcement action under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an enforcement action within sixty days of the notice.

A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court to stop committing the violation.

A private party may not file an enforcement action based on certain exposures if the alleged violator meets specific conditions. For the following types of exposures, the Act provides an opportunity for the business to correct the alleged violation:

- An exposure to alcoholic beverages that are consumed on the alleged violator's premises to the extent onsite consumption is permitted by law;
- An exposure to a Proposition 65 listed chemical in a food or beverage prepared and sold on the alleged violator's premises that is primarily intended for immediate consumption on- or off-premises. This only applies if the chemical was not intentionally added to the food, and was formed by cooking or similar preparation of food or beverage components necessary to render the food or beverage palatable or to avoid microbiological contamination;
- An exposure to environmental tobacco smoke caused by entry of persons (other than employees) on premises owned or operated by the alleged violator where smoking is permitted at any location on the premises;
- An exposure to listed chemicals in engine exhaust, to the extent the exposure occurs inside a facility owned or operated by the alleged violator and primarily intended for parking non-commercial vehicles.

If a private party alleges that a violation occurred based on one of the exposures described above, the private party must first provide the alleged violator a notice of special compliance procedure and proof of compliance form.

### NOTICE OF VIOLATIONS OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTION 25249.5 *ET SEQ.* (PROPOSITION 65)

Dear Alleged Violator and the Appropriate Public Enforcement Agencies:

I am the Executive Director of Environmental Research Center, Inc. ("ERC"). ERC is a California non-profit corporation dedicated to, among other causes, helping safeguard the public from health hazards by bringing about a reduction in the use and misuse of hazardous and toxic chemicals, facilitating a safe environment for consumers and employees, and encouraging corporate responsibility.

ERC has identified violations of California's Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 ("Proposition 65"), which is codified at California Health & Safety Code §25249.5 *et seq.*, with respect to the product identified below. These violations have occurred and continue to occur because the alleged Violator identified below failed to provide required clear and reasonable warnings with this product. This letter serves as a notice of these violations to the alleged Violator and the appropriate public enforcement agencies. Pursuant to Section 25249.7(d) of the statute, ERC intends to file a private enforcement action in the public interest 60 days after effective service of this notice unless the public enforcement agencies have commenced and are diligently prosecuting an action to rectify these violations.

**General Information about Proposition 65.** A copy of a summary of Proposition 65, prepared by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, is attached with the copy of this letter served to the alleged Violator identified below.

**Alleged Violator.** The name of the company covered by this notice that violated Proposition 65 (hereinafter the "Violator") is:

**Preventics, Inc., individually and dba Legere Pharmaceuticals**

**Consumer Product and Listed Chemical.** The product that is the subject of this notice and the chemical in that product identified as exceeding allowable levels is:

**Legere Pharmaceuticals Super Energy – Lead**

On February 27, 1987, the State of California officially listed lead as a chemical known to cause developmental toxicity, and male and female reproductive toxicity. On October 1, 1992, the State of California officially listed lead and lead compounds as chemicals known to cause cancer.

Notice of Violations of California Health & Safety Code §25249.5 *et seq.*

April 22, 2021

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It should be noted that ERC may continue to investigate other products that may reveal further violations and result in subsequent notices of violations.

**Route of Exposure.** The consumer exposures that are the subject of this notice result from the recommended use of this product. Consequently, the route of exposure to this chemical has been and continues to be through ingestion.

**Approximate Time Period of Violations.** Ongoing violations have occurred every day since at least April 22, 2018, as well as every day since the product was introduced into the California marketplace, and will continue every day until clear and reasonable warnings are provided to product purchasers and users or until this known toxic chemical is either removed from or reduced to allowable levels in the product. Proposition 65 requires that a clear and reasonable warning be provided prior to exposure to the identified chemical. The method of warning should be a warning that appears on the product label. The Violator violated Proposition 65 because it failed to provide persons ingesting this product with appropriate warnings that they are being exposed to this chemical.

Consistent with the public interest goals of Proposition 65 and a desire to have these ongoing violations of California law quickly rectified, ERC is interested in seeking a constructive resolution of this matter that includes an enforceable written agreement by the Violator to: (1) reformulate the identified product so as to eliminate further exposures to the identified chemical, or provide appropriate warnings on the labels of this product; (2) pay an appropriate civil penalty; and (3) provide clear and reasonable warnings compliant with Proposition 65 to all persons located in California who purchased the above product in the last three years. Such a resolution will prevent further unwarned consumer exposures to the identified chemical, as well as an expensive and time-consuming litigation.



#### THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACT OF 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and OEHHA implementing regulations (see citations below) for further information.

FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BASIS FOR THE ALLEGATIONS IN THE NOTICE RELATED TO YOUR BUSINESS, CONTACT THE PERSON IDENTIFIED ON THE NOTICE.

The text of Proposition 65 (Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13) is available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65law72003.html>. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 27 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 25102 through 27001.<sup>1</sup> These implementing regulations are available online at: <http://oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/P65Regs.html>.

#### *WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?*

***The "Proposition 65 List."*** Under Proposition 65, the lead agency (OEHHA) publishes a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer and/or reproductive toxicity. Chemicals are placed on the Proposition 65 list if they are known to cause cancer and/or birth defects or other reproductive harm, such as damage to

female or male reproductive systems or to the developing fetus. This list must be updated at least once a year. The current Proposition 65 list of chemicals is available on the OEHHA website at: [http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65\\_list/Newlist.html](http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/prop65_list/Newlist.html).

Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under Proposition 65. Businesses that produce, use, release or otherwise engage in activities involving listed chemicals must comply with the following:

***Clear and reasonable warnings.*** A business is required to warn a person before “knowingly and intentionally” exposing that person to a listed chemical unless an exemption applies. The warning given must be “clear and reasonable.” This means that the warning must: (1) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm; and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed to that chemical. Some exposures are exempt from the warning requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

***Prohibition from discharges into drinking water.*** A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Some discharges are exempt from this requirement under certain circumstances discussed below.

#### ***DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?***

Yes. You should consult the current version of the statute and regulations (<http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/law/index.html>) to determine all applicable exemptions, the most common of which are the following:

***Grace Period.*** Proposition 65 warning requirements do not apply until 12 months after the chemical has been listed. The Proposition 65 discharge prohibition does not apply to a discharge or release of a chemical that takes place less than 20 months after the listing of the chemical.

***Governmental agencies and public water utilities.*** All agencies of the federal, state or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

***Businesses with nine or fewer employees.*** Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees. This includes all employees, not just those present in California.

***Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer.*** For chemicals that are listed under Proposition 65 as known to the State to cause cancer, a warning is not required if the business causing the exposure can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses “no significant risk.” This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific “No Significant Risk Levels” (NSRLs) for many listed carcinogens. Exposures below these levels are exempt from the warning requirement. See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of NSRLs, and Section 25701 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

***Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question.*** For chemicals known to the State to cause reproductive toxicity, a warning is not required if the business causing the exposure can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the “no observable effect level” divided by 1,000. This number is known as the Maximum Allowable Dose Level (MADL). See OEHHA's website at: <http://www.oehha.ca.gov/prop65/getNSRLs.html> for a list of MADLs, and Section 25801 *et seq.* of the regulations for information concerning how these levels are calculated.

***Exposures to Naturally Occurring Chemicals in Food.*** Certain exposures to chemicals that naturally occur in foods (i.e., that do not result from any known human activity, including activity by someone other than the person causing the exposure) are exempt from the warning requirements of the law. If the chemical is a contaminant<sup>2</sup> it must be reduced to the lowest level feasible. Regulations explaining this exemption can be found in Section 25501.

***Discharges that do not result in a “significant amount” of the listed chemical entering any source of drinking water.*** The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply if the discharger is able to demonstrate that a “significant amount” of the listed chemical has not, does not, or will not pass into or probably pass into a source of drinking water, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A “significant amount” means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the “no significant risk” level for chemicals that cause cancer or that is 1,000 times below the “no observable effect” level for chemicals that cause reproductive toxicity, if an individual were exposed to that amount in drinking water.

## *HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?*

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys. Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. The notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in Section 25903 of Title 27 and sections 3100-3103 of Title 11. A private party may not pursue an independent enforcement action under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an enforcement action within sixty days of the notice.

A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court to stop committing the violation.

A private party may not file an enforcement action based on certain exposures if the alleged violator meets specific conditions. For the following types of exposures, the Act provides an opportunity for the business to correct the alleged violation:

- An exposure to alcoholic beverages that are consumed on the alleged violator's premises to the extent onsite consumption is permitted by law;
- An exposure to a Proposition 65 listed chemical in a food or beverage prepared and sold on the alleged violator's premises that is primarily intended for immediate consumption on- or off-premises. This only applies if the chemical was not intentionally added to the food, and was formed by cooking or similar preparation of food or beverage components necessary to render the food or beverage palatable or to avoid microbiological contamination;
- An exposure to environmental tobacco smoke caused by entry of persons (other than employees) on premises owned or operated by the alleged violator where smoking is permitted at any location on the premises;
- An exposure to listed chemicals in engine exhaust, to the extent the exposure occurs inside a facility owned or operated by the alleged violator and primarily intended for parking non-commercial vehicles.

If a private party alleges that a violation occurred based on one of the exposures described above, the private party must first provide the alleged violator a notice of special compliance procedure and proof of compliance form.




